**CONSERVATIVES HOPING FOR 110 SEATS; LIBERALS EXPECT 115; NEW REPRESENTATION IS DISCUSSED**

Ottawa, Aug. 25—Already the usual guessing contests of the next parliament have been indulged in by supporters of the two older parties.

One Conservative estimate is 110 seats for Mr. Meighen, which estimate includes 20 in the Maritimes, 20 in Quebec, 65 in Ontario and the remainder west of the Great Lakes.

More hopeful Liberals claim for the government 115 seats, of which 15 would be in the Maritimes, (out of a total of 29), 60 in Quebec, 25 in Ontario, and the remainder in the West.

Both of the older groups look for a considerable reduction in the strength of the Progressives.

It was announced that the Prime Minister, accompanied by Right Hon. George P. Graham, Minister of Railways and Canals, and Hon. Charles Murphy, Postmaster General, would address a gathering of the electors of North York, his own riding, at Richmond Hill, on the afternoon of Sept. 5.

**To Reveal Intentions.**

As this is the day subsequent to the expected return of His Excellency the Governor-General to this city, it is believed that Premier King will make known in his own riding, as is the usual practice, his intentions regarding the dissolution of Parliament.

Other dates for the Prime Minister will be announced later.

At that gathering the Prime Minister, it is expected, will disclose the lines along which the election campaign will be conducted by the Liberals. One of the points that he will advocate will be the giving of the Government a working majority and the utility of marking ballots unless some such result is achieved.

**New Basis Discussed.**

The approach of a general election in Canada has led to renewed discussion of the probable effects of the new basis of representation which will become operative at that time. The addition of ten seats will increase the

membership of the House of Commons to 245 and the prairie provinces will be the chief beneficiaries.

Nova Scotia will lose two members. The representation from New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island, Quebec and Ontario will remain unchanged. British Columbia will gain one member, Manitoba two, Saskatchewan five and Alberta four.

**Quebec Has 65.**

The increase in membership is not the result of party battling in the House of Commons but of increased population. The Canadian constitution provides that after each decennial census there shall be a readjustment of representation in the house with the census as a basis. The representation from Quebec is fixed at 65. To obtain what is known as the unit of representation the population of Quebec is divided by 65. To determine the number of representatives from the other provinces the population of each province is divided by this unit. There are some exceptions but this is the general principle. The effect is that as the population of a province increases in proportion to that of Quebec the number of its members in the house increases or decreases in the same proportion.

**Likely Important.**

The added representation from the prairie provinces is likely to play an important part in the next general election. These provinces are the stronghold of the Progressive (agrarian) movement in Canada. It was on the prairies that the movement as a political force originated. At the last general election Ontario elected 24 of the 64 Progressives returned at the polls, but since then the Progressive movement has suffered a severe setback in that province. Progressive leaders assert that in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta the movement has maintained its strength and they hope for added representation in the next house as a result of the increase in membership from those provinces.

**THE NEALIS FAMILY IS HOLDING A REUNION IN SAINT JOHN CITY**

The attraction of the old home brought to Saint John yesterday from places widely separated members of a family prominent in the commercial and social life of this city and Fredericton in years gone by. Six children of the late Simon Nealis arrived—four sons and two daughters. Two of the sons were accompanied by their wives, making a party of eight in all.

Those in the party are Simon J. Nealis, of New Haven; Dr. E. J. Nealis, of Oakland, Cal.; Charles J. Nealis and his wife of Sacramento, Cal. and Miss Mary and Miss Laura Nealis of Boston.

**Arranged Reunion.**

Mr. Nealis, their father, kept a clothing business at the Market Square here previous to 1870, and in that year the family removed to Fredericton. Some of the children were born in Saint John and the younger ones in the provincial capital. All have been away from their native province for a good many years, and have prospered. There is another daughter, Mrs. L. E. Hubbard, of Boston, and

she has been spending the summer for several years at Oromocto. This season the idea of all coming home for a visit was conceived and correspondence resulted in the arranging of a reunion for the home-coming.

They arrived yesterday on the steamer Governor Dingley from Boston, which city had been chosen as the rendezvous when they made their plans. They made their headquarters at the Admiral Beatty Hotel and spent yesterday in visiting places about the city and in meeting friends of their own days, and some of a previous generation who welcomed them because of memories of the heads of the family.

This morning all will leave for Fredericton by river steamer. They plan to spend some time there and in the vicinity, meeting friends and also at the summer home of their sister in Oromocto. They will be in Saint John again on the way back to the United States. A very hearty welcome was given them by friends whom they met in their sauntering around Saint John yesterday.

**THINKS PRICE OF NEW BEER IS TOO HIGH**

Toronto, Aug. 25—The Toronto Star today quoted Hon. W. F. Nickle, Attorney-General, as expressing the opinion that it would have been greatly to the advantage of the province, "to say nothing of the hotelkeepers and brewers, if they had been able to sell a 5-cent glass of beer and a 10 or 15-cent bottle," when asked for his opinion as to complaints about the price of 4.4 per cent beer.

The newspaper says it is not unlikely that the question of price will receive the attention of Premier Ferguson.

Ferguson today said there was not a word of truth in the statement that about 20 Conservative members of the Legislature would wait this week on the cabinet to protest against the manner in which Attorney-General Nickle has been issuing permits for the sale of 4.4 per cent beer in their ridings.

"There is no foundation for the report," the Premier said, "I never heard of such a deputation."

**THE GUTENBERG BIBLE MAY COME TO AMERICA**

London, Aug. 25—The famous Gutenberg Bible—the first book ever printed in moveable type, and one of the rarest and most valuable books in existence, probably will soon leave London for America, it was reported here today.

Having been brought to London after two weeks' search of many European Capitals, in which an aeroplane was used most of the time, the book was purchased by Edward Goldston, a London dealer, who said he had been inundated with inquiries and offers from America.

"One cable from an American millionaire collector contained a tempting offer," said Mr. Goldston. "I have been keeping the matter open in the hope that some public-spirited Englishman would meet the offer and save the book for the nation."
