## THE ENDLESS CHAIN

A correspondent forwards to the Sun and New York Herald a copy of an endless chain prayer which has been going the rounds for years and will no doubt be recognized by many readers of this paper. It is as follows:

"The Endless Chain of Prayer

"The Lord bless our sailors and soldiers and keep them in the hollow of Thine hand."

"This was received by me on June 28, 1920, and has been all over the world."

"Copy this and see what happens."

"It is said all who will write it will be taken care of."

"Those who pass it by will meet with some misfortune."

"Start it on the day you receive this chain and write one each day."

"Send it to each of seven people and on the seventh day you will receive some great joy."

"It was started in Flanders Field."

"Please do not break the chain."

"Copy all, 1920."

The correspondent in asking for the editors opinion, says that "the prayer is all right but the threat that disaster is likely to follow any disregard of the request is nothing short of a holdup."

The New York paper in commenting editorially on the chain prayer has this to say:

"In one form or another prayer chains, always with the threat of disaster for those who broke the chain, have given annoyance to the clergy of practically every Christian church in this country."

"At one time the name of the Protestant Episcopal Bishop of Massachusetts was given as an indorser of the chain. Bishop Lawrence went to considerable trouble to make known the fact that he had nothing to do with the appeal."

"Later the Roman Catholic authorities of New York found it desirable to disclaim responsibility for the prayer, the names of some of the church dignitaries having been attached to it."

"Recipients of the prayer should break the chain and thus help to end an ill judged employment of faith in the Deity."

Mr. William J. Bryan made a gallant fight at the Democratic convention for the insertion of a bone dry plank in the party platform but did not succeed. "If you don't get enough alcohol to make you drunk, why do you want alcohol at all?" he is reported to have told the convention. Mr. Burke Cochran of New York tried to have a wet plank inserted but met with no better success than Mr. Bryan. It is strange how politicians fight shy of the prohibition question.

There are seven supreme court judges in New Brunswick and under the bill lately passed by parliament all receive a substantial increase of salary. The two chief justices from now on will have ten thousand a year and the five other judges \$9000 each, in addition to travelling expenses. The county court judges have been granted an increase of \$1000 each.

Work on the streets here has been suspended pending the arrival of a long overdue shipment of cement.

## THE BIG CIRCUS ON JULY 15TH

Among the trained animal acts that the majestic Hagenbeck-Wallace Circus will bring here Thursday, July 15, none will be more interesting than the feats of the pumas, which are said to have been trained with remarkable skill.

The puma, cougar, or panther as it was called by the early settlers of eastern part of the United States, is of the great cat family and generally is from six to eight feet long from the tip of his nose to the tip of the tail.

A century ago, this animal was very plentiful in the states, but now it is rarely met east of the Allegheny Mountains. It may still be found in the Appalachian ranges and in the wilder parts of the Middle West. In southern California, western Oregon and several other districts, a constant war is waged upon the species by the owners of cattle and sheep, in the hopes of exterminating the beasts.

The cry of the male puma is said to be one that will carry terror to the stoutest man, while the female sounds like the wail of a child in agony. While very young the cubs are playful and kittenish but with maturity they develop treacherous qualities. Nevertheless, skilled trainers have developed a sense of obedience in these beasts, as the Hagenbeck-Wallace exhibition will reveal.

Trained animal acts are outstanding features of the program this season and with the equestrian acts, the exhibition is said to surpass all ever accomplished by a circus.

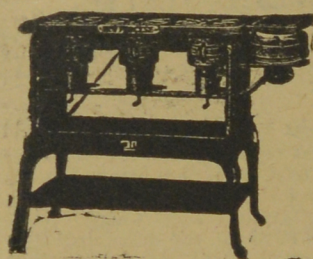
