TO CHECK SMUGGLING.

The bill to amend the Customs' Act passed by the Dominion Parliament at the session just closed, if it is well enforced will break up to some extent some very common practices. It makes a distinction between importations in quantity, usually made by men engaged in trade, and articles brought into the country by individuals for their own use or for the use of friends. The former applies to a relatively small number of people; as for the latter, there is reason to think their names is legion. These will have to look sharp if when the new law is made operative, they are to make any profit. The section applying to their cases that any person who smuggles or clandestinely introduces into Canada any goods subject to duty under the value of two hundred dollars, or otherwise attempts to avoid paying customs duties on any goods of whatever value, shall, if the goods are found, forfeit them, and if not found In addition, it is provided that there of a quart. shall be forfeited by the person concerned on appeal to a competent court gled goods, and he shall be liable to to \$200, or imprisonment for from Eve with an apple pie. one month to one year. 
