WHAT'S NEW IN FADS.

Filmy affairs of georgette or chiffon are being worn at the holiday season dancing parties by the younger girls. These are rather high waisted with full skirts billowing to the knees and completed with sleeves tight to the elbow and flaring at the wrist. One novel adornment of such frocks is a drooping bow of chiffon, embroidered in rhinestones, which springs from one shoulder strap.

Brims which have been turned up sharply some time are now turned down, according to London milliners. The brims are not allowed to flop down, however. The fur felt sports hats are fairly high of crown and the brims are made with a steel wire edge to hold them in shape. A big bow at the back is the sole decoration of some of these hats. Others are turned up in the back and down in the front.

The new woolen sport fabrics designed for wear in, to and from the south this season are not only soft in texture but in color. The new shades follow the tints grouped under the name bois de rose, rose tans, rose grays and dusty tans and grays. Green is also an important shade with emphasis on the light tints. The blues usually have a distinct touch of green. The designs include two-toned diamond effects and checks.

Dress designers are insisting now that evening wraps should always recall the dress with which they are worn in color. Thus an evening wrap of a contrasting color should be lined in the same colored satin or lame as the dress. No gathering of smartly dressed women in the evening is complete this season without numbers of ermine wraps so lined. The chinchilla coats and capes are similarly treated.

Fajamas essentially for wear to sleep in are of soft texture and simple of line. Those worn in boudoir privacy to lounge in are strikingly elaborate as to material. The trousers usually are of black satin gradually tightening from knee to ankle and the tops of metal brocade, heavily embroidered. The coats may even be fur trimmed at collar and hem.

One of the most charming of the little French hats just imported is of green fur felt. The crown is high and the sole decoration consists of a huge spike of rhinestones which is thrust through the crown, holding it in three short folds at one side.

PIMENTO BISQUE.

Add two-thirds cup of rice to two quarts of chicken stock and cook in a double boiler until rice is soft; rub through a sieve. Drain one can (seven ounces) pimentos from the liquor in can, rinse with cold water dry between folds of a towel, then rub through a sieve and add to rice; season with one and one half teaspoons of salt and a very few drops of tabasco sauce. Bring to the boiling point and add the yolks of three eggs slightly beaten and diluted with three-fourths cup of cream. Remove from range and keep hot over hot water. Do not allow mixture to continue cooking after adding egg yolks. Serve in bouillon cup with butter crackers made crisp in the oven.

CREAMED CRAB MEAT IN PATTY SHELLS.

Melt three tablespoons of butter in a saucepan, add three tablespoons of flour and stir until smooth and frothy, then add gradually three-fourths cup hot milk and three-fourths cup of hot cream while stirring constantly. Heat to boiling point, season with three-fourths teaspoon salt, add one-half pound crab meat and one-fourth pound of fresh mushrooms (thinly sliced and sautéed in butter) and one small can of pimiento that has been drained from liquor in the can, rinsed with cold water, dried between the folds of towel and cut in julienne strips; add one-fourth teaspoon paprika and use as filling in patty shells or in Swedish timbale cases.

Here and There

Basking in brilliant autumn sunshine, the coast of British Columbia offers a striking contrast to the severe winter weather already making itself felt in other parts of Canada. On the Coast, golf courses are crowded, the ocean is dotted with figures of bathers taking their daily dip, and pleasure craft still ply the waters.

One hundred thousand dollars' worth of Black Fox puppies were shipped to Antwerp on the Canadian Pacific liner "Melita" recently. In specially built cages they will be conveyed by the Dominion Express across Europe to the farm in Switzerland where they will form the nucleus of a fox-breeding establishment.

Another instance of foolhardiness. A recent report from Hull is to the effect that an automobile, travelling at high speed, crashed through both gates at the Chelsea Road level crossing just as they were being lowered to stop traffic so that a light engine should pass. The automobile smashed its way over the tracks barely two feet ahead of the locomotive.

Arthur Edward Shave, in the employ of the Canadian Pacific Railway since August 18, 1908, when he was appointed clerk in the office of the Treasurer, has been appointed assistant treasurer of the company. Mr. Shave became assistant chief clerk in the office of the Treasurer in 1915 and was promoted Chief Clerk in 1919.

The apple is a typical Canadian fruit and among the finest grown in the Dominion. It is incomparable as a Christmas gift for friends and relatives in Great Britain. In order to facilitate shipments, the Dominion Express Company are offering special rates. Standard boxes containing about 150 and standard barrels holding about 375 will be sent from Quebec or Montreal up to the close of navigation to any station on a railroad in Great Britain or Ireland at a cost of \$3 and \$6, respectively.

To perpetuate the memory of the late P. Alexander Peterson where engineers in this part of the country gather, a portrait of the famous engineer, done in oils by the late Robert Harris, Canadian artist, is to be hung in the Engineering Institute on Mansfield street. The late Mr. Peterson, former engineer of the Canadian Pacific Railway, took a leading part in the railway construction in Eastern Canada during the latter part of the last century.

According to a report just issued from Canadian Pacific Railway headquarters, an average of one instance of gross carelessness on the part of automobilists every seventeen days is the record during the last three years and two months in connection with level crossings in New Brunswick, Quebec, Ontario and the Algoma districts. These instances number 69 from September 1, 1922, to October 31 last, or a period of 1,157 days. They resulted in injuries to 53 persons, of whom two died.

Creation of a new industry in Western Canada covering a product which is now imported into this country to the value of about five million dollars annually is foreshadowed by the samples of hemp now on display at the Windsor Station, Montreal, according to G. G. Ommanney, Development Engineer, Canadian Pacific Railway. Mr. Ommanney stated that considerable work had already been done in the West of Canada towards the creation of such an industry. Efforts to promote companies have been made in recent months and there is no doubt that fine stands of hemp can easily be grown in certain districts.

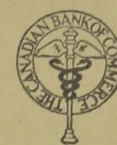
Moncton Prices Lower.

The Transcript has the following on the Christmas market: Large quantities of turkeys were in evidence at the Country Market today. The prices remained the same as yesterday 50 and 55 cents a pound, and showed no indications of dropping although more birds kept coming in. Turkeys are moving slowly this Christmas, sellers reporting more call for chicken this season. In the city stores the prices are slightly higher selling from 55 to 65 cents.

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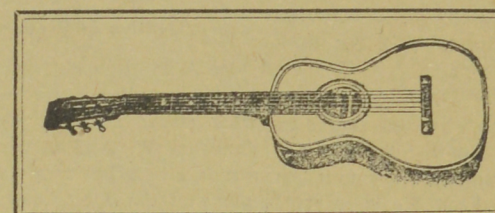

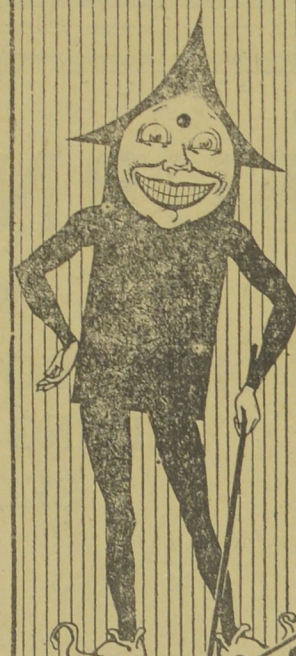
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
