"Where you get the liquor these days and what you pay for it I don't know," retorted the still unmollified Mrs. Bishley.

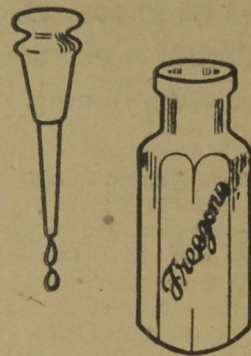

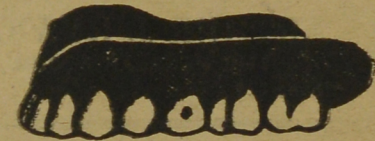
