THE PUBLIC CONSCIENCE.

These passages occur in a speech delivered by the Attorney General of Saskatchewan, Hon. W. F. A. Turgeson, in the debate upon a measure which he introduced in the Assembly at Regina last week with a view to better enforcement of laws against the sale of liquor.

"A new public conscience must be created in our province. All attempts to carry this law out will fail unless those who have at heart the principles of it start to create a new public conscience among our people. In this democracy of ours we must have the spirit of the Romans of old. I speak particularly now to the minority, those who believe the law is wrong. The old Romans, faced with a law with which they were not in sympathy, said 'It is a hard law, but it is the law.' And that was the end of it. We must have that spirit in this day."

In commenting upon the above, the Sydney, N. S., Record says:

"Perhaps Saskatchewan is not the only province in Canada in which Mr. Turgeson's words should be heard and heeded. In many parts of the Dominion indeed there is evident need of such a change in public conscience as would impel greater respect for all law simply because it is law. If every man is to respect only such enactments as he himself approves, and is to put his own will above all other laws, the outcome, of course, must be widespread lawlessness, since men differ so greatly one from the other in understanding and in desires. The truth needs to be driven home in Canada that obedience to law, and to every law while it remains upon the statute books, is an essential in which no man may be lacking and remain wholly a good citizen. Too many of use are apt to think that the law which stands in the way of our own wishes was meant for the other fellow, but every disrespect for law carries with it its injurious effect."

POTATO PRICES.

In commenting on potato prices in Montreal, La. Presse of that city has this to say:

"Potatoes are being retailed today in Montreal at more than four dollars a bag of 90 lbs. The Board of Commerce knows it—and does nothing. Perhaps it is just as well, as its interference might only give the profiteers ground to exploit us further. We know enough of its disposition towards the consumers—after what happened in the matter of milk, bread, sugar, pork and other elementary products. The price of these products has continued to increase ever since the board went through the motion of attempting to control them. But it is very curious—we would say it is despairing—to realize that the price of potatoes in the province of Quebec has increased more and more as the production has become greater. In face of the statistics, what becomes of that beautiful theory that increased production will result in a diminution of cost? Evidently, there is something wrong somewhere. It is the duty of the public bodies to find a remedy as soon as possible."

TWO HUNDRED CASES OF FLU AT MONCTON

Disease is of Mild Type—Three New Cases at McAdam—Millville and Penniac Report Cases.

The Department of Health today reported that two hundred cases of influenza of a mild type had been reported from Moncton. Precautions are being taken there. Three new cases of influenza were reported from McAdam. This makes a total of nine cases in a population of about two thousand. A nurse was sent to McAdam from St. John. A report that there was a general call for nurses for McAdam is incorrect.

Dr. J. A. Wade, D. M. H. O., was at Millville yesterday. Several cases of a mild type exist in that place. The same is true at Penniac although one death resulted there.

Dr. Wade will go to McAdam to-night and to Penniac tomorrow.

NAME DEBS FOR PRESIDENT

New York, Feb. 11.—While Republicans and Democrats are casting about for Presidential timber, with every prospect that their respective candidates will not be known until the conclusion of long drawn out conventions, at least one political party already has agreed on its choice, not only for President, but for Vice-president. This is the Socialist party of America. Its leaders apparently are unanimous for Eugene V. Debs as its Presidential candidate, and Kate Richards O'Hare as its vice-presidential candidate. Both are now serving prison sentences for violation of the espionage act. Debs was Socialist candidate for President in 1900, 1904 and 1908. Mrs. O'Hare was a noted educator.

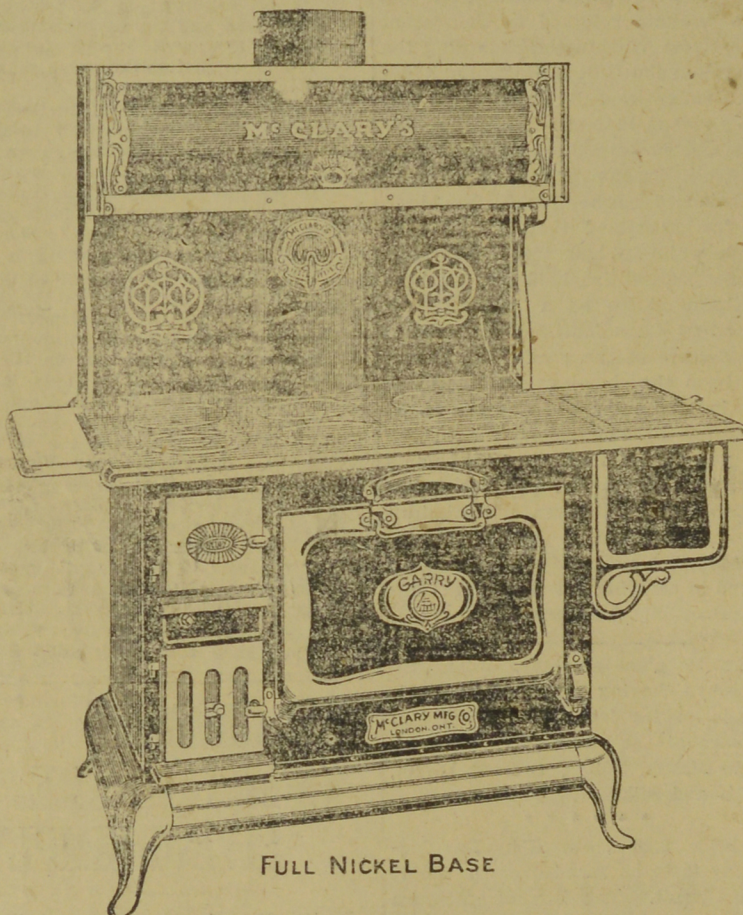

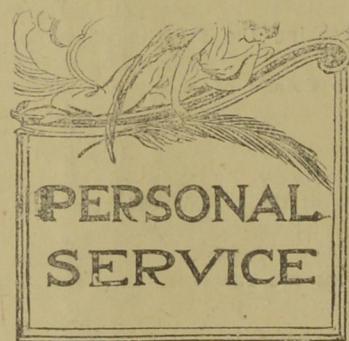
