

UPHAM LUMBER PROPERTY SOLD TO FRASERS

GEORGE W. UPHAM HERE
THIS WEEK ON THE DEAL

Two Sawmills and Large Holdings in Timber Leases to be Transferred—Price About \$100,000.

Mr. George W. Upham, ex-M. P. P. of Woodstock was in the city on Monday and it is said that while there he practically closed a deal with Fraser Companies Limited for the sale of his mills and lumber lands at Summit on the line of the N. T. R. The purchase price has been agreed upon and it is understood that the transfer will be completed in the course of a few days.

In Victoria County

Mr. Upham is the president and manager of the Upham Lumber Company which concern has been carrying on a large and profitable business in Victoria County for a number of years. The company owns two well equipped saw mills and holds a large tract of valuable timber land under lease from the New Brunswick Railway Company.

About \$100,000

It is said that the purchase price is in the vicinity of one hundred thousand dollars. The purchase will include the present winters cut of lumber which is in the vicinity of six million feet.

Get New Manager

The United Farmers' Co-operative Co., of Centreville has secured the services of P. L. Folkins of St. John as a local manager in the place of F. J. Brewster resigned.

Smythe Street School Open

Dr. T. C. Allen, clerk of the pleas and deputy attorney general has been granted six months leave of absence by the provincial government on account of ill health. For the past two months the doctor has not been in regular attendance at his office but he has kept closely in touch with what was going on. His many friends and the public generally sincerely hope that the end of the period of rest which has been granted him he will be able to return to work with his health completely restored.

Fight in Lumber Camp

A free fight occurred yesterday in a lumber camp not far from Blackville. One man is reported to have been seriously injured about the head. The report to Chief Inspector W. D. Wilson is that a number of men of French extraction employed at the camp, made a journey to Chatham and there secured prescriptions for liquor from physicians. They returned to the camp with the liquor and a general spree with fighting followed. Two liquor sub-inspectors went to the camp last night to investigate. The camp is said to be on an operation of the Nashwaak Pulp and Paper Company.

Representatives of Women's Missionary societies of the Anglican, Methodist, Baptist and Presbyterian Churches held a joint meeting in the parlors of the Brunswick Street Baptist church yesterday afternoon. There was a good attendance and the work carried on by the different churches was discussed and plans formulated for the future. Mrs. F. A. Good rendered a vocal solo which was much enjoyed. The ladies of the Baptist Missionary Aid socially served tea at the close of the meeting and were tendered a hearty vote of thanks for their hospitality.

The sisters are Mrs. Fred Jewett of Boston, Mass., Mrs. Thomas Jones of Fredericton and Mrs. Alfred Carson of Parker's Ridge. The funeral will take place at 2.30 p. m. Thursday afternoon, Rev. G. M. Young conducting the service. Interment will be made at the Rural Cemetery.

COMMERCIAL CLUB ENDORSES LOCAL BUREAU

ASKS PROVINCE TO TAKE
OVER THE SERVICE

Dr. J. W. Robertson Addressed Club Last Night on Experiences in France—Boy Scout Movement.

The York Commercial Club at its regular meeting last night had the pleasure of listening to an address by Dr. J. W. Robertson of Ottawa. Dr. Robertson gave several instances of his experience in France during the stirring days of 1916 and 1918 and drew interesting word pictures of the French and Italian characters. He paid a warm tribute to both the French and Italian soldiers and citizens and stated that people in Canada were too apt often to judge the citizens of these countries by the types of Italian and other labourers whom we often see working on the railways and streets of our cities. Dr. Robertson stated that the people in France and Italy including the King and Queen had expressed to him their warm appreciation of the services rendered to the Allies by the Canadians.

Dr. Robertson dealt at some length with the Boy Scout Movement in Canada and made a strong plea for public support in aid of that organization.

Employment Bureaux

A resolution was moved by G. W. Brown seconded by Harry W. Thorne asking the Provincial Government to assume control of the Employment Bureaux throughout the Province at present conducted under the supervision of the Dominion Government. This resolution which asked that the present officials in the organization be retained was unanimously passed by the Club.

Local Improvement

Col. W. J. Osborne introduced the matter of the city giving better attention to the shade trees and also to the Old Burying Ground where the walks and lawns have lately not been of much credit to the City. It was decided to ask the Local Improvement Association to co-operate with the Commercial Club in the view of having some improvement made along these lines.

A hearty vote of thanks was extended to Dr. Robertson for the excellent address which he delivered.
