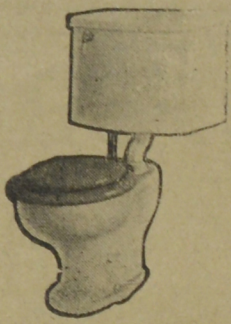

BLACK BEAR ESCAPED FROM THE N. Y. ZOO

New York, May 26—"Black Prince" pride of the Bronx Park bearhouse since January 1919 when he was brought down from Canada and given to the New York Zoological Society as the finest specimen of short legged Canadian black bear in captivity was shot at sunrise yesterday after seven and a half hours of continuous misbehaviour. Before his semi-bullet-proof hide was punctured by the fatal shot he had scaled a ten foot picket fence and escaped from his cage, run wild around the park and surrounding country caused a score of policemen to remain on duty all night and defied Eugene Lewstich head night keeper, formerly his close friend.

Lewstich was down near the bear house at 10.30 o'clock Saturday night when Black Prince was making his escape. The keeper saw the animal lift his 300 pounds over the top of the steel picket fence and immediately raised a cry that aroused both Peter Romanoff, keeper and Walter Toomey assistant keeper, Herman Merkle the park forester came running too and presently there was a force of twenty employees and cops ready to take up the pursuit.

Rifles were passed out and the chase started.

"We picked up his trail at the edge of the Bronx River inside the park. Romanoff explained last night. "Then we lost it and fearing he would get outside or that he might attack automobilists entering the park we called out the reserves from Bronx Park station. Policemen were stationed on every roadway and we had others in the passage leading to the Third Avenue elevated railroad station in case the Prince started down town by way of the Interborough."

With that layout of guards it was no fault of the Prince's that he came upon a couple of cops standing watch at Gun Hill road and White Plains avenue a full mile from where he should have been. Later it was learned by Romanoff the cops got nervous and fired a round at the Prince. They hit him, too, for the bullets were later taken out of his hide.

When the chase became too hot the Prince doubled back along the river; wading in the water to fool Romanoff and Lewstich and the eight other guards and cops. It was 7.45 when a horticulturist occupied in blowing little green parasites off the leaves of a fine rose bush in a greenhouse in the Botanical Gardens looked out of the window and saw the Prince approaching. The little green parasites were left alone, to be taken up again and the horticulturist retreated. He led the pursuers to the Prince's hiding place at the river shore and the execution was ordered.

EXPERIMENTS WITH GROWING OF BEANS

Beans Are An Important Truck Crop.

Garden beans are one of the important truck crops and practically every farmer should grow a patch either for sale or for home consumption, according to his location. Being a leguminous plant, this vegetable stores in the soil nitrogen gathered from the air, and the cultural methods generally given to it leave the ground in splendid shape for the following crop, the consumer also has great advantages in buying them as they are a delicacy, they may easily be canned and are considered a very healthful food indeed.

One or More Varieties.

To be profitable and palatable, garden beans should be eaten when the pods are well grown but still green, and this period only lasts during about a week of the plant's life. This is why a succession of sowings is generally made by persons who desire to have this fine vegetable on their table for any length of time. It was suggested that a number of varieties of different seasons, put in the same day, might do as well, and this prompted an experiment at Cap Rouge.

The Cap Rouge Experiment.

The object was to compare the yield of green pods from one variety, sown at four different intervals of about a week, with that of four varieties of different seasons the same day. The results of five years showed that Round Pod Kidney Wax, sown at four different intervals, yielded at the rate of 3139 quarts of green pods per acre, whilst Round Kidney Green Pod, Early Red Valentine, Refugee, sown the same day, yielded at the rate of 3298 quarts per acre.

One Variety Generally Enough

The difference between the two methods was only around five per cent which is practically negligible, and it seems that either will about give the same results. Persons who would rather make only one sowing, and be done with it, will have, of course, to choose varieties of different seasons, whilst others who prefer to sow at intervals of a week or ten days, should take an early variety, such as Round Pod Kidney Wax or Pencil Pod Wax, so as to get the first edible pods as soon as possible.

Save Your Own Seed

Probably the latter way is preferable as ripe beans can be gathered from strong healthy plants each year, for the next, which not only means a saving of money, but, which is quite important, one is thus sure of getting seed of good vitality and of the right strain.

CONSIDER AID TO FISHERMEN

Ottawa, May 27—As a whole session of the pensions committee was devoted today to considering the feasibility of giving loans to place returned men in the fishing business without meeting definite information from the witnesses, W. A. Pound, general superintendent of fisheries, and J. J. Cowie chief of fisheries inspection. It was decided to ask them to make a written report on the chances for returned men in the fishing industry, the cost of equipping a soldier, and the approximate earnings. W. S. Loggie, member for Northumberland, N. B., William Duff, member for Lunenburg, N. S. will also be asked to give evidence to check the written statement.

Vice-chairman Nesbit stated that statistics gathered from questionnaires sent out after the war, showed that there were but 1088 ex-fishermen. Many of these had since gone into other industries. They urged that the government advance loans towards supplying motor boats for Atlantic fishing suitable for one or two men and for trawling ten or twelve miles from shore.

O. C. Turgeon M. P. for Gloucester N. B. gave a glowing account of the progress his fishermen constituents made. "They use sailing boats and are away from home from Monday morning until Saturday night in vessels of from fifteen to thirty tons. With care in painting them the boats last from ten to twenty-five years and cost today between \$1200 and \$500. How many returned ex-fishermen have you down there, asked Colonel Cooper.

Between 1,800 and 1,900 men enlisted and three fourths of them were fishers. All our men are farmers or fishers and generally both. He thought that a government loan could be easily repaid by the men's earnings of five years.

CHALLENGER LAUNCHED AT CITY ISLAND

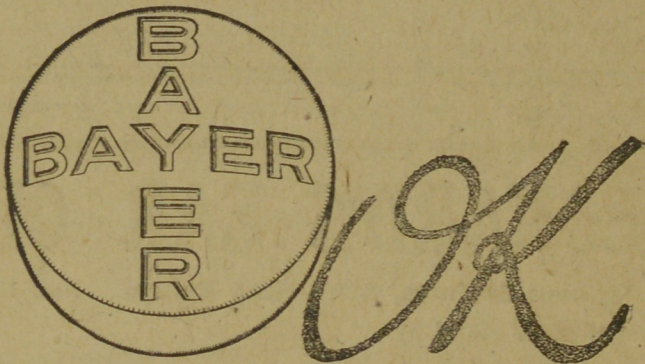
City Island, N. Y., May 29—Sir Thomas Lipton's challenger for the America Cup was launched here at high tide, 7.15 Wednesday at the yards where she has been since last November.

The Shamrock IV looked an entirely different yacht from the one that arrived from England in August, 1914. The yacht's bow and underbody have been changed so much that she never would be recognized by yachtsmen who saw the craft six years ago. Six tons of lead have been cut off the forward part of her fin and "lagged" to the bottom of the keel. Her bow has been changed from a scow to lines resembling an extreme racing cutter. An agree that she has been wonderfully improved.

Although work will be rushed, it is doubtful if the Shamrock IV will be under sail much before next Tuesday.

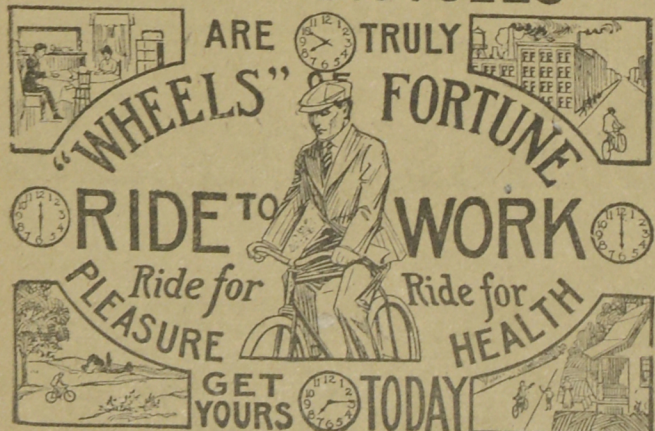
