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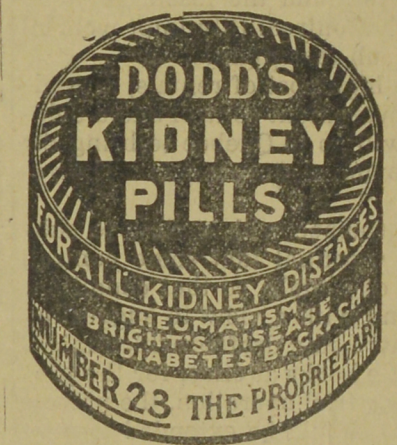

MARYSVILLE BEAT BATHURST

7 TO 3 IN INTERESTING GAME

Whether due to the experience gained on the barnstorming trip to Sackville and Moncton and butting up against the Eastern League teams or not, Marysville looked like a different team when it beat Bathurst 7 to 3 at the Arctic Rink last night. The result of the game clinched Bathurst's title to the cellar position in the N. B. H. L. standing and gave Marysville an even break in the percentage.

As in the game against Fredericton the visitors showed they could not last the full time and their showing in the third period was dangerously near the blowing up point. With the score only 3 to 2 against them the Bathurst players could score but one lone tally in this part of the match while Marysville punctured the Black and Orange defence four times.

The Marysville team making its first local appearance in club uniforms of Blue and White looked distinctly good and if it plays in the form displayed last night any team which gets away with it on Arctic Rink ice will have to go some. "Bingo" Harrison was on the ice for Marysville for the first time here and played well. The winning team worked in three substitutes and made the shifts very smoothly. In the net Bathurst played probably the best game he ever did, showing a great improvement over his former playing. At centre Irving Wade made a great difference to the team and scored three of the goals playing his position well.

Bathurst showed the effects of the hard game with Fredericton the night before. The two wings did the scoring, McManus getting two of the three. The defence was away off however and Marysville romped through it again and again especially in the last period.

Heavy Penalizing
Sandy Staples handled the whistle and was severe on penalties. Marysville got the heavy end of them. Clarence Wade getting ten minutes on one occasion. The game was not excessively rough, however.

Close at First

The game started out in a way which would indicate that it was going to be close. Edgar Wade shoved the first one in after fourteen minutes. Clarence Wade followed within two minutes and gave Marysville a lead of two. Before the end of the period Keoughan scored one for Bathurst. The second period was just as close each team adding one to the score. The third period told the tale Bathurst being outskated and seldom being able to take the offensive. Marysville was more than a match for the visitors in skating and stick handling and also worked an effective combination. Bathurst's sole goal was scored by McManus practically unassisted, he shoving the puck in after a rebound from his own shot. I. Wade's steady playing at centre showed up in this part of the match.

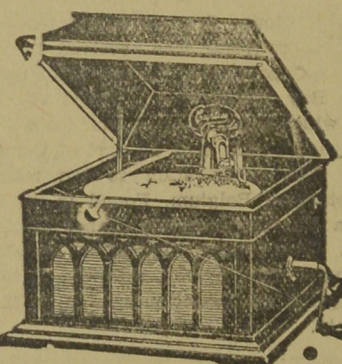
