BOOZE BY TORPEDOES

Major Dalrymple, prohibition inspector for Illinois, Indiana, Wisconsin and Michigan, who not long ago came in conflict with the courts of Michigan in an enforcement of the law according to his own lights, has not suffered his zeal to be abated by the uproar raised as a result of his activities at that time. He has discovered that smugglers bringing liquor into the United States from Canada are filling torpedoes with the liquids and sending them under water to points near the Michigan shore, where they are picked up by men in the boats and carried in. Several of these torpedoes filled with liquor have been, it is stated, captured by prohibition enforcement inspectors along the lake shore. "I intercepted one of the torpedoes myself" Major Dalrymple is quoted as saying. "The torpedo leaves the Canadian shore at a moderate speed travelling about three feet under water. When it is near the Michigan shore it is picked up by men in a small boat who are in the pay of the smugglers. Agents under my direction captured one of these boats while the crew was engaged in taking the torpedo out of the water." The inspector is quoted as having made these statements to General Inspector Kramer at Washington in urging that he be given a much larger force of deputies to enforce the law. Commissioner Kramer regretted the impossibility of appointing more deputies at this time. If the department is to fight submarines a large force is imperatively needed. Submarines loaded with bad whiskey can cause explosions as fatal as any loaded with dynamite.

The Cunarder Aquitania, the biggest British merchant ship is setting new records for speed. Since being converted into an oil-burner she covered 129 miles in 3 hours and 42 minutes or at the rate of 27.40 knots an hour. This is a knot better than the best speed of the Mauretania. When burning coal the Aquitania's best speed was 24 knots. The Mauretania still holds the record for a trans-Atlantic passage. In September, 1910, she ran from Queenstown to New York, over the northerly course of 2,851 miles, in 4 days 10 hours and 41 minutes, or at an average speed of 26.06 knots.

It will be continued until Saturday next and will undoubtedly have a large patronage.

 vigorously and he was sure every one would be pleased to know that the Commission expected to call for tenders for some of the most important parts of the work particularly in the vicinity of Musquash, within a short time.

Then there was the bigger question of the Grand Falls on the St. John river. The government and Commission were considering how best to bring about the development of this great power. They realized, however, that before this power could be developed there must be linked up with it some great industry. Before very long he hoped to be able to make an announcement and to tell the people that arrangements have been completed for the development of that power upon a goodly scale.

Hon. Mr. Tweeddale.

Hon. J. F. Tweeddale, the minister of agriculture, congratulated the management of the exhibition upon the excellent showing that had been made and referred to the remarks of the preceding speakers. It was his opinion that the people were looking to the government to develop the water powers of the province and, in this connection, he thought there should be greater development of the power of Grand Falls. These falls, he said, were greater than all the other water powers of the province combined and he had supported legislation in the provincial parliament last year which would compel the International Paper Company to develop the power properly, or the right to use the power, which had been sold to the corporation, would be withdrawn.

Some time ago, the speaker observed, there was a strong competition among the local industries and there was almost enough home-made products to satisfy the ordinary demands of the public. Now the trade was going to the United States. With a proper development of the hydro-electric powers of the province, the minister of agriculture thought there would be a reversion to the busy manufacturing of other years.

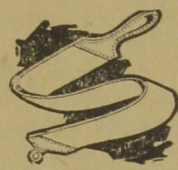
