NOTICE is hereby given to all concerned, that Returns, accompanied by remittance of **Luxury and Excise Taxes**, must be made as follows to the local Collector of Inland Revenue, from whom any information desired may be obtained.

Returns of Luxury Tax must be made on the first and fifteenth day of each month.

Returns of Jewellers' Tax, Manufacturers' Tax and Sales Tax must be made not later than the last day of the month following the month covered by the Return.

Returns for Taxes in Arrears must be made forthwith, otherwise the penalty provided by law will be enforced.

For now when Mrs. New Yorker calls up Mrs. Far Rockaway and says, "Dear, we will be out Saturday afternoon for the week end," she adds quickly, "and we will bring meat enough for the whole crowd."

And Mrs. Lar Rockaway is quite likely to answer: "All right we will look for you. Mr. and Mrs. Newark will be here also, so we will have a jolly party"—thereby conveying the news to Mrs. New Yorker that there will be two extra mouths to feed over this week end. And Mrs. New Yorker's butcher profits by his phone conversation as he profits by many others on that day.

Of course it may be difficult to discover just where this popular movement was started, as the subject is more or less embarrassing when first introduced, but it is accepted as a fact now, nevertheless, that the visitor shall bring the heavy food.

Residents of the beach resorts say the habit started because fresh meats were so hard to get there that visitors from the city were asked to bring so and so many pounds of meat out with them. And of course the guest would not think of collecting on the other end, so very likely this was the start of the movement.

But there are other beachers who admit that they cannot afford to entertain friends as they used to, as their rents have been doubled as well as that of city folks and everything else has gone up in about the same ratio.

A CANADIAN CHALLENGES FOR THE CUP

New York, Aug. 2—Alexander C. Ross, Montreal, former member of the Dominion Parliament, yesterday challenged for the America's Cup, according to the New York World. It called for a Canadian built yacht to come to New York in July of next year. His challenge supercedes the intended one of Sir Thomas Lipton for another race in 1922.

Mr. Ross yesterday sent a telegram to Commodore J. P. Morgan, of the New York Yacht Club, that read:

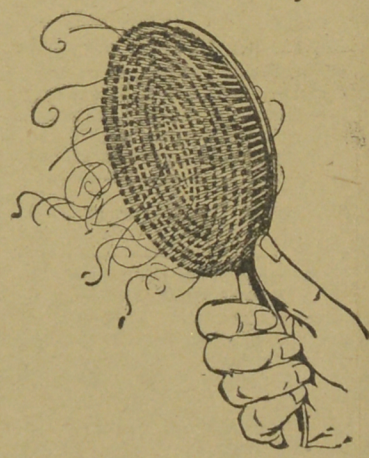
"Allow me as a life member of the Cape Breton Royal Yacht Club and a member of the Halifax Yacht Club, to congratulate your club on the retention of the America's Cup. Hearing, through the press that Sir Thomas Lipton does not intend to compete for the cup in 1921, I, on behalf of these clubs, respectfully beg to challenge to compete for the cup in July, 1921.

"We will build a boat on the Atlantic Coast, to be manned by Canadians if you grant this opportunity of competing. We will abide as to measurement and cost, and will submit our bonafides by letter.

"Soliciting a reply, at my expense.

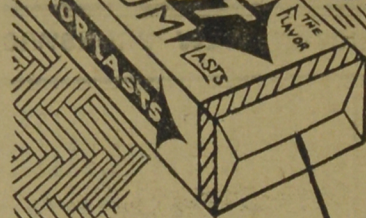

Tenders are notified that: Tenders will not be considered unless made on the forms supplied and signed with the actual signatures of the tenderers stating their occupations and places of residence. In the case of firms the actual signature and nature of the occupation and places of residence of each member of the firm must be given.

Each tender must be accompanied by an accepted cheque on a chartered bank equal to ten per cent of the total amount of the tender and payable to the order of the Minister of Public Works, Canada, and the State Highway Commission, Maine, jointly, as a guarantee that the tenderer will execute the contract within ten days of the award and furnish a satisfactory bond amounting to one-half of the contract price for the faithful performance of the work.

The cheque will be forfeited should the tenderer fail to enter into a contract when called upon to do so, and returned if the tender is not accepted.
