## MINISTERIAL CHANGES.

An Ottawa dispatch of Saturday announced that Hon. A. B. Copp, Secretary of State in the Liberal Cabinet since its formation in December, 1921, had been appointed to the Senate, and that Hon. Dr. W. E. Foster, former Premier of the Province, had been named as his successor. It is understood that the new minister will seek election in the constituency of St. John-Albert. The announcement of the change did not create a great deal of surprise in political circles as it was pretty well known that Hon. Mr. Copp did not intend to seek re-election. Although still a comparative young man he has had a long experience in public life, both in the Legislature and House of Commons, and it can be truthfully said has fairly earned a seat in the reg chamber and the relief from the turmoil of party politics which goes with it.

Hon. Dr. Foster, the new Secretary of State, is one of Saint John's outstanding business men, who has long taken an active interest in public affairs and has already rendered good service to his party and the province generally. He took over the leadership of his party in provincial politics just prior to the election of 1917 and winning a victory at the polls was called upon to form a new administration. Although without any previous experience he accepted the responsibility and it is conceded even by his political opponents that he made a splendid record as an administrator. The government of which he was the head inaugurated many reforms in the interests of the people and placed on the statute book a great deal of progressive legislation. The new Secretary of State has plenty of energy and ability and is endowed with a wonderful capacity for hard work. The Province of New Brunswick, particularly the port of St. John, will have in him at Ottawa an able advocate, who can be counted upon to do everything in his power to advance its best interests. His elevation to the cabinet will undoubtedly improve the government's chances in the new Brunswick constituencies.

The death of Mr. Herbert G. Winter, retired customs official, will be deeply regretted by a very large circle of friends in this city and elsewhere. Mr. Winter had to his credit fifty-four years of honorable public service in the customs department, a record quite unique in the annals of the Dominion. His duties brought him into close contact with many people, who always found him courteous, obliging and trustworthy, and at the same time thoroughly alive to the responsibilities which attached to his important office. When we say that Mr. Winter was an ideal public official we are proclaiming only a simple truth. Being possessed of musical gifts of a high order in his early days he added to the sum of human joy in the capacity of bandsman, bandmaster and member of the Methodist church choir. The death of Mr. Winter deprives Fredericton of a citizen who will be greatly missed.

The sudden death at Chatham yesterday of Mr. William Bunting Snowball, M. P., for Northumberland, has been a great shock to the people of the North Shore counties. The deceased had long been identified with the lumbering industry and was one of the outstanding business men of the province. A little less than a year ago he was elected to Parliament as a Liberal, and sat in the House last session, giving careful attention to the interests of his constituency. A few days ago he was chosen a large convention to carry the Liberal standard in the approaching election. He was a man of kindly disposition and was held in general esteem. His death will be a distinct loss not only to the County of Northumberland but to the entire province.

If there are any adherents of the Conservative party in York-Sunbury not in sympathy with the candidature of Mr. R. B. Hanson they should have attended the convention which nominated him and given voice to their objections. Having failed to do that it is scarcely in order for them at this late date to endeavor to raise a howl against him. As for the convention which tendered Mr. Hanson a unani-

mous nomination it was quite as representative and embodied as much dignity and manhood as any gathering of either party held in this city in modern times, and we have no hesitation in saying that Mr. Hanson is just as honest, just as respectable and has at least as much ability as any standard bearer his party has put in the field here in twenty-five years.

Mr. Thomas W. Purvis, a former resident of Millville, now living at Debec, in a letter to the Mail says that the first exhibition was held in Fredericton in the year 1852. This is in accord with the statement made during the late exhibition by Mr. John A. Campbell, honorary president of the Fredericton Exhibition Limited. Mr. Purvis, like Mr. Campbell, attended the first exhibition and has a distinct recollection of the event. Both gentlemen have turned the 88th milestone.

The campaign being carried on against Mr. R. B. Hanson, M. P., is not of a kind which should elicit the sympathy of any very large number of Liberals who have the welfare of the party at heart. If those responsible for this kind of warfare are anxious that Mr. Hanson should be returned by acclamation they are certainly going the right way about it.

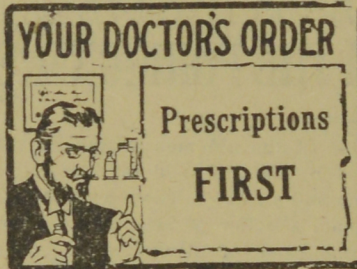

For Polling Division No. 2. (Downtown), the Registrar is James H. Hawthorne, Esq. who will sit at his house, 703 Brunswick Street, from Sept. 25th. to Sept. 30th. inclusive.

Every citizen, male or female, who should vote in either of above mentioned Polling Divisions, may make sure his or her name is on the list by calling on the Registrar for the Division in which they live, and if his or her name is not on the list secure it's addition by making personal application. In the case of eligible voters, who may be sick, disabled or absent from the city, a relative or employer may make application for them.

All who voted at the recent provincial elections are probably already on the list but anyone who was not on the provincial list should certainly make application.
