DR LANDRY. FINANCIER.

Hon. Dr. Landry, former Provin-  
cial-Secretary-Treasurer and now  
running as an opposition candidate  
in Kent, has been doing some talking  
in public of late, and as was to be  
expected has been giving his views  
on the financial condition of the  
province. If the worthy doctor, in  
the light of his own record as  
custodian of the finances of the  
province were well advised, he would  
not insult the intelligence of the  
people by attempting to address  
them on any particular subject.  
Now that he has seen fit to do so  
and has handed out to the press a  
report of his speech it might not  
be out of order to expose the  
falsity of some of his statements.  
In a speech delivered in Kent  
County a few days ago he made  
the statement that when the present  
government came into power in 1917  
the public debt of the province was  
only \$9,000,000 and he charged that  
they have increased it to \$37,000,000.  
The doctor must have known when  
he made that statement that it was  
not correct. The bonded debt of the  
province on October 31st, 1917, was  
\$5,090,026, and on October 31st,  
1919, it stood at \$6,090,026. Now  
the doctor and his friends claim to  
have built the Valley Railway and  
everybody knows that it cost the  
province over \$7,000,000; they also  
built a number of permanent  
bridges, including the cantiliver  
bridge at St. John, the Morrissey  
bridge at Newcastle and another  
large bridge near Moncton, in addi-  
tion to part of the Fredericton  
bridge, and as the members of the  
government did not pay for these  
structures out of their pockets it is  
to be presumed that the cost was  
added to the capital debt. There-  
fore, it is as plain as A. B. C. that  
the public debt of the province in-  
stead of being around \$9,000,000  
when the present government came  
into power was actually in excess of  
\$15,000,000, and Dr. Landry is  
simply attempting to deceive the  
public by his absurd statement. We  
might also say for his information  
that the actual net debt of the prov-  
ince today is not \$37,000,000 but  
after making allowance for sinking  
funds and cash on deposit at Ottawa,  
is \$29,252,648.81. The great trouble  
with Dr. Landry is that having been  
out of public life for nine years he  
has got quite out of touch with  
conditions and does not know what  
he is talking about.

We notice that the learned doctor  
also made some reference to sinking  
funds and claimed that the govern-  
ment of which he was a member  
had \$700,000 set apart for this pur-  
pose. Premier Veniot in a recent  
speech explained how the trick  
was done, but some further informa-  
tion on the subject might not be  
amiss. We would like to point out  
that in February 1916 when that  
great Napoleon of Finance, Hon.  
Dr. Landry was Provincial  
Secretary-Treasurer, the province  
sold some four and a half per cent  
Valley Railway bonds at 91.21, not  
a very attractive price, and bought  
them back in December of the same  
year at the rate of 98.10, nearly \$7  
per hundred higher; and placed the  
proceeds in a sinking fund. What  
a wonderful piece of financing was  
that! We might add that under the  
old government sinking funds pro-  
duced no revenue, which is not the  
case today.

Dr. Landry, instead of criticizing  
the financial policy of the present  
government, would be better em-  
ployed in explaining to the people  
of the province why it was that a  
million or so of the trust funds of  
New Brunswick were on deposit in  
the notorious and now defunct Home  
Bank of Canada while he held the  
office of Provincial Secretary-  
Treasurer. He might also produce  
copies of the letters which he wrote  
to Sir Thomas White in 1916 en-  
quiring as to the stability of that

institution and the replies which he  
received thereto.  
Possibly the doctor might also ex-  
plain the reasons why he objected to  
Mr. C. D. Richards taking over  
the leadership of the party and he  
might also state whether or not the  
report is correct that he refused to  
serve under Mr. Baxter's leadership  
until given an assurance that he  
would have the right of succession  
in case the party wins in the pend-  
ing election.

POINTS TO CONSIDER.

There are three types of citizens  
common to all countries, who as re-  
gards political issues may be rough-  
ly classified as indifferent prejudic-  
ed or open minded. To the first  
class belong people who have failed  
to realize the true relation of the  
individual to the community and the  
essential interdependence of the one  
on the other, who, in other words,  
are devoid of public spirit; to the  
second those who, steeped in con-  
servatism and wedded to the past,  
cannot bring themselves readily to  
change with the changing times; fi-  
nally in the third category are found  
all who recognize ability and sup-  
port progress where it can best be  
found.

Fortunately the last mentioned  
have usually sufficient power to  
maintain in office men whose honor  
and integrity ensure a well ordered,  
democratic administration of public  
affairs. It is mainly to such thinking  
people, who are earnestly desirous  
of promoting the welfare of their  
country that the government is stat-  
ing its case and appealing for sup-  
port in the coming election. The  
fact should never be lost sight of  
that when ex-Premier Foster ac-  
ceded to power in 1917, he and his fol-  
lowers for a long period had to de-  
vote their executive ability to un-  
ravelling the tangled skein of mis-  
managed Departments left behind by  
their corrupt and discredited pre-  
decessors. The good name of the  
Province had been sullied by politi-  
cal dishonesty and abuse of public  
confidence of a nature that would  
have been incredible had not the  
naked truth been revealed beyond a  
doubt.

If the present high standing of the  
country's restored credit is compar-  
ed with the disrupted conditions of  
barely eight years ago, what the  
government has accomplished is  
readily apparent to all. Its worst  
enemy cannot point to one dis-  
honorable act during its entire term  
of office. It has faithfully used the  
trust reposed in it for the benefit  
of the people. Its legislation has  
been based on the soundest princi-  
ples of national economy. The acts  
it has placed on the statute books  
are conceived in the best interest of  
social progress. Its methods have  
been admired and copied by other  
countries which desired a model for  
their own guidance. Even the re-  
cently elected government of Nova  
Scotia has nothing but praise for  
the efficient progressive spirit of  
its sister province. Its only concern  
has been to make its people happy  
and what is better still it has known  
how to do it. The time has at last  
come to ask the electors to approve  
not only its record, but also its  
clearly defined policy for the fu-  
ture. The great scheme for hydro  
development at the Grand Falls  
cannot fail to fulfill the fondest  
hopes of its warmest supporters. It  
will ensure a permanent supply of  
cheap electric power both for indus-  
trial and domestic purposes. A  
great natural resource of the Pro-  
vince will remain the property of  
the people, administered to supply  
their needs at cost price and for-  
ever beyond the control of private  
companies, who could use it to  
exact endless tribute at the expense  
of others. It is by its nature a  
monopoly which public ownership  
will effectively maintain to provide  
a sound basis for the prosecution of  
private enterprise, free of corporate  
abuse and extortion. The expense of  
its development is insignificant com-  
pared with the benefits that will re-  
sult. Not one cent will be added to  
the burden of the taxpayer.

The record and policy of the gov-  
ernment is an open book for all to  
read. The record of the opposition  
is also known, while its policy is  
meaningless and futile. A substan-  
tial majority for Premier Veniot will  
open the door to prosperity and  
place the Province on the high road  
to lasting success.

Leader Baxter has been a wobbler  
on the stumpage question. In 1913  
he was a supporter of a govern-  
ment which passed an order in  
council fixing the rate at \$1.50 per  
thousand for a period of ten years.  
In 1919 he voted for a resolution  
in the House the object of which  
was to increase the rate to \$7 per  
thousand.
