DR. MOREHOUSE INJURED IN AN EXPLOSION

**GAS WAS IN GENERATOR
HE WAS CHARGING**

**Windows, Registers and Doors
Blown Out—Dr. Morehouse
Severely Burned About
Face and Head.**

Dr. O. E. Morehouse ex-M.P.P., of Keswick was painfully injured in an explosion at his residence last night. Today he is confined to his bed and probably will not be about for some days.

Last night Dr. Morehouse began to charge the acetylene gas machine which is installed in the cellar of his residence. He was under the impression that the machine was empty of gas and carried a lantern with him. The gas was ignited and the explosion followed blowing windows out of the cellar, the registers out of the floors the cellar doors open and breaking two windows in the house itself. Dr. Morehouse received the full force of the burning gas and was badly burned about the face and head. His eyesight however, was uninjured and his escape from further injury little short of miraculous.

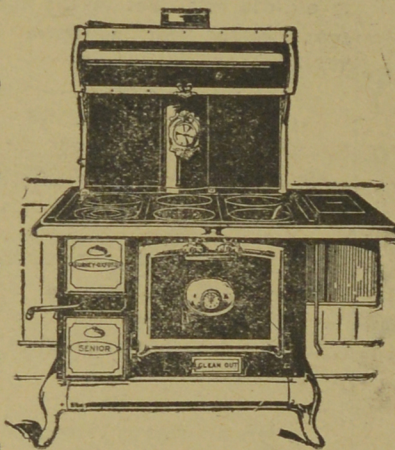
