JENNY H. TO RACE THIS WEEK AT SPRINGFIELD

Pale Face Did Not Race on the Holiday—Calais Horse Won Race Handily.

The Bay State Circuit horses are at the Eastern States Exposition track, West Springfield this week, and followers of the New England half-mile course chain are justified in their anticipation of great racing.

The Springfield fields will be only slightly different from those which provided such thrilling contests at Avon and Windsor.

Lambert Todd and Charlie Direct are expected to start against Jenny H., Quinla and Silver Weather.

\$10,000 Races Went Big.

Windsor had a splendid meeting in every respect, with the two \$10,000 purse events going over big.

The racing features were the surprising victories of Robert Comodoro, Jenny H. and Watson B. Jr. over the favorites Grit McKinney, Silver Weather and Harrison Dillon.

The failure of Pale Face to appear on the holiday was believed to mean a relay in the acid test to be given Silver Weather which had won so impressively at Avon and Norwich.

The Long Island horse was, however, out in deeper water than before and could not come through. In Quinla, from the stable handled by Art Martin for Capt H. M. Stanford of Springfield, the son of Silver Axworthy met a pacer he could not outrace.

As the contest lengthened, the attractive chestnut did not display the class many figured he would flash when strung.

Quinla, in racing him into the ground, gave her all and the Down-east mare, Jenny H., making her first start of the season, topped the summary.

SINGLE G. IS KING OF PACERS IN 13TH. SEASON

Gashed an Ankle in the First Heat Last Week—Crawford Good for Murphy.

The Grand Circuit in its first week had 24 races from a program that scheduled only 19. Two class events were raced in three divisions each and a \$3000 stake in two.

The entry for the second week at North Randall is about as heavy, but enough of the half-mile track horses which failed to make good on their first trials are expected to be withdrawn to keep the fields down.

The opening week of the mile track chain found wonderful old Single G, now making his 13th campaign, still able to touch two minutes and defeat the other free-for-all pacers. He sustained a badly gashed ankle in the accident of the first heat, but the gameness of the ancient warrior carried him through to victory.

Tommy Murphy showed a stake trotter in Crawford, which was a disappointment last Summer. He had another which did not look too bad in the Dillon Axworthy four-year-old Clare Dillon.

Walter Cox did not win a race, but his horses raced well enough to forecast a rather successful season.

Favonian handled Ethelinda in his second winning race of the week, but will likely find the 1924 Futurity winner harder game when they meet again this week.

Rodney brought the chestnut mare owned by W. L. Eaton of Calais, Me., to the post in excellent condition. He was not confident that she would win, as he was racing her without hoppers, and figured that she would need one race to make her safe free limbed.

ARTIFICIAL ICE FOR TORONTO CURLING CLUB

Granites Move to Install Nine Sheets—Many Fine Features in the New Plant.

Toronto, July 7—The Granite Club decided to proceed with the erection of their new clubhouse and curling rink, the latter with nine sheets of artificial ice, on the south side of St. Claire avenue near Yonge street. Work will commence immediately on the curling rink which it is hoped to have ready by the first of January 1926. It is proposed to make the new headquarters of the Granite Club the finest of the kind in Canada. The St. Clair avenue lot has 100 feet frontage and is 180 feet deep, while at the rear of the adjoining property is a lot 350 by 180 feet. The equipment of the new club will include lawn bowling greens, squash racquets courts, indoor golf, five-pin alleys, swimming pool, showers, billiard and card rooms, lounge, dining room, etc.

The plan of the Granites is to feature the "father and son" aspect of club life which has become very popular elsewhere and the establishment of lady memberships is also under consideration.

Will Crozier was in 2.06 and back in 2.05 last Friday with Guy Richard which makes his first start at Toledo.

Purple Volo which won the two year old trot at Windsor cost Harry Brusie \$250 at the New York auction last Fall.

Those irregular distance races on the Grand Circuit may be interesting to see but the summaries make poor reading.

El Verso was not brought East, as "Hump" Morrison expects to put him across in the Edwards stake at North Randall this week.

Walter Cox trained George McKinney's 3 year old Peter Speedway in 2.08 1/4 last Friday. The colt's first start will be in the Matron stake at Toledo.

Ben White has been in 2.05 1/4 with Sumatra and considers her good enough to start at Toledo in the \$25,000 Geers Memorial purse.

Her 2-year-old sister, Station Balls, has shown 2.10 1/4, last half in 1.03 1/4.

La Paloma 2.01 1/4 did not start at Windsor last Saturday because she refused to go on the track to warm up. If she is on her good behavior she will start against Grace Direct and Col Bidwell at Springfield.

HELEN WILLS SAYS TIME WILL ASSIST HER
