**Pres. John G. Weetz Makes an
Appeal—Opposition Expected—N. T. A. Had to
Meet Situation.**

(Boston Globe)

The new time allowance rule that is to be in force on tracks in membership of the National Trotting Association which gives an outclassed horse two seconds a year, is believed by most men interested to be sound legislation, and if given a trial will prove of benefit to the sport.

That it does not meet with the favor of all is not strange for the bitterness that is being put into the fight to wreck the N. T. A. goes to extreme lengths and all that comes from Hartford is denounced as harmful.

The old time allowance rule has with very few exceptions found favor from all, although it was decried before it was put into operation. Some of the keenest minds in the sport have had only criticism to make of it, that it did not go far enough; that two seconds a year rather than one should be given.

Allowance Rule

The rule as it now reads in the N. T. A. code is, "Section 5. After a horse has acquired a winrace he shall be allowed whether raced or not, two seconds for each calendar year until he reduces it, but the limit shall not exceed three years or six seconds. At the beginning of each year a horse is entitled to his full allowance and can start in a class, to which he is eligible, with said allowance added to his winrace. This allowance however, does not waive the application of Rule 7, Section 2, after a horse has been given the benefit of the time allowance to which he is entitled, or allow him to start in a race after he has won in one second or more faster than the class advertised prior to the closing of entries. No other time allowances shall be permitted. A nominator is required to claim time allowance when making entry."

Section 7. When a horse with a winrace, made on a mile-track has started on a half-mile track and won within four seconds of same, if he was entitled to any allowance under Rule 7, Section 6 he forfeits same just as a horse forfeits his allowance under the same rule on a half mile track when he reduces his win race on a mile track. He is however still entitled to the allowance between his mile and half-mile track winraces when entering on a half-mile track.

Pres. Weetz's Comment

John G. Weetz, President of the National Trotting Association, has until now had nothing to say concerning the attacks that the sponsors or publicity agents of the new association formed at Syracuse have made on the older turf governing body, but is out with the following open letter:

"The National Trotting Association has looked after the interests of its members and harness horse racing generally for many years and, as the pioneer association has been compelled to hew the way to meet situations as they arose, and how well they have done this the members can testify. Unless the members are supported and provision is made to secure the necessary horses they cannot sustain themselves financially or otherwise. Such a condition would ruin the horse interests and it is therefore necessary in considering the adoption of changes in rules to have in mind all interests and not only one.

New rules, or changes therein, always find some dissatisfied and destructive critic and often for selfish motives, but how well the National Trotting Association has taken care of your interests and the kind of service you have received from its officers you can best determine, and it will be the purpose hereafter to continue the good service that you have received in the past."

**M'LEAN LOST
SKATING TITLE
IN NORWAY**

**Mathiesen Too Fast for the
American—Claimed the Air
was Too Light in Long
Distance Event.**

Christiania, Feb. 10—Oscar Mathiesen of Christiania has won the world's ice-skating championship from Robert McLean of Chicago. The final races of the series were held Monday and Mathiesen captured both of them—the 1500 meters and the 10,000 meters. On Saturday the American took the 5000 meter event, while Mathiesen defeated him in the 500-meter sprint. The contests were held in cloudy

weather but the ice was in good condition. There was enough wind however today to prevent new world's records for the distances. The royal family with the American Minister and his wife, were in the royal box.

In the 1500-meter event, McLean started out like a whirlwind, making the first 500 meters in 40 5-10s. This surpassed Mathiesen's world record of Saturday, which was 43 3-10s. But the American apparently overstrained himself in this burst of speed and Mathiesen succeeded in passing him, winning by a fraction of a second. In the last contest of the series, the 10,000-meter, McLean was badly beaten. He said he was handicapped in this

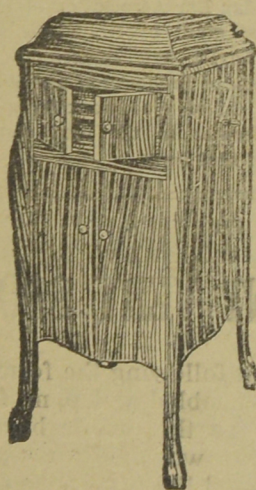

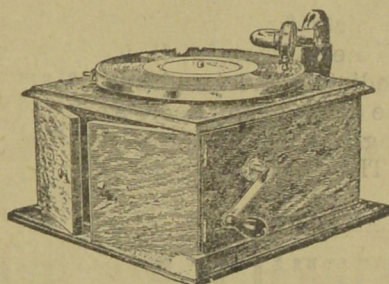
