CABINET RECONSTRUCTION

Sir Thomas White having declined the premiership, Sir Robert Borden has decided to recommend Hon. Arthur Meighen for the position. Sir Robert will formally tender his resignation to the governor general on Saturday morning and Hon. Mr. Meighen will undertake the task of forming a new administration. Hon. N. W. Rowell who was elected as a Liberal-Unionist will retire from the government as will also Hon. Martin Burrill who will become parliamentary librarian. It is expected that the other ministers will remain although a shuffle of portfolios is expected to take place.

Sir Thomas White was summoned to Ottawa from Muskoka on Monday, and strong pressure was brought to bear to induce him to take the leadership. The big interests of the country are behind Mr. White and while liberal inducements were held out to him he stoutly refused to alter his former decision.

Hon. Mr. Meighen will start in at once to reorganize the cabinet and it is generally conceded that he has a stupendous task before him. The government is in bad with the people and it will not be easy for him to find suitable cabinet material. The retirement of Premier Borden leaves the Maritime Provinces without a minister and at least two will have to be chosen. Mr. Wigmore of St. John is talked of for the New Brunswick vacancy and Hon. F. B. McCurdy, a Halifax man who represents Colchester, may be taken in from Nova Scotia. As the government has only three supporters from Quebec, two of whom are now cabinet ministers, it will be difficult to strengthen the administration in that province. Ontario and the Western provinces also present their problems and take it all in all the task before the new premier is not one to be envied. It is only a makeshift arrangement and the government which he forms will disappear from the map just as soon as the people get a chance at it.

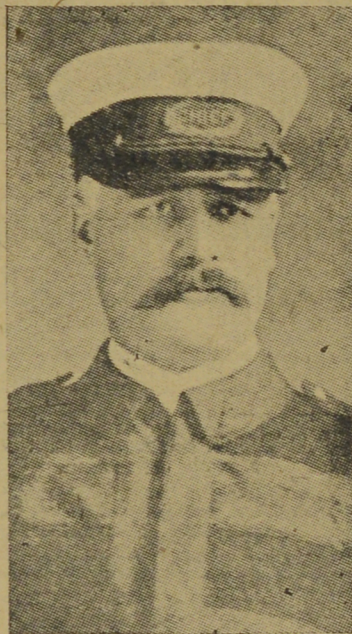

Head of Moncton Police Force is Anxious That the Present Act Should be Sustained Saturday.

George R. Rideout, chief of police for the city of Moncton, who knows the conditions arising from the sale of liquor as few but police officers can know them, advocates the retention of the prohibitory act. In a recent

letter to the president of the Temperance Alliance he wrote: "I am anxious that this act should be sustained by a substantial majority. It has been said that more liquor has been sold under prohibition than under the Scott Act. My experience has not shown this to be the case and, apart from this, I am of the opinion that it is better that the sale of liquor should be confined to bootleggers than that it should be sold openly and given sanction of the law."

 operating with the City in the matter of a memorial. He thought the County should assess for a small memorial for each parish. If the city had the only one in the county many people would never see it.

Coun. Flemming stated that he felt the Parish of Canterbury would favor a memorial of its own.

Coun. Graham stated that many of the churches in the various places were putting up memorials of their own.

Coun. Seymour thought that the County had its hands full at present. If the memorial were to be built he favored the County cooperating with the city.

Coun. Dougan stated that he wished to correct the existing idea that the Hospital fees were excessive. He stated that they were not as high at Victoria Hospital as in other parts of the province.

Varying Opinion

Coun. Kelley was in favor of cooperating with the City. He stated that from time immemorial it had been customary to erect memorial and he thought it would be to the credit of all to have a memorial erected. While speaking for the fallen, the living must be remembered as well and he thought they should be cared for first. Later a memorial could be fixed up. He stated that as the majority of soldiers fought on foot he could not favor the idea of the monument of a soldier on horse-back, which he had seen in a downtown window in this city, as a memorial.

Coun. Manuel and Coun. Cowperthwaite stated that with all honor to the fallen heroes, the County was burdened with undertakings and they thought the living ought to be cared for first. They could not see where the Council could expend any money at the present time.

Coun. Stairs said that no doubt the boys at the front deserved all praise but he thought the County could not shoulder such a burden at the present time. Later on he thought the County could stand the expense better.

Coun. C. E. Allen agreed with Coun. Stairs in the matter.

Coun. Christie moved that the city council be informed that the municipal council was not prepared at the present time to join in the War Memorial project. This was seconded by Coun. Murray and carried unanimously.

The Council then adjourned.

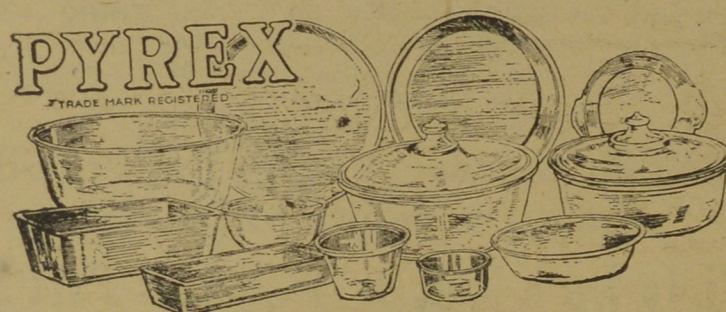

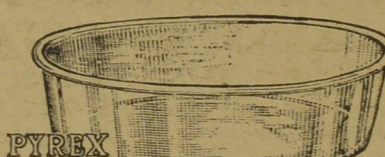
