THE COMMANDER OF MILITARY FORCES IN SOUTHERN IRELAND HAS PROHIBITED ASSEMBLIES

A PROCLAMATION HAS BEEN ISSUED

Public Meetings or Processions Cannot be Held Within 3 Miles of the Cork Post Office—War Spirit Strong in Warsaw—French Ultimatum Accepted.

Cork, July 21.—A sensation was created here today by the issuance of a proclamation by Major General Strickland, Commander in Southern Ireland prohibiting meetings, assemblies and processions within a three mile limit of the Cork General Postoffice.

War Spirit Strong
Warsaw, July 21.—It is estimated that more than a half million responded to the call of the Polish National Council of Defence for troops. The war spirit is dominating Warsaw newspapers. The people generally believe that an armistice will not necessarily mean peace.

Accept French Terms
London, July 21.—A despatch from Egypt to the French authorities here today says that Emile Feisal, head of the Syrian state, has accepted the terms of the French ultimatum. There has not as yet, however, been any official confirmation of this report.

PREPARING TO TRAIN CANADIAN AIR FORCE

Ottawa, July 20.—Preparations for the beginning of the Canadian Air Force camp at Camp Borden are now being rushed in an attempt to have everything in readiness for the beginning of classes as soon as the air force regulations have been approved by the privy council.

These regulations are now in the printers' hands and will in a few days be submitted to the air board for submission by it to the cabinet.

The work of preparing the graduation and seniority list is being held up because applicants have not been returning their questionnaires to the air board as promptly as they should have done. Whenever these questionnaires are in hand, which it is hoped they will be soon, the seniority list will be drafted and issued.

Major F. L. Pinder, of the air force, who has been touring the western cities, is expected to return to Ottawa on Friday. He will later go to the maritime provinces in connection with organization and recruiting work.

PROPERTY IN WIFE'S NAME

New York, July 20.—Howard Croker, a son of Richard Croker and one of the parties to the various suits recently brought against the former Tammany leader, issued a statement yesterday commenting upon the recent court decision at West Palm Beach by which Mr. Croker was declared sane and competent to manage his own affairs.

"The estate he formerly owned near Dublin, all his horses, the entire contents of his house there, as well as his home in Palm Beach, have been transferred to his wife," the statement reads. "Any other property that he purchased, the present bank accounts, the safety deposit boxes where his securities are kept, stand in their own names subject to their individual signatures. He hasn't a single thing he can call his own."

"It was to save him from such a predicament that his children felt justified in taking legal action."

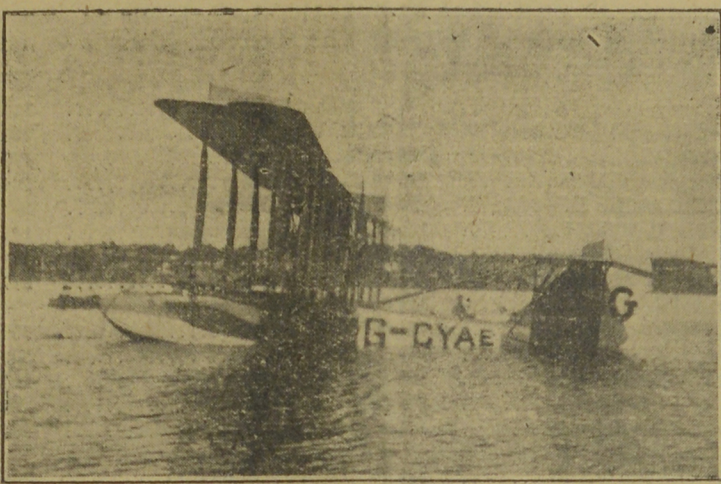
MY DEAR, IT WAS AWFUL!

LIPTON'S SHAMROCK WON THE SECOND YACHT RACE TUESDAY AFTER A THRILLING CONTEST

The Green Challenger Led the Resolute Almost from the Start—The Second Victory Over the Cup Defender—Balloon Jib Topsail was Damaged on the Home Stretch—The Third Race This Afternoon.

Sandy Hook, N. J., July 20.—Shamrock IV., British challenger for the America's Cup, came home wing and wing to her second victory over the defender, Resolute, today and placed herself within striking distance of the coveted trophy. Tomorrow's meet—if she wins it—will clinch the series for Shamrock IV., while the Resolute must take three straight to keep the famous cup on this side of the Atlantic.

Today's race saw the trim hull of Sir Thomas Lipton's emerald challenger and her vast spread of white canvas always in the lead save for a brief period at the start, when her balloon jib topsail fouled as it was broken out, and Resolute forged temporarily into first place.

The thrills were all saved for the last twelve miles of the thirty mile triangular sail. Both yachts had lazed along in a vagrant breeze, Shamrock steadily drawing away from her glistening white pursuer, until the challenger came within about two miles of the second mark. There she caught a freshening northwester and spurted up, breaking out her balloon jib topsail and spinnaker as she rounded the stake, for a wing-and-wing rhin home before the breeze.

Resolute was still floundering along in a near calm, more than a mile from the stake, suddenly the breeze struck her and the trim craft, heeling over until her decks were awash, dashed forward in pursuit. She seemed fairly to leap through the sea, binging the white spray high as she tore along. She gained the mark in incredibly short time, and swinging close to the buoy, broke out her balloon and strained forward like a thoroughbred on the home stretch. But a tricky breeze, which had appeared to favor the Shamrock from the start, had given the challenger too great a lead to be overcome and she swept across the finish line at Ambrose Channel lightship 9 minutes and 27 seconds ahead of the Resolute—a victory of two minutes and twenty-six seconds after the handicap imposed because of her greater sail area had been deducted.

Although the Shamrock won today, the Resolute's supporters insisted that the victory to the challenger. Neither boat, they averred, has had an actual test of her sailing capabilities in the present series. Shamrock IV., today—so argued the "pro-Resolute"—not only got most of the puffs of wind while the Resolute was drifting virtually becalmed, but had the good fortune to see the wind shift so that the Resolute's favorite windward leg was entirely eliminated from the race.

Shamrock IV. tore her balloon jib topsail slightly on the home stretch, but otherwise both craft came through in fine shape, and before being towed into the "horseshoe" off Sandy Hook, both hoisted the pennant that indicated their readiness to race tomorrow.

The first fifteen minutes at the start of the race were featured by bungling sail handling on the Shamrock. The balloon jib refused to break out and finally when yanked, it fouled around the stay. Then a spinnaker was tried and found to set poorly. Two or three other head sails were set and taken in. During these experiments the Resolute walked into the lead and it looked like a repetition of Saturday's contest. Finally, Captain Burton settled down on a number one jib topsail and a little trisail which looked like a

POLITICAL DOLDRUMS AT THE CAPITAL

The New Premier is Passing Up Invitations to Speak—Will Later on Attend a Non-Political Reception in His Native Town—Spectacular Fight Promised in E. Elgin.

Ottawa, July 21.—The Capital is a bit in political doldrums at present. The prime minister is here, but not many of the cabinet. He is surfeited with communications and receiving a great number of invitations to go here and there but for the present is passing them all up. Later on he will leave the capital and will have a non-political reception in his native town of St. Mary's and afterwards will go out west. At Portage La Prairie, his own constituency, it is expected he will make his first important pronouncement though really, the keynote has been sounded already in the adoption of the party platform by the caucus.

There is no word yet of the ministerial by-elections except that they will not come off before the first of September owing to the delays contemplated by the law. The first three held will be in Mr. McCurdy's seat, Colchester. Mr. Wigmore's seat, St. John and East Elgin. Yale B. C. and West Peterboro will probably come later.

Advices received by the new minister of customs suggest a possibility of his being returned by acclamation in St. John, but there is no definite assurance on that score. Mr. McCurdy is rather anticipating opposition in Colchester, the outcome of the provincial fight there, where Conservative Liberal and United Farmer candidates are in the running is being awaited with very much interest as is the provincial result generally.

Of all the coming fights none promises to be more spectacular than East Elgin, a typical rural seat of Ontario where on the tariff issue a government candidate will be put up against the U. F. O. man already in the field.

For the time being departmental affairs are pretty well squared away. The Grand Trunk arbitration board has been appointed, the vexed question of wheat control disposed of and for the moment there is nothing outstanding on the tapis. The tariff inquiry will not begin before September and the increased freight rates question as well as the great fuel problem are matters for adjudication and action by the railway commission. Incidentally the political lines which are being quietly laid make no plans for an election for two years. The intention of the government is to go to the constitutional limit of its term and possible adversity in the by-elections would be the only consideration likely to vary this plan.
