### OF INTEREST TO THE WOMEN

#### WHAT SHE WEARS.

Monkey fur is used extensively on satin or ottoman coats, for borders and collars.

Boleros, revers, pockets and fancy vests are new touches that add to the charm of gowns.

Champagne-colored pumps and stockings are worn with white and pastel colored frocks.

The short coat of lowered material is very attractive with the white silk or flannel skirt.

Light delicate beading is very much liked for frocks but the old heavy, massed type is entirely out of date.

Silk serges and surah silks have been revived this season and make most attractive day frocks and coats.

Sleeveless pajamas of yellow silk jersey are hand painted with a design of chrysanthemum. They are cool and comfortable.

#### NEW FALL COAT STYLES.

Women's coats for fall designed and executed by men's tailors which have just been placed on view here indicate that outer coverings of this type will be shorter this autumn and of the boldest designs and colors. Tweeds, Saxones and chevrons in brown and blue predominated while such designs as rag rug, broken trellis, mosaic and geometric designs also were shown. The severe masculine designs were feminized by the flare of the skirts.

#### SHOES REFLECT VOGUE OF PASTEL COLORS.

Shoes of pastel suede in a wide range for exquisite colors are shown for midsummer wear. The smart thing is to have one's hats, shoes, scarf and bag to match. These should be in a shade that harmonizes with the frock rather than match it exactly.

#### LEMON AND RAISIN PIE.

One cup of chopped raisins, seeded; the juice and grated rind of one lemon, one cup of cold water, one tablespoon of flour (one cup of sugar and two tablespoons of butter. Stir slightly together and bake with upper and under crust.

#### RHUBARB PIE.

Trim and peel the stalks, cut into inch lengths and pack in a deep pie tin lined with good pastry. Sprinkle with salt and nutmeg, dredge with flour and add a cup of sugar and half a cup of water. Cover with a top crust, gash and bake.

#### APPLE AND RHUBARB PIE.

Use an equal quantity of rhubarb and apple. Wash the rhubarb strip off the skin and cut in thin slices. The apples should be pared, cored and sliced. Line a pie plate with crust and fill with the rhubarb and apple. Sprinkle over it three-fourths of a cup of sugar, a few bits of butter and a tablespoon of flour. Wet the edges of the under crust and cut in a few small gashes in and near the middle of the upper crust and lay it over the pie. Press it gently to the edge of the under crust and cut off the overlapping portions. Be sure that the edges are well pressed together so that the juice will not escape.

#### APPLE CUSTARD PIE.

Line a pie tin with rich crust, fill with sliced apples, sprinkle three fourths cup of sugar over them and a little cinnamon. Then beat one egg in a cup, add a little sugar, fill cup up with milk and beat. Pour this over apples and bake thirty to forty minutes.

#### MINT SAUCE FOR COLD MEATS.

Four teaspoons chopped mint, two teaspoons powdered sugar, one fourth pint of vinegar. Wash and pick the mint leaves from the stems chop fine and cook all until sugar is melted, let stand three hours and it is ready for use. Better to make it the day before you need it.

## MARTIN MAY RUN AS AN INDEPENDENT

Chatham, July 20—J. S. Martin, Labor representative for Northumberland in the last Legislature has flung his hat into the ring and definitely announced his candidature in the provincial elections to be held on August 10.

In an announcement in a local paper today, Mr. Martin states he will be in the field as the workers' representative and promises fair and impartial support to all classes.

It seems that there will be a three-cornered fight in Northumberland unless Mr. Martin should be endorsed by the Opposition convention which meets at Newcastle Friday. The probability of this does not seem so great as it did several weeks ago, as it appears that the Opposition leaders here feel that the party's ends can best be served by the nomination of four straight Conservatives.

**Idea Appears Dropped.**  
The bringing out of a coalition ticket has been much discussed of late, but now the idea seems to have been dropped and the general opinion appears to be that only single pure Conservatives will be nominated on Friday.

There has been quite a number mentioned as possible candidates, among them being E. W. Watling, Dr. W. B. Jones, J. Y. Mersereau, of Chatham, C. E. Fish, Hubert Sinclair and D. P. Doyle, of Newcastle, Frank Lavoie, of Rogersville, and Akerly Holmes, of Doaktown.

**Conceded Places.**  
Messrs. Watling and Lavoie are conceded places on the ticket and the probabilities for the remainder are in favor of Doyle and Holmes.

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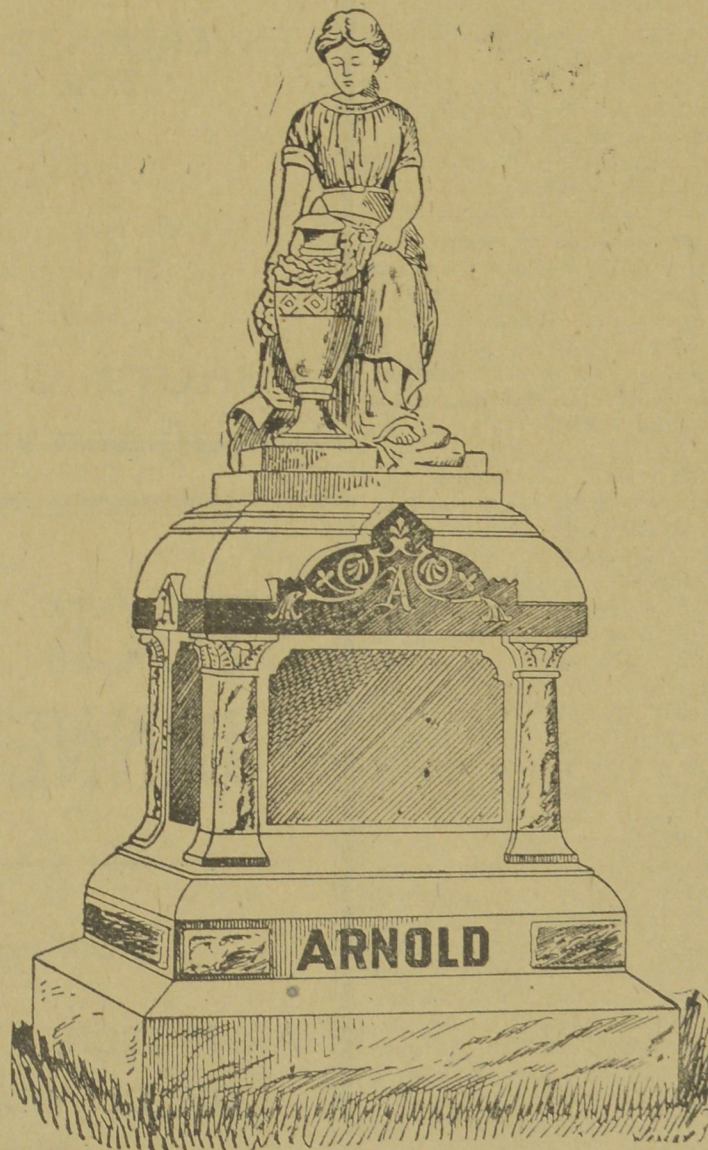
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
