

# EARLE FRASER APPEAL BARRED BY JUDGE SLIPP

Recognizance Not Entered Within Ten Days — No Record of Filing of Notice.

The appeal in the case of Earle Fraser of Keswick sentenced to thirty days in gaol by Police Magistrate Limerick for operating a motor vehicle while intoxicated, was barred this morning by Judge Slipp of the York County Court. This action was taken on the ground that recognizance was not filed in this case within ten days as required by law.

C. L. Dougherty appeared in opposition to the appeal and F. H. Peters appeared for Fraser.

Mr. Dougherty submitted the affidavit of H. G. Fenety to the effect that no notice of appeal had been filed. He also read his own affidavit to like effect.

Mr. Peters in reply said that notice had been given in the usual way and that probably the papers had been mislaid.

Mr. Dougherty then brought up the matter of failing to file recognizance and cited authorities. His Honor then refused to hear the appeal.

Fraser was convicted on September 15th but did not serve sentence. The developments today make it necessary for him to serve the thirty days.

# FINE DISPLAY OF APPLES AT NEW BRUNSWICK FRUIT SHOW; ANNUAL MEETING

Sweepstakes Won by W. P. & F. L. Fox of Lower Gagetown with Box of MacIntosh—Public Invited to Attend the Show—W. T. Macoun of Ottawa, Dominion Horticulturalist, Delivered Illustrated Lecture Tuesday Night—N. B. Fruit Growers' Association in Session.

The New Brunswick Fruit Show, held in connection with the twenty-first annual meeting of the New Brunswick Fruit Growers' Association, is now ready for inspection by the public. The drill hall of the Normal School Annex is being used for both fruit show and meeting. The apples were placed in position last night and this morning the judging began. Many took the opportunity to look at the fruit and tonight the public is specially invited to attend the show. The annual meeting of the Association took place this afternoon. The annual address of the president, W. W. Hubbard, is reproduced in this issue of The Daily Mail.

### Magnificent Display.

The display of fruit is magnificent and is an indication of what is done in the apple growing sections of the province and of the possibilities of expansion of commercial orcharding. The display of apples boxed for shipment is arranged about two sides of the hall. Plate displays are on tables in the centre and there also is a display of apples packed in barrels. The medals won by the Association at the Imperial Fruit Show in London are shown with fruit of the type shown at that time.

The sweepstakes of the show, a five-dollar gold piece, was won by W. P. & F. L. Fox of Lower Gagetown with the box of MacIntosh apples which won first prize in their class.

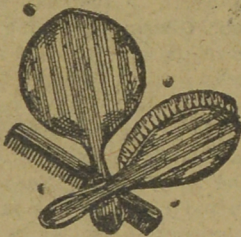

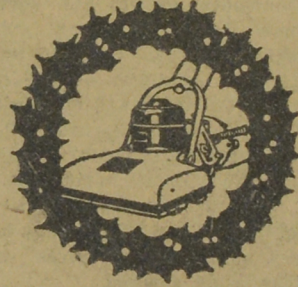
