A LIVELY CAMPAIGN IS BEING CARRIED ON IN BAGOT, QUEBEC; SPEAKERS EXCHANGE COMPLIMENTS

Ste. Helen De Bagot, Que., Dec. 3—Heated accusations of appealing to the lowest and meanest of prejudices passed swiftly across the platform this afternoon where rival candidates in the federal by-election of Bagot met once again.

Day after day since they entered the field the two candidates—G. D. Morin Liberal, and Hon. Andre Fauteux, Conservative—have traveled from parish to parish with their supporting speakers, stating their views on a time limit, the chairman presiding, watch in hand. Usually the "assemblee contradictoire" has been marked with good feeling. This afternoon at a meeting in the basement of the church charges between rival speakers flew thick and fast.

Stanislas Poulin, a Liberal speaker from St. Johns d'Iberville, seized on Mr. Meighen's words in Bagot, "I forgive and forget," and asked the electors what they thought of a man who, "with the record of Mr. Meighen," has the hardihood to pose as a new Christ in Quebec, and paraphrasing the words of the Saviour crucified, exclaim: "I forgive you, for you knew not what you did."

Criticizes the Premier.

F. G. Coffin, a Conservative speaker from Montreal, charged that Premier King, in offering a portfolio to former Premier Norris, was taking into his cabinet a man who had crucified and torn down the schools of Manitoba. Mr. Coffin charged that Liberals had called Mr. Meighen an assassin and thief.

Mr. Poulin denied that Liberals had made such a charge.

"What we do say," he added, "is that in his administration there was a waste which also amounted to theft. There were acts which almost amounted to murder."

Pierre Audet, Conservative, who opposed Hon. Ernest Lapointe in Quebec East in the general elections, said that Liberals appeals were appeals to prejudice and to fear. He cited the Premier as boasting in Toronto that among the first people he had taken into his cabinet were conscriptionist Liberals.

"Yet Liberals," said Mr. Audet, "claim to be opposed to conscription. There, in Premier King's speech in Toronto, you have an instance of Liberal trickery and deceit."

Deceived Twice, He Says.

Hon. Lucien Cannon, Solicitor-General, took Mr. Meighen's announcement (that before sending soldiers overseas in the next war he would consult the people) and asked what faith there was to be placed in Mr. Meighen's words.

"The Borden-Meighen government deceived you twice," he went on. "They promised there would be no conscription and there was conscription. They promised that farmers' sons would be exempt from war service, but they did not get exemption. Now this man who deceived you then comes and says: 'It's all over. I will forget.'"

"If Mr. Meighen becomes prime minister and does not keep his word in regard to the Imperial question—and I should not be surprised if he does not—don't blame Liberals afterwards and say we did not warn you."

"Don't worry, we shan't go," said a voice.

Had Many Leaders.

Mr. Cannon charged Mr. Fauteux with having followed four different political leaders and flown four different political flags in the past fifteen years, with having deserted Mr. Patenaude as if to escape the plague.

Mr. Fauteux warmly returned that he had always been true to his political principles. He declared that he had always opposed the imperialistic policy of Sir Wilfrid Laurier. "I opposed it," he added, "while you were defending it with all your strength, and it was that policy which led the way to our participation in the war. My position has always been that we should look to a greater Canadian autonomy while still remaining in the British Empire. I think that in the British Empire lies the greatest protection for Canada. But we should think first of Canada."

What Leader Means.

Mr. Fauteux added that his interpretation of Mr. Meighen's declaration was that there would be no participation in war, involving the sending of troops overseas without consultation of the people.

Mr. Fauteux attacked the Australian treaty, referring to it as a nefarious treaty from the Canadian farmer's point of view. He argued that the fiscal policy of the government was emptying our cities and towns and driving Canadians to the United States.

Mr. Morin, Liberal candidate, asked how a Meighen Government would proceed with a referendum on participation in war. Would the referendum be held before the soldiers were enlisted and the barracks filled with men or would it be held after. Such a declaration as that of Mr. Meighen, he thought, should have no influence in Bagot.

Apart from the joint meetings of candidates, the division is alive with speakers and workers. Hon. J. P. A. Cardin, minister of marine, addressed a couple of meetings. No meetings have yet been arranged for Sunday, the last day of the campaign, but they are expected.
