

ROUND-WORLD  
MOTORISTS ARE  
HERE TODAY

From El Paso, Texas,  
and Have Covered  
131,000 Miles — Four  
Veterans of Great  
War.

A Ford car and its four occupants is attracting much attention about Fredericton today. The car bears a Colorado license plate but El Paso, Texas, is said by the crew to be the real hailing place, the Ford having left that place June 29th, 1921, on a tour of the world.

Of the four young men with the car three served with the American Expeditionary Force against Germany and one with the Canadians enlisting in August, 1914, at Montreal, with the Canadian Field Artillery. He is "Nick" Carter of Ohio. The others are E. J. Agnew of Hartford, Conn., G. L. Reeves of Texas and Sergt. Sanford Orr of Michigan.

Met Old Army Pals.

"Nick" Carter met old army pals shortly after reaching Fredericton for he served in the same battery in France with Karl Walker and Clarence B. Burden of this city and also with other C. E. F. men well known here. Carter had full service during the war with the Canadians.

Last night the world-girdlers were guests of the G. W. V. A. at their quarters.

Today the car took a position in Queen street and was a centre of attraction. Souvenir cards were sold by the crew. Horns, a deer-head, German bayonets and other arms, Mexican money, pictures, post cards postage stamps, views of scenery of the various countries visited, are displayed on the sides of the ridged hut which has been built over the car. There also is space for the registration of names of people in places visited.

The travellers claim that their car has covered 131,000 miles by land, rail and water. Europe and other countries on the other side have been visited.

The car entered New Brunswick via Houlton, Me., on Thursday. In Maine they were delayed two days as the result of having the rear of their car smashed. They will go on to Nova Scotia via Saint John.

CONDITION  
OF CROPS MUCH  
IMPROVED

Rains Have Worked  
Wonders in Past Few  
Weeks — Potato Dis-  
tricts Report Many  
Misses.

A marked improvement in general crop conditions throughout New Brunswick has been noticed in the past three weeks because of heavy rains. Up to the time that the long period of drought was broken by the first of the rains, grass was looking very poor in the central and southern parts of the Province. In the north things were different because of steady rains during the spring. The prospect at that time was that the highland hay crop would be very light.

During the latter part of June and early July a great change took place and now the reports are that even on the highlands the hay crop gives good promise and grain of all kinds is in excellent condition.

Potato Districts Report Misses.

From the potato districts on the Upper St. John River come reports of a heavy percentage of misses in the potato fields. The reason for this state of affairs is not known but the tendency will be toward reducing the yield.

Strawberry Yield Heavy.

The strawberry crop has been heavy throughout New Brunswick. The Montreal market is taking many of the berries and owing to a shortage in the Ontario and Quebec small-fruit crop the price is satisfactory. (Continued on page five.)
