MUST PREPARE YOUTH OF THE COUNTRY FOR FARM LIFE

Inspiring Address by Hon. Duncan Marshall, Alberta's Minister of Agriculture—Agricultural Training is Canada's Vital Need—Huge Expansion is Coming to the Country—Recruits Must Be Ready For Call to the Land.

Toronto, Feb. 7—"The thing that we need in this country is the gospel of agriculture and some one to preach it. There is going to be an agricultural development such as we have never yet seen, and Canada must be alive to the necessity of training her boys and girls to be farmers if we are to retain our place among the nations of the world." These were the weighty words of Hon. Duncan Marshall, Minister of Agriculture for Alberta, in the course of a speech he gave last night in Weston Town Hall at a banquet given by the citizens of Weston in honor of the newly-elected

Warden of York County, Mr. J. M. Gardhouse.

Foreigners No Menace

To the toast of "Canada our Country", proposed by Mr. A. L. Campbell Mr. Marshall was called to reply. Some people he said had expressed the fear that the foreign element of this country was in danger of becoming a menace to its British-born citizens. Such fears he considered groundless, as 95 per cent of his neighbors are foreign-born and he had not found a better class of citizen anywhere he had gone. "The men from other countries", he said "have found Canadian customs and laws so much better than they expected that they have become among the best citizens that our country has."

Agriculture, Mr. Marshall contended is Canada's fundamental industry as it is of every other country in the world and the salvation of this country and the solution of many of the ill that perplex its people is to be found in the getting of more men on the land. The high cost of living would continue he said, till more kinds of foodstuffs were produced.

Mr. Marshall believes that it is the Government's duty to see that during the next 15 years an effort is made to give boys on the farm the most scientific education possible. "Agricultural education," he said, "has been the most woefully neglected kind of education in the world."

Within the next ten or fifteen years Mr. Marshall predicted a great development and improvement in the live stock industry of Canada. The day of the scrub cow was passing, he said, and farmers were waking to the fact and beginning to keep pure-bred stock.

The finest place in the world the speaker believed to make a home was on the farm; and every institution of learning from the public school up should keep before the boys and girls the business of agriculture.

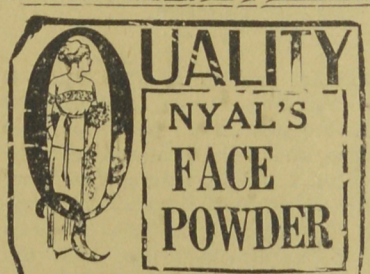
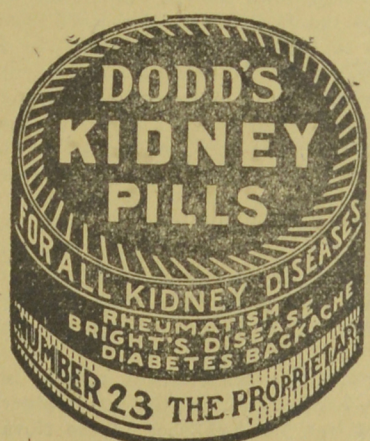
