Over Expenditure on Concrete Sidewalks Not Authorized By City Council After Division

Finance Committee Brought in Recommendation Against it and Majority Supported Recommendation—Clash Between Ald. Olts and "Eleventh Alderman" in Corridor After Meeting—Auditor's Monthly Report Henceforth to Show Amount of Appropriation Expended, With Overdraft or Unexpended Balance.

The City Council in regular session Tuesday night reversed the intended action of the previous night in the matter of making an overexpenditure for concrete sidewalks in order to provide concrete sidewalks about the new High School and also on Aberdeen street between Church street and the C. N. R. tracks. This was done after the Finance Committee through its chairman, Ald. Ross brought in a recommendation that no overexpenditure be made. Ald. McCaughey and Ald. Olts were the only members to vote for the overexpenditure. Ald. Olts later remarked when the intimation was made that the city would meet the Provincial Government half way on repairing the New Maryland Road, that the Finance Committee evidently was able to meet an overexpenditure there.

Discussion with regard to the Aberdeen street sidewalk led to a clash between Ald. Olts and the "eleventh alderman" William Belyea in the corridor after the meeting. Ald. Olts with regard to the sidewalk said that it should be ascertained how the property owners of the street stood on the matter. It might be that only one wanted the sidewalk. Mr. Belyea who strongly urged the sidewalk took exception to the reference and a personal clash between him and the alderman followed.

Municipal Home

Ald. McCaughey for the Municipal Home Committee reported a monthly expenditure of \$249.62 made up of \$107.42 at the Home and \$142.20 for outside relief. The usual check in favor of Commissioner Miles was issued.

Overexpenditure Squelched.

The Council took up consideration of the proposed overexpenditure on concrete sidewalks.

Ald. Ross for the Finance Committee recommended against any overexpenditure.

Ald. Olts said the Finance Committee should not attempt to do this to the Council. He had inspected the vicinity of the new High School, on George Street there was no sidewalk and none on Regent Street.

Ald. Ross said there was no attempt to dictate. The Finance Committee had been asked to report on the matter. It was opposed to overexpenditure on principle. Already there was overexpenditure of \$15,000 of water.

Ald. Cooper said that a new sidewalk about the school could be laid early next year.

Ald. Jennings said that a sidewalk was necessary.

Ald. Farrell supported the decision of the Finance Committee.

Motion Defeated.

Ald. McCaughey said this was the most disgraceful proposition he ever had heard—to spend \$160,000 on a new school and then refuse to spend six or seven hundred dollars for a new sidewalk.

He moved that the sidewalk be laid. Ald. Olts seconded.

Ald. McKnight said he must oppose the motion.

Ald. Farrell said that to pass the motion would be a vote of want of confidence in the Finance Committee. The motion was defeated on the following vote:—
Yea—McCaughey, Olts.
Nay—Hay, Jennings, Cooper, Ross, Farrell, Goodspeed, McKnight.

New Maryland Road.
Discussion ensued on the matter of repairing the road to New Maryland.

It was decided to have City Engineer McDowell confer with B. M. Hill, Chief Road Engineer, to report to the Council.

Alteration in Report.

Ald. Smith moved that the form of the monthly report of the city auditor be altered so that information given at present be continued and also expenditure for the year to date, overexpenditure if any, appropriation and unexpended portion thereof.

The motion was carried.

Winslow Street Extension.

Ald. Cooper reported that the Street Committee had gone to Winslow Street and had gone over the land required for extension to Alexandra Street. No recommendation was made because of the request of two of the land owners for payment of the land needed for the extension. It was known that the two wanted \$500 each.

Ald. Olts said that Wm. McCormack was willing to submit the matter to arbitration.

Mayor Phillips said that Ald. Olts and F. T. Thomas were willing to donate their land needed.

The matter was left in the hands of the Street Committee to report back.

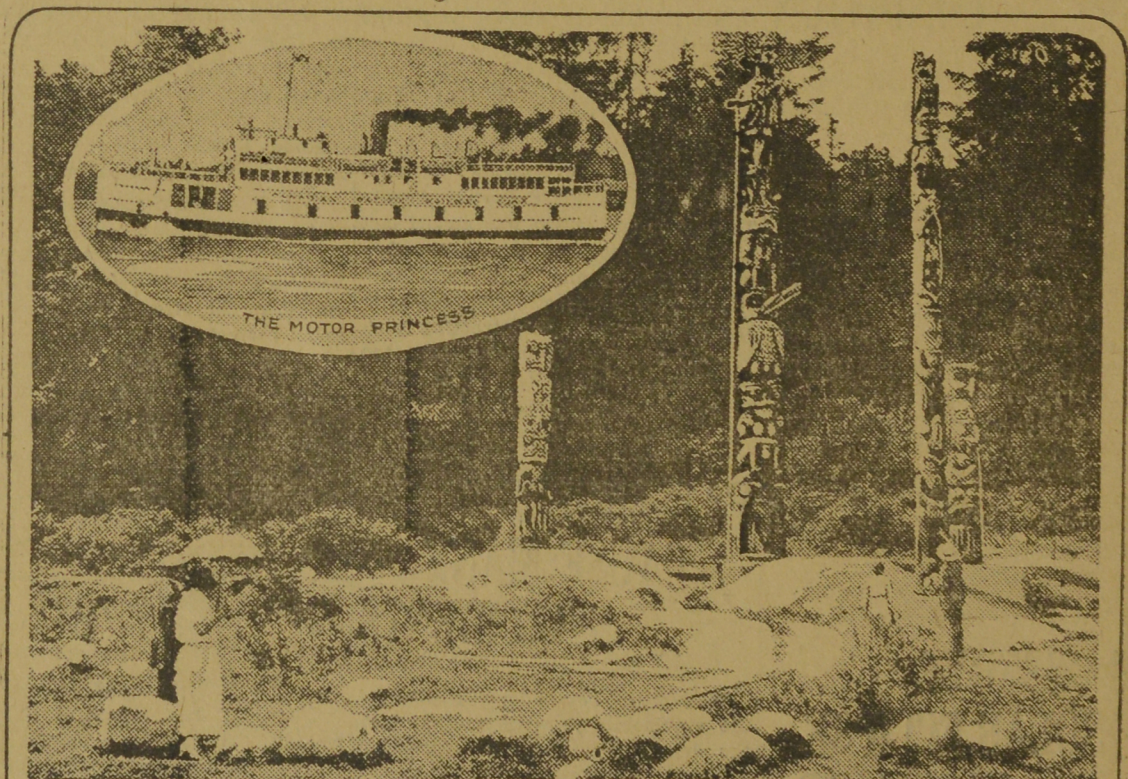

The Bellingham Ferry that meets all the Autos



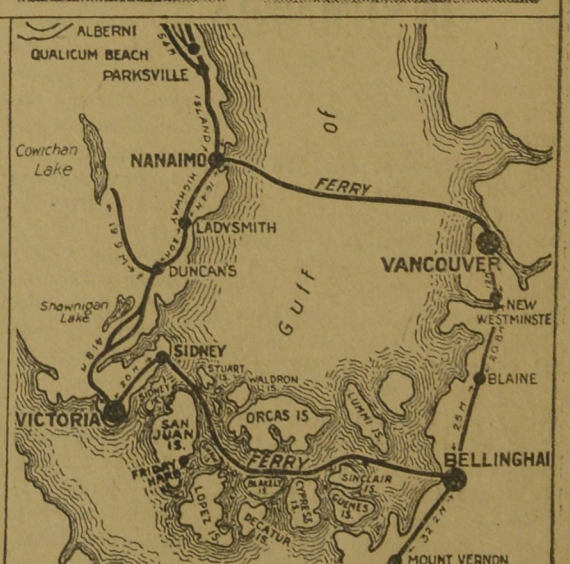
Totem Poles at Stanley Park, Vancouver.

Have you ever heard of Clo-oose? Appearances may be against it, but it is not a typographical error; neither is it a bird-call, nor Chinese for chewing-gum. It is, as a matter of fact, a thriving town on Vancouver Island, rapidly becoming famous for its salmon, shooting and scenery, and as one of the most interesting spots on the coast of British Columbia.

This coast is yearly becoming more popular with tourists from the South—California, Seattle, etc., Eastern Canada and practically everywhere else. But that detached portion of the coast, known as Vancouver Island is especially attractive. It possesses beauty of a mountainous, rugged, arboreal type, excelled in magnificence only by the Rocky Mountains and unexcelled anywhere for its hunting and fishing. Incidentally, too, the Island is traversed by paved, winding highways, which are a delight to motorists and a credit to the Provincial Highway Department.

Indians (who have become so used to tourists, they no longer scalp them) inhabit most of the villages which are scattered along the Coast. They have not, however, entirely abandoned the practice of scalping, but nowadays they confine their activities in this respect to salmon, herrings, whales and similar trifles. They (the Indians not the whales), are a thrifty, sober, industrious people engaged for the most part in catching fish and canning them in the local factories.

The Island is reached by means of a ferry-boat—"The Motor Princess"—operated by the Canadian Pacific Railway between Bellingham, on the mainland and Sidney, on the Island. This ferry is especially adapted to the transportation of automobiles and enables the tourist to run his car straight off the mainland highway, across the Gulf of Georgia and on to the Island highway, which he can follow south to

It is an extremely pleasant trip, full of interesting cut-of-the-ordinary sights and anybody who has toured British Columbia without visiting Vancouver Island—and Clo-oose—ought to tour it again and correct a most unfortunate omission.
