

### FINES PAID IN LOCAL CHARIVARI CASE TODAY

**Expected Defence Was Not Made—The Cross Creek Charivari Case Gets Second Wind on Tuesday.**

Fredericton's charivari case which was expected to rival the famed charivari case from Cross Creek which occupied the police court for four days this week with the end not yet, came to an abrupt close this morning. The four young men who were gathered in by Patrolman Simcock in Albert street early Tuesday morning appeared in the police court this morning and pleaded guilty to the charge of creating a disturbance. It had been expected that the case would be contested. G. T. Feeney who had been retained by the accused as counsel, appeared.

Magistrate Limerick imposed a penalty of a fine of ten dollars in each case or twenty days in gaol. The fines were paid.

#### Cross Creek Cases go Over.

The nine defendants in the Cross Creek charivari case left for their homes Friday evening the cases having been adjourned until ten o'clock Tuesday morning.

The court is still considering the first charge against the first of the accused. The second charge of discharging firearms is still to be heard as are both charges against the other defendants.

The various defendants are being placed on the stand as witnesses and they are receiving severe cross examination from F. H. Peters counsel for the prosecution as they are being called by P. J. Hughes counsel for the defence.

#### Costs Will Be Considered.

The costs of this case will be considerable. The charges are under the Criminal Code. It is said so that the expense will be borne by the public except fees of counsel.

He has been teaching in Petitcodiac recently. He has been selected as one of the delegates to the Presbytery of Saint John in the United Church of Canada to meet at Saint John next week. He is a brother of Robert H. Stuart of this city.

#### Elected Directors.

The first annual meeting of the Nepisiguit Railway Company was held Thursday afternoon in the office of McLellan and Hughes. The provisional directors and shareholders were present. The business done was the election of directors who are Angus McLean, Ethelbert McLean and Red Hugh McLean, of Bathurst. The meeting was adjourned until July 27 at Bathurst when business will be continued.

#### Rushing Coal by Schooner.

Saint John Globe: Probably due to the danger of a coal strike in the United States, in the near future, during the past two weeks many steamers and schooners have arrived in port bringing cargoes of coal. This morning the schooner Ononette arrived from New York and schooner Lincoln with coal. S. S. Christiansberg arrived two days ago with a full cargo of coal for the refinery which she will discharge today at the McLeod wharf. In addition to those that are in there are a number of schooners chartered to load coal for this port.

There is some insurance. The fire is believed to have originated in an ice cream parlor connected with the bakery and a lighted cigarette thrown in a corner may have done that.

### ST. ANDREW'S PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH FORMED

**Site in Charlotte Street Next St. Paul's Manse Given by Mrs. Eliza J. Jewett.**

St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church Fredericton, came into being Thursday night when a congregational meeting was held for the purpose of receiving a report from the Board of Trustees on various matters. One important matter in the report was a recommendation that the donation of a site for a new church made by Mrs. Eliza J. Jewett of this city be accepted. The recommendation was accepted amid enthusiasm on the part of the congregation.

#### Land in Charlotte Street.

The site for the church edifice which St. Andrew's Church will erect at some time, is on the southerly side of Charlotte street near Carleton and immediately adjoins the lot occupied by St. Paul's Manse. It is an excellent situation and is a valuable property. The frontage of 100 feet and the depth 145 feet. An estimated value of \$3,000 is placed on it.

#### Name St. Andrew's Adopted.

The name St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, Fredericton, was adopted on the recommendation of the trustees. The arrangements for the use of the Capitol Theatre for service will be continued. For the accommodation of the women's societies of the church and also for the Sunday School the premises in Queen street formerly occupied that.
