LIPTON'S SHAMROCK WON THE SECOND YACHT RACE TUESDAY AFTER A THRILLING CONTEST

(Continued from Page One)

the way. Shamrock at one time had a lead of a mile and a half.

Four miles from the second mark, fortune again favored the Ulster boat. The wind dropped and then came in from the southwest. This gave both boats a close fetch on the port tack, for the mark. Shamrock naturally picked it up first and pulled still further ahead, her lead at the turn being more than nine minutes.

Although it looked like Shamrock's race with only ten miles to slide down to the finish, Resolute had a seeming advantage of bringing up a better breeze. However, the breeze softened astern instead of freshening, and although Resolute tacked to leeward under balloon, Shamrock, under spinnaker and balloon jib, sailing straight course, gained nearly a minute in the run.

Contest Details.

Sandy Hook, N. J., July 20—Sir Thomas Lipton tonight was near reaching the confessed ambition of his life—lifting the America's Cup. Today his "Irish sweetheart," Shamrock IV., ran up a tally of two races to none against the cup defender, winning in a neck to neck contest by two minutes and twenty-six seconds, corrected time, needing but one more victory to bear the bottomless pewter mug back to England.

There were cheers on Sir Thomas Lipton's yacht Victoria when Shamrock IV swept first across the line today, but there was a hush when her crew worked feverishly to free a jib topsail that fouled within the first few seconds of the contest. This fouling permitted the Resolute to glide into the lead. For part of the first leg the Resolute kept to the fore, but when she hit a soft spot the Irish craft slipped again into first place, edging along until she was half a mile ahead. To the surprise of yachting experts, a fancy little staysail rigged on the challenger served her better than the Resolute's big balloon.

Spectator craft grouped at the first turn greeted the Shamrock with tooting whistles, as she rounded 600 yards in the lead. Away on the second leg she sped, with the challenger catching

THE SILENT POLICEMEN

To the Editor of The Mail:—

Dear Sir—In regard to the matter of Silent Policemen, about which there was some discussion in the papers last evening, I would like to place myself on record against the old arrangement and in favor of the new.

The new system serves all useful purposes of the old, viz., to prevent vehicles cutting the corners near the right curb. At the same time the new method avoids two difficulties which have made the one policeman system a nuisance, the streets of Fredericton not being wide enough for the old arrangement.

The old way forced vehicles to take too long a time in turning the corner, increasing the danger of their being hit by faster moving vehicles going straight across the corner.

It made the turn so sharp that a long vehicle could scarcely make the turn at all clear of the policeman, without backing up to get pointed straight for the next street.

The Resolute made a brave showing at the beginning of the third leg and picked up at the turn fought her way home under the guidance of Charles Francis Adams, Jr., disputing every second. But it was no use and by the time the Shamrock crossed the line it was certain that she had won by a safe though narrow margin.

The yachts expect to race again tomorrow.

For Constructing Pavement,
City of Fredericton, N. B.

NOTICE TO BIDDERS.

Sealed bids or proposals for construction of Street Pavement, addressed to City of Fredericton, N. B., and endorsed "Proposal for Construction of Street Pavement," will be received at City Hall, Fredericton, N. B., until 12 noon of the 31st day of July, 1920, and at that time will be publicly opened and read.

For convenience of bidder, the Engineer of the City will be on the ground for five days previous to date of letting, to go over the work with bidders who may desire to do so.

All bids must be made upon blank forms of proposal annexed hereto, should give the price for each item of the work proposed in writing and in figures, and be signed by the bidder with his business address and place of residence.

Each bid must be accompanied by certified cheque drawn and made payable to the order of the City of Fredericton, N. B., for the sum of one thousand five hundred dollars (\$1,500.00) such cheque to be returned to the bidder unless forfeited under the conditions herein stipulated. This cheque shall not be enclosed in the sealed envelope containing the bid, but shall be delivered to the Common Clerk, who will give proper voucher for the deposit.

A bond in the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) with a Surety Company, as surety, will be required for the faithful performance of the contract. The Surety Company must be satisfactory to the City of Fredericton, N. B.

The party to whom the contract is awarded will be required to present forthwith to the City of Fredericton the name of the sureties to be offered, and to execute the contract and furnish the bond, duly executed, with satisfactory sureties, within ten days (not including Sunday) from date of the mailing of a notice from the City of Fredericton to the bidder, according to the address given by him, that the contract is ready for signature, and in case of failure or neglect to do so, will be considered as having abandoned the contract to the City of Fredericton.

All bids will be compared on basis of Engineer's Estimate of quantities of work to be done, as follows:

ITEM 1.—All Earth Excavation from surface to a depth of eight (8) inches below top of concrete gutter.

Excavation, 3,227 cubic yards.

Pavement, 15,000 square yards. These quantities are approximate only, being given as a basis of comparison of bids, and the City of Fredericton reserves the right to increase or decrease the amount of any class or portion of the work, as may be deemed necessary by the Engineer, and to reject any or all bids, or to accept any bid, should the City of Fredericton deem it for its interests so to do.
