NO ACTION AT PRESENT ON WAR MEMORIAL BY COUNTY COUNCIL; LENGTHY DISCUSSION

Opinion Varied—Municipal Home Committee Presents Report Which Was Adopted—Committee Congratulated Upon Selection of Pine Grove Property—Hospital Board Delegation Given Hearing.

The York Municipal Council Wednesday afternoon decided that the time was not opportune for the County to take part with the City of Fredericton in the erection of a war memorial to the men of York County who fell in the Great War. The decision was reached after a long discussion which as usual embraced a variety of topics foreign to the subject. Some members opposed cooperation with the City of Fredericton and others favored delay in the matter because conditions might be better in the future.

A delegation from the Trustee Board of Victoria Public Hospital was heard on behalf of financial assistance for the extension of that institution. The suggestion was made that two committees from the Municipal Council and the City Council meet jointly and discuss the matter.

The report of the committee on the Municipal Home was received and adopted.

P. J. Hughes

P. J. Hughes President of the Board stated that at the present time the situation at the Victoria Hospital was a very serious one all the space being utilized and even the corridors used. The speaker referred to the donation of the late Donald Fraser and stated that the Fraser Memorial Hospital was for the use of those who could pay their way and only those. This did not fill requirements as there was great necessity of room for those who could not pay viz: free wards. Another crying need of the hospital was the need of a Maternity Wing. He stated that when it was seen that these things were necessary the question of upkeep was considered and a Nurses' Home was also found to be required. New conditions of the Hospital would call for an enlarged staff and the present building would have to be rebuilt and the Contagious Wing moved farther away from the main building.

The speaker referred to the delegations of the Hospital Board which had waited on the City Council and stated that as it was a community need the County Council was also asked to do its share in the work.

Dr. W. C. Keirstead

Dr. W. C. Keirstead followed Mr. Hughes as speaker. He congratulated the County Council upon the step it had taken with regard to the Municipal Home stating that it was a very commendable work. Proceeding he stated that not only the people of the County of York and City of Fredericton had been accommodated at the Hospital but people from various other counties of the Province. Some of this latter class were unable to pay and their municipality was assessed for their upkeep.

The speaker referred to the conditions which had arisen at the Victoria Hospital outlining the plans of the Hospital Board after work on the Fraser Memorial Hospital had been started. He stated that unless the County and City Councils financed the expense of the building of a new power plant for the new building as well as the old, the Victoria Hospital Board was up against it.

Mayor J. A. Reid

Mayor J. A. Reid, following Dr. Keirstead, stated that as a representative of the City Council he would ask that a committee from the County Council should meet with one from the City Council in working out and devising ways and means of helping the Hospital Board.

Dr. W. H. Irvine

Dr. W. H. Irvine was the next speaker. He referred to the fact that the Hospital was handicapped because of lack of available room as well as equipment. When conditions were righted at the Hospital the City of Fredericton and County of York would be in a possession of one of the finest hospitals in Eastern Canada. He did not see how business men could concern themselves with questions of expending money when the public welfare was at stake. The speaker referred to the huge expenditure yearly and stated that the new building would make a large saving. He congratulated the Council upon its humanitarian work.

Chas. A. Sampson and Dr. C. C. Jones were also heard in the matter. Dr. Irvine following referred to the money making value of the Maternity Hospital.

The plans for the proposed new building were then discussed. Warden Everett at the close of the

hearing assured the speakers that their request would be given due consideration.

Municipal Home

Coun. Walker for the Municipal Home Commission presented the report of that body which made the choice of Pine Grove Farm as the site of the Municipal Home. The report was received and adopted as read.

The commissions report suggested that a bond issue of \$20,000 be made for the purchase of the building and repairs to the same.

A suggestion was made by Coun. Lawson that the Municipal Home Commission give an invitation to the Council to inspect the site.

Coun. E. H. Allen congratulated the members of the Commission on their selection. He stated he had visited the Northumberland County Municipal Home and had found it in excellent condition and the inmates well cared for. One room of this home was used for maternity cases. A sub-committee of management looked after all the business the whole Commission meeting only once a year.

Definition of Pound

The definition of a proper pound was asked by several members of the Council and the County Solicitor was asked to look the matter up as some trouble had evidently arisen in several of the various parishes with pound-keepers.

An invitation was extended to the Council by the Farmers' Co-operative Creamery Ltd. to inspect its plant. On motion the inspection was set for Thursday morning at 9.30 o'clock.

War Memorial

Coun. Brewer referring to the delegation from the War Memorial Committee stated that it would be only fitting for the County to assist in the War Memorial for the fallen soldiers. The question of a Memorial was one that had to be grappled with and he stated that if it were left to the various localities it would never be done. He favored co-operating with the City of Fredericton in the plan.

Coun. E. H. Allen agreed with Coun. Brewer in all that he had said.

At a previous meeting a committee of three had been appointed and the committee of which he had been a member had considered prices and monuments. As to co-operation he favored something done locally but had not yet formed an opinion. Something must be done to commemorate the fallen youth and manhood of the county. As far as he knew the town of Marysville would erect a monument of its own.

Warden Everett thought the matter should receive great consideration as nothing was more suitable at the present time than a memorial for the noble dead.

Coun. C. E. Allan stated that he knew some members of the Council favored a building as the form of a Memorial.

Ex-Coun. Pat Graham was then called upon for his ideas in the matter. Referring to the Victoria Hospital question he stated that he had never approved of the system. People who were in medium circumstances were often bled professionally by high fees for professional service from the doctors.

Coun. Robert Graham did not favor the idea of the Municipal Home. He deplored the fact that in January when the Municipal Home question came up all the Councillors did not vote in the matter.

Coun. Dougan, for the medical profession, stated that Coun. Graham had used the stated that on the American side the doctors were more lenient in charges than in this country. Coun. Dougan explained the situation in Bangor and stated that what was given to the Hospital would be given to one of the best causes to which the Council could give.

Coun. Robert Graham stated that he had gone through the Victoria Hospital on Monday and with the Matron had visited a man in the institution with a broken back. He stated that the care which was given the man could never be given at home. He had noticed that the Hospital was crowded.

With reference to the Municipal Home Coun. Brewer stated that the Commission could not have made a better bargain anywhere in the Province.

Coun. Cowperthwaite thought the Commission's choice was an ideal one.

Coun. Murray favored the idea of a War Memorial.

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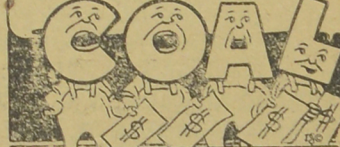
