## U. S. COLLEGES TO COMBAT PRO FOOTBALL THREAT

National Collegiate Athletic Association to Act—Situation Considered to Require Action at Once.

New York, Dec. 17—Agitation to "combat the tendencies to over-emphasize and professionalize" football may take concrete form when the National Collegiate Athletic Association, representative of colleges and universities in all parts of the country, holds its 20th annual conference here Dec. 30.

Listing the signing of college under-graduates by professional football teams and the presenting of watches to an American eleven picked by a New York newspaper as examples which jeopardize the intercollegiate game, the association's executives propose five remedies to meet the existing situation.

These remedies embodied in a tentative resolution forwarded to members of the N. C. A. A. in an announcement signed by Pres. Palmer E. Pierce and Secretary Frank W. Nicholson, would combat professionalism by (1) limiting pre-season training; (2) limiting the number of intercollegiate contests; (3) limiting the number of games played in other than college stadiums; (4) abolishing so-called athletic scholarships and improper proselytizing; (5) encouraging intramural and interclass games.

The resolution also would provide that "educational institutions be further recommended to refuse hereafter to employ or continue in employment any coach, trainer, rules official, or others who in any capacity give service to or aid in the promotion of professional football."

## ONE AMATEUR LEFT OUT OF TEAM

New York, Dec. 17—Hockey has joined baseball and football in attracting noted players from the ranks of the amateurs. Of the Pittsburgh Yellow Jackets two-time national champions, only one player remains in the unpaid category all others having joined the Pittsburgh team in the National Hockey League. The one who stood by his amateur status was Dalton Meeking, a substitute centre.

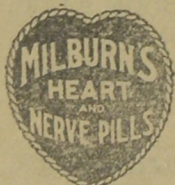

## WANT PLAYERS ON COMMERCIAL TEAMS ELIGIBLE

Montreal Senior Hockey Clubs Want to Play Bankers and Other Players—Rule in Way

Montreal, Dec. 17—The Montreal Clubs of the Senior group of the Quebec Amateur Hockey Association have requested Governor Norman Mowatt to take action in having the resolution passed at their last annual meeting whereby commercial league players would not be allowed to compete on teams in the Senior Group, rescinded.

An application will be forwarded to Governor Mowatt to have a mail vote taken on the matter by the five clubs in the circuit. It is understood that the three local clubs are anxious to have the rule waved out of the constitution while the attitude of the Ottawa and Sons of Ireland Clubs is not known. Numerous players on the three local clubs, compete in the Bankers' League and other commercial leagues and with the rescinding of the rule they will be able to play in both leagues.

"Sig" Slater and Louis Valois of the Victoria and Bank of Montreal teams will be eligible to play on both clubs this year if the rule is rescinded while Columbus and Nationals are also anxious to use prominent commercial players.

## OTTAWA HAS FIRM GRIP ON FIRST POSITION

Shut Canadiens Out 3 to 0 at the Capital Last Night—Winners Stood the Pace.

Ottawa, Dec. 17—Scoring their fourth shutout on home ice in league fixtures this season, Ottawa defeated Canadiens in a National Hockey League game here tonight by a 3 to 0. The packed house saw two train-weary teams play 60 minutes of sensational hockey.

Ottawa won because they seemed able to stand the gruelling pace better than the Canadiens, who wilted badly under the heavy going especially in the final half of the last period. The game was rough all through. It was give and take with both teams but the players showed no inclination to resort to deliberate rough house tactics.

### Fail in Final.

Canadiens held their own with the Senators for the first period and then came back to force the play for part of the second period. They must have shot their reserve strength into that session as they failed in the last period under the body-checking game that the Ottawas elected to play.

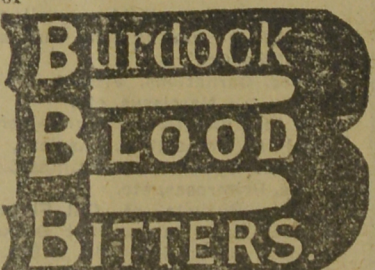

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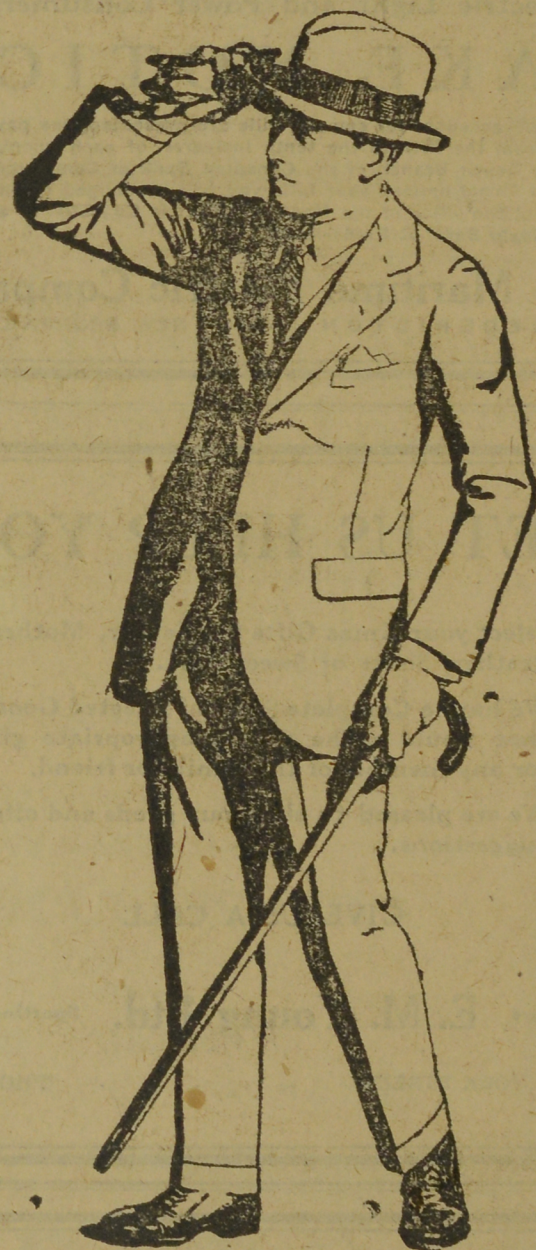
