## AROUND THE TOWN HOW TO TREAT STOMACH TROUBLE

The Census Department at Ottawa according to press despatches this week made a logarithmic estimate of the population of the Dominion and the various provinces, preparatory to the census which will be taken in June next. The population of the Dominion was placed at about nine million which is what is generally expected but that of New Brunswick was placed at 368,760. The "expert" who prepared that figure had better get his logarithms revamped for the census of 1919 gave this province a population of 351,889. The Census thus gives New Brunswick an increase of less than seventeen thousand in the decade. The three cities of St. John, Moncton and Fredericton can show an increase greater than that without taking into consideration rapidly growing towns like Edmundston, Campbellton and Bathurst. This increase is even lower than that which was recorded between 1901 and 1911. There is little doubt that it is incorrect for there is every indication that this province has held its natural increase in population and attracted more people than at any time in the past fifty years. Someone in the Census Department should have his head examined.

The same expert gives Nova Scotia a "logarithmic" population of 718,761. The population of the sister province in 1911 was stated as in the neighborhood of 550,000. The increase therefore estimated for Nova Scotia is upwards of 160,000. On what this rapid growth is based is not stated. There is nothing to indicate that New Brunswick has not added to her population proportionately as fast as has Nova Scotia. A like estimate for this province would give an increase of about 100,000. Persons who have a good acquaintance with conditions in all parts of New Brunswick expect the census returns to show the province with a population in the vicinity of 425,000.

The rodent jumped through a hole which it had gnawed to the floor, a distance of nine feet. The rat then ran to the kitchen with Mr. Jewett in hot pursuit. After a few hours hard work they managed to kill the visitor with the aid of a long iron poker.

The late Justice Haliburton the first American humorist better known as Sam Slick once paid a visit to Fredericton. I'd been up to Fredericton a-speculating in a small matter of lumber, and was returning to the city, a-gallopin' along on one of old Buntin's horses on the ice, and all at once I missed my horse he went right slap in, and slid under the ice out of sight as quick as wink, and there I was a-standing all alone. 'Well! says I, 'What the dog has become of my horse and portmanteau? They have given me a proper dodge; that's a fact. That is a narrer squeak; it fairly bangs all.' "The Clockmaker" was written in the early thirties of the last century and was first published in the Nova Scotian, a Halifax newspaper edited by Hon. Joseph Howe.
