**PROGRESS BEING MADE UNDER THE
EMPIRE SETTLEMENT SCHEME;
MANY FAMILIES COMING TO CANADA**

Ottawa, July 9—Real progress is being made by the Department of Immigration and Colonization on the new family plan under the Empire Settlement scheme by which 3,000 British families are to be brought out and settled on farms in Canada. Up to date that machinery has brought out 497 families with more in sight for this year, and with more than double that number already arranged for to come out next spring. This number is considered satisfactory in view of the carefully selective process being applied by the staff of officials employed by the Dominion Government in the British Isles. One of the British Overseas Settlement officials, Mr. Banks Armory, is expected in Ottawa next week to confer with Government authorities here in connection with this colonization of British families. From here he will go to Australia as a representative of the Overseas Settlement Board.

Immigration Statistics.
For two months past no statistics regarding immigration, generally into Canada have been issued here, but complete figures for that period together with a careful index tabulation presenting almost every kind of social facts in connection with incoming immigrants will be made public next week.

The reason for the delay is that with the reversion on January 1 last, to the manifest system, which had been suspended since 1919 a larger amount of information about the immigrants is made available

and a considerable time has been required for the Bureau of Statistics to compile this.

16,689 Enter From U. S.

During the fiscal year, ended March 31, last, a total of 16,689 settlers came into Canada from the United States the average cost per head to the Dominion for getting them into this country being \$12.41. In the previous twelve months 20,171 were brought in at a cost per head of \$19.81. The value of cash and effects entered for importation from the United States to Canada in the fiscal year ended March 31, last, was \$9,101,375, as compared with \$4,100,490 in the previous year. In the last fiscal year there were 363 carloads of settlers' effects from the United States entered as compared with 158 in the previous year.

Salaries Paid.

The salaries paid by the Dominion Government to Immigration officers in the United States in the last fiscal year totalled \$73,121.33 as compared with \$91,916.31 in the previous year, and the total expenses of the offices in the United States in the year ended March 31, last, were \$161,755.26, as compared with \$187,878.75. The cost of exhibitions in the United States territory in the last fiscal year was \$37,176.15 as compared with \$50,366.11, and the estimated number of persons seeing the exhibits in the last year was 5,450,751 as compared with 3,419,000 in the previous year. The total number of Canadians returning from the United States in the last fiscal year was 43,775.

**FOX BREEDERS
MEETING ON
P. E. ISLAND**

Charlottetown, July 8—The annual meeting of the Canadian Silver Fox Breeders' Association opened in Summerside today with an attendance of 227 members. There were two from Manitoba; from Ontario, three; Quebec, three; Nova Scotia, four; New Brunswick, 23 and the rest from this province.

J. A. Webster, president, Charlottetown, presided and Secretary J. H. Pritchard read the report of the year's work and the financial statement. Both passed unanimously.

The directors whose terms expired were E. W. Manson, Summerside; John A. Lea, Summerside; J. B. Rombough, Charlottetown; J. Edgar Milligan, Charlottetown and Dr. Leo Frank, Charlottetown.

Those chosen for twelve nominations were J. Edgar Milligan, Charlottetown; Dr. A. A. Lockhart, Kensington; Leonard McKenzie, Truro, N. S., and George Calbreck, Summerside.

Dr. Grisdale, Deputy Minister of Agriculture, Ottawa gave an address.

**BIG PROFITS
FROM LIQUOR
IN MANITOBA**

Winnipeg, July 9—Approximately \$1,000,000 profit was netted by the Manitoba Liquor Control Commission for the eight-month period ending April 30, 1925 it was announced today.

Of the total \$461,522 will be distributed to the municipalities, the City of Winnipeg being the largest beneficiary, securing \$163,110.

It was also announced today the finances of the province, for the eight months' period showed a surplus of \$125,000 as compared with an estimated deficit of \$241,000.

**M'KENNA DUTIES
NOT TO BECOME
RETROACTIVE**

London, July 9—The reimposed McKenna duties, which became effective July 1 denying among other schedules a 33 1-3 percent import tax on automobiles, will not be retroactive, Chancellor of the Exchequer Churchill announced in the House of Commons today. This will mean a saving to the importers or buyers of American automobiles which have been rushed into England since April 28, when it was announced the McKenna duties would be revived.

During the few days preceding July 1, when the duties became effective, there was a rush into England of motor cars, silks, musical instruments, clocks and watches. These carry increased duties under the McKenna schedules and traders made every effort to enter large supplies before the higher rates became effective.

**BLOMERS FOR
ENGLISH WOMEN**

London, July 10—While men followers of the Oxford vogue for wide trousers increase in numbers very slowly, English women seem to be adopting with enthusiasm the habit of wearing knickerbockers while motoring, cycling and walking in the country. Gray, blue, or khaki breeches, worn with shirts and soft felt hats, are gradually ousting the skirt from favor for holiday wear. Whereas, three years ago a woman wearing knickerbockers in England would have attracted much attention, now-a-days breeches for the comfort they allow in walking and climbing have come to be regarded as the correct thing.

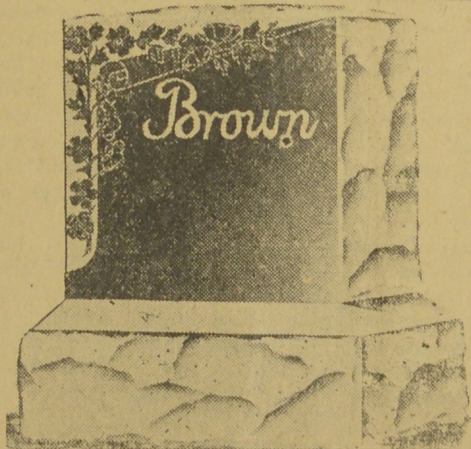
