MY NEIGHBOR SAYS.

Empty talcum powder boxes make handy salt and pepper shakers for the kitchen.

When scissors become dull cut a piece of sandpaper to pieces and see how nicely it sharpens them.

If parchment shades are shellacked and varnished they may be washed with a white soap and water. Brighten with a little furniture polish.

A mode of ascertaining the freshness of eggs is to hold them to the light. If the egg looks clear, it is good; if thick, it is stale. If there is a black spot attached to the shell, it is worthless.

To keep the bread and cake jars sweet rinse them after washing soda has been dissolved. Then set them out of doors in the sun for a few moments.

To improve oilcloth dissolve a pound of glue in a quart of water over the fire; then rub it lightly over the oilcloth with a piece of flannel and leave it to dry. If possible, do this in the evening, so that the oilcloth may not be walked on till the morning. This treatment adds to the durability of the oilcloth, besides improving its appearance.

ORANGE PUDDING.

Sift 2 cups of flour with 4 teaspoons of baking powder and ¼ teaspoon of salt; add 2 eggs well beaten and diluted with 1 cup of milk; beat thoroughly, add 1 tablespoon of melted butter, beat well again, then add 4 oranges peeled, cut into bits and seeded, turn into a buttered baking dish and bake in a hot oven. Serve with orange sauce. Orange sauce: Cream 1-3 cup of butter with 1 cup of sugar, add ½ cup of boiling water, the beaten whites of 3 eggs, the juice of 1 lemon, the juice of 2 oranges and part of the grated rind and beat with an egg-beater until foamy. Serve at once.

CHOCOLATE MACAROONS.

Mix ½ pound of almond paste with ¾ cup of powdered sugar until of the consistency of meal. Add the unbeaten whites of eggs, one at a time, until 3 have been used and work with a spatula on a large platter or marble slab until there are no lumps and mixture is smooth. Add 2 squares of chocolate grated, 1-4 teaspoon of salt and gradually 1 teaspoon vanilla. Continue working until ingredients are thoroughly blended. Drop from the tip of a spoon in small rounds on to a buttered paper placed on the bottom of an inverted dripping pan. Bake in a slow oven (275 degrees Fahrenheit) 20 to 30 minutes. Remove at once from paper. If baked in a hot oven the cookies will not be a success.

"POTATO SALAD.

Two pounds boiled potatoes in jackets, 1 onion, 1 cup diced celery, 1 tablespoon lemon juice, 2 tablespoons olive oil, salt and pepper; crisp parsley, chopped; 2 pimientos 1 for garnishing; mayonnaise. Peel potatoes, cut in slices, grate onion, add celery diced, parsley chopped and 1 pimiento cut small. Season to taste. Add lemon juice and oil. Moisten with mayonnaise. Mix well. Serve on crisp lettuce heart, top with mayonnaise and garnish with strips of pimiento.

HORSES BARRED ON U.S. CAPITAL THOROUGHFARES

Washington, Dec. 30—The horse has been barred from four of the capital's proudest thoroughfares, where not so many years ago he stepped with pride and ease in fashion's daily parade.

Now, he may not enter Sixteenth street between H street and Colorado avenue, Massachusetts avenue between Fourteenth and Twenty-second streets, New Hampshire avenue between Washington circle and U street, nor Rhode Island avenue between Connecticut avenue and North Capitol street.


