Hon. W. E. Raney, Attorney General of Ontario, expressed the utmost surprise at the decision of the Federal Government, he said: "One might have thought that instead of deferring the matter we might have been consulted. The first intimation we had of any change was through the newspaper report.

The electors of Ontario voted on the question of prohibition last year and sustained the act by an overwhelming legislature a resolution was passed cidedly out of style. calling upon the Federal Government to hold a referendum on the question of importing liquors and after fixing 'a date for the election in October the government without advancing any reason has seen fit to postpone it until next April. In the meantime there is a chance for Parliament to meet and amend the law.
