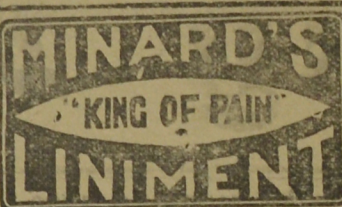

## THINKS U. N. B. BASKETBALL TEAM WONDERS

Transcript Gives College Team  
Most Flattering Reference  
—Score of 44 to 17  
Told the Tale.

The U. N. B. basketball team evidently showed them something in Moncton, according to this very flattering notice in the Transcript:

"In one of the best games of basketball observed in Moncton for some time, the U. N. B. team triumphed over the Moncton team last evening in the local 'Y' in a score 44 to 17, as the U. N. B. boys indulged in speed and their combination was supreme. In the beginning of the game the local team started off with a rush netting 7 baskets but team play on the part of the visitors soon overcame this lead. At half-time the score stood 30 to 11 in favor of the Red and Black team and at the final play 44-17 was marked up against the locals.

"The game started with a rush. Moncton assumed a lead of seven nets but U. N. B. soon overhauled this score and made a bid for supremacy. In the second period the locals made another desperate effort to stop the U. N. B. team but the visitors were not denied Victory who with a tremendous burst of speed practically demoralized their working opponents outscoring them by 27 baskets.

"The U. N. B. team, the winners of the game, approach perfection. Their combination at all times was brilliant. Bridges at centre controlled the ball at all moments and towered above his adversary. Willett the left forward, played a wonderful game and was responsible for many of the baskets, while the work of the U. N. B. guard men was an added feature to the game.

"The U. N. B. team go back to Fredericton today with a triple triumph to their credit—a feat which they may well be proud of—the triple being obtained in defeating the Halifax 'Y' once, the Dalhousie College once, and the local 'Y' last evening."

At the request of a large number of citizens, I have consented to become a candidate for the position of Alderman for King's Ward at the approaching civic elections.

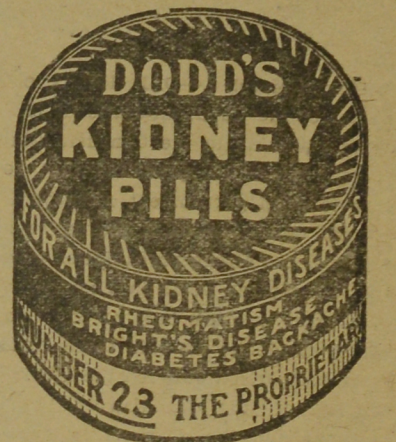

## HALIFAX WON McLELLAN CUP IN YEAR 1909

Truro Lost It Then and Regained it in 1911—Mayflowers Won it in 1913.

Commenting on the Halifax South End curlers winning the McLeLellan Cup at Truro, the Halifax Recorder says:

"It was history repeating itself last night as Halifax previously took the cup from Truro. This was in February 1909 and it was the first win for the Halifax club during the 14 years it had been in competition. On that occasion Halifax won 52 to 40, Kerr winning from Dexter, 16 to 13; Cogswell from McKenzie, 21 to 11, and L. W. Cox winning from A. Costley, 16 to 15.

"Prof. Macneill, A. W. Cogswell, W. A. Major, C. J. Kerr and J. E. Donahoe who played last night, were on the winning Halifax rinks 11 years, C.F. Cox and Frank Dexter were on the same rink in that match, as they were yesterday. G. A. Christie was the only other player with Truro yesterday who was in the game with Halifax in 1909.

"Halifax won the two remaining matches of 1909 from Westville and Hampton. They held the trophy throughout the entire season of 1910 against eight challengers—Mayflowers, Moncton, Truro, Amherst, New Glasgow, Westville, Chatham and Stellarton. In 1911 they won from them in a four rink match, 54 to 48. The Halifax Club had defended the cup for practically two years and had scored 658 points to their opponents 488. The Mayflowers brought the cup back again to Halifax, taking it from Truro in 1913, and it was won from them the same year by Amherst.

"Halifax will defend the cup against Mayflowers and Westville."

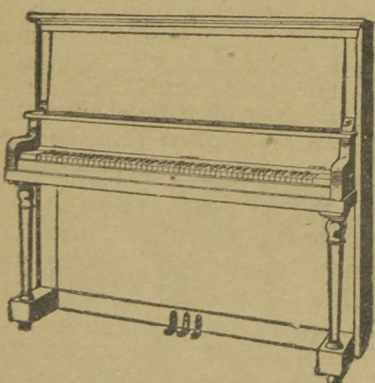
