## REV. T. D. BELL RESIGNS FROM THE TEMPERANCE ALLIANCE; ATTACK ON THE GOVERNMENT

Moncton, July 7—Meeting in semi-annual convention here today, the New Brunswick Temperance Alliance received the executive committee's report, which announced the resignation of Rev. T. D. Bell as field secretary, and expressed regret regarding "wholesale violations" of the prohibitory law of the province. The report, which was adopted, recommended that the Alliance use every possible effort to secure the election of candidates who are in full sympathy with the principles for which the Alliance stands.

At the public meeting in the evening addresses were given by several prominent members of the Alliance. The people were urged to support the prohibitory law in preference to Government control. J. D. O'Connell, "the children's friend," was introduced, but was unable to give an address owing to an attack of heart trouble. It was the second time only, he said, that he had failed to address an audience when it had been announced that he would do so.

Mr. O'Connell left for his hotel before the meeting was closed. Shortly before midnight it was reported that his condition was improved.

Hanford Price was chairman of the meeting.

The resignation of Rev. T. D. Bell as field secretary was announced this morning. The resignation takes effect on Aug. 1. His successor will be appointed by the executive of the organization.

A meeting of the executive was held this morning. The alliance met this afternoon in the W. C. T. U. hall and this evening a public meeting was held in the city building. This afternoon's session opened at 2 o'clock with Donald Fraser, of Plaster Rock, president, in the chair. After a few remarks by the president and the appointment of a resolutions committee, Rev. Thomas Marshall, of Fredericton secretary, read the report of the executive, in part as follows:

"Your committee desire to report that since the annual meeting in Fredericton on March 19 the work of the alliance has been steadily carried on.

Now 93 Branches.

"The field secretary has attended meetings in the different sections of the province, in Queens, Sunbury, Westmorland, Charlotte, York, Carleton, Victoria, Northumberland and Albert counties and has continued the work of organization and the increase of membership. We have now 93 branches of the alliance.

"We regret that the Rev. T. D. Bell has found it necessary to resign his position as field secretary, the duties of which office he has so faithfully attended to for the last 11 months.

"Consideration has been given to various matters in connection with the coming provincial election. We have striven to carry out the constitution of the alliance, and we have sought to secure the nomination by the different political parties of candidates who could be depended upon to aid in maintaining the enforcing the prohibitory law.

"We regret very much that the Government should have been a party to such wholesale violations of the prohibitory law of the province and so faithless to promises made by its members. All our efforts have failed to secure from the Government anything like a full enforcement of the law and the only effective way open to us to ensure this is to secure the election of men who may be trusted to keep the law themselves and to use every possible effort for its general enforcement.

"It is for the convention to decide as to the future both as to the character of the work to be done by the alliance and the providing of funds with which to carry on efficiently the work agreed upon.

**Makes Recommendations.**

"We recommend, first, that the alliance use every possible effort to secure the election of candidates who are in full sympathy with the principles for which the alliance stands; second, we would urge upon all voters the necessity of seeing that their own names are on the voters' list and to secure the placing of the names of other qualified persons upon the lists and that every effort be made on election day to poll every possible vote."

The report was adopted.

**Resolutions Report.**

Addresses were given by J. D. O'Connell, who arrived here yesterday from Sussex, and Mrs. H. H. Coleman, of Moncton, on the general work of the alliance.

The committee on resolutions submitted a report, in part as follows:

"Your committee heartily endorse the following recommendations from the report of the executive committee:

"Section 8, first, that the alliance use every possible effort to secure the election of candidates who are in full sympathy with the principles for which the alliance stands; second, to urge upon all voters the necessity of seeing that their own names are on the voters' list and secure the placing of names of other qualified voters upon the lists and that every effort be made on election day to poll every possible vote. The suggestion of your committee is that this report be presented to the public meeting and emphasized by the chairman. Regarding sub-section 4 of section 8 your committee would heartily endorse the appointment by the executive of a suitable successor to the Rev. T. D. Bell as field secretary as soon as may be possible.

The report was adopted after which the meeting adjourned.

In Samuel Hollis Knox vs Jennie Edna Knox, R. G. McInerney proctor, the witnesses examined were the plaintiff husband, George M. Byron, Fred Carvell and Glen MacVey. The case was continued this afternoon.

## TO BE NO MORE PROSECUTION

Toronto, July 7—There will be no more prosecutions in the criminal courts against directors of the defunct Home Bank, nor will the decision of the Ontario appeal court in reversing the convictions of the directors by County Judge Coatesworth be appealed to a higher court. The conspiracy charges against M. J. Haney, former president, and the directors will be dropped.

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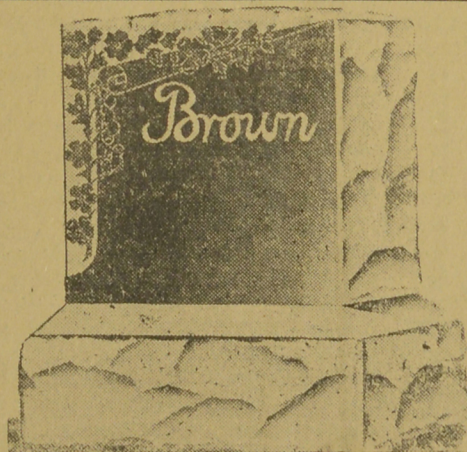
