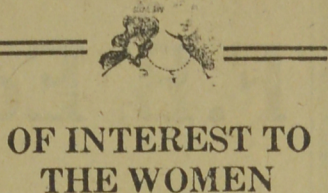

PINAFORE FROCKS BEGUILE
STYLE CHASERS OF PARIS.

PARIS—Pinafore frocks, which open in back to disclose a slip of contrasting color, are one of the winter fashion novelties which society shows signs of adopting from among the many suggested ideas. The dresses are inspired by the black sateen pinafores worn by French children at play. They fasten close to the neck, sometimes have simple yokes and usually are dark in color with lighter slips.

This is the time of year when costumers can tell which of their many proffered styles have caught the fancy of Paris. While hundreds of novelties are presented, only a few arrive at popularity.

"BRIGAND" AND "COWBOY"
HATS SUPPLANT CLOCHE.

LONDON—London women have become tired of the cloche hat, which has been in vogue for a considerable time, and have been casting about for a change in style.

Interesting changes hit on by fashionable milliners are the "brigand" and the "broncho." The first named is a model worn well down on the forehead, with a sharply upturned brim. The broncho, or cowboy hat, has its brim turned up at the back and a little at the side. Both styles are made in felt or in velvet, and both are additionally attractive with self-colored ribbon trimming.

"Up at the back and down in front" in the style of another model made of petersham ribbon. Still another is made of straw-edged duvetyne and another is of duvetyne and satin. Mulberry and wine colors are coming into use and most hats carry jeweled pins as ornaments.

A NEW KIND OF CREAM OF TOMATO SOUP.

1 large can tomatoes.
1 cup cooked rice
1 1/2 cups cooked and mashed lima beans.

Top of milk from 1 quart and 1 pint bottle of milk and also 2 cups of milk.

Strain and press tomatoes through a sieve and add 1 cup cold water the rice and lima beans and salt and pepper to taste. Bring to a boil and thicken with a tablespoon of flour, mixed with a little water, and lastly add the top of milk and the two cups of plain milk. Bring this to a boil once more and remove from fire and add one tablespoon of butter.

This soup is deliciously different from the usual cream of tomato soup. Children, as a rule do not care much for soups, but serve this and see if they don't ask for more.

TOMATOES WITH CHEESE.

Now that tomatoes and green peppers are in season, try this chafing dish (or frying pan) supper:

Brown two small onions, sliced and two green peppers, sliced in rings in a little butter. When tender add tomatoes cut in half-inch slices across the grain. Allow two slices for each serving. Brown quickly on both sides, adding a little more butter if necessary. Then add one-half pound grated American cheese. As the cheese melts take out the tomato and peppers, place on slices of toast and pour over these the melted cheese, to which are added salt and Worcestershire sauce to taste.

TO KEEP PIGS IN HALIFAX

Halifax, Dec. 17.—Citizens will be allowed to keep pigs within the limits of the city subject to the approval of the City Health Board on and after January 1, as the result of a by-law adopted last evening by the Board of Health. Although efforts were made by Ald. Daw and Drysdale to have the Board designate certain districts in which pigs could be kept, the Board decided otherwise, and as a result each application for a license to keep pigs will be dealt with by the Board on its merits.

Here and There

Timber exported from British Columbia during the nine months ending September 30, 1925 was 33,663,000 feet, compared with 50,500,000 feet for 1924; 46,643,000 feet in 1923; and 49,820,000 feet in 1922.

A project is under way at Toronto for the construction of the largest hotel in Canada, which also means the largest hotel in the British Empire. It is understood that the new structure will be even larger than the Roosevelt in New York.

The apple crop in the Okanagan Valley, British Columbia, this year is estimated at 2,300,000 boxes. At a fair estimate of a dollar and a half a box, the return to growers in this district will be approximately four million dollars.

The Eastern International Dog Derby will be run at Quebec on February 18, 19 and 20. The course provides for a distance of 45 miles a day for three days, irrespective of rain, snow or storm. The winner will receive \$1,000 and a gold cup. Other competitors will be awarded prizes aggregating \$2,200.

Immigration to Canada for the six months from April 1 to September 30, 1925 totalled 57,086. Of this number 25,072 were from Great Britain and Ireland, 11,199 from the United States and 20,815 from other countries. In the same period 18,282 Canadians returned from the United States.

With Canadian ensign flying and all her gala bunting aloft, the Canadian Pacific liner Empress of Scotland left the harbor of New York sharp at noon on December 3 on the first part of her journey in the course of which she will completely circumnavigate the globe, covering approximately 30,000 miles, visiting nineteen different countries and making twenty-four ports of call.

Canadian Pacific Railway gross earnings for the month of October were \$19,569,188.43 an increase of \$216,847.93 over the sum for the corresponding period of 1924. Net profits were \$7,444,027.08 or an increase of \$421,849.85 over \$7,022,177.23 for October 1924. Net profits for the ten months ending October 31 were \$29,079,949.01 an increase of \$1,611,889.52 over the sum of \$27,468,059.49 for the same period of 1924.

According to advices from a reliable source, conditions in the West have shown consistent improvement this year. The crop has been gathered, threshing is finished, and the grain has been stored in elevators. With the astoundingly rapid despatch of wheat, money is steadily coming in to farmers, giving them an opportunity to clear off debts and leaving them enough to extend their purchases.

The first Christmas holiday special over the Canadian Pacific Railway bearing three hundred happy Westerners bound for the Old Country arrived at St. John, N.B. in time to connect with the Canadian Pacific liner Montrose which will land them in Great Britain in time for the Christmas holidays. The special, travelling as the second section of the Imperial Limited, was composed of eight sleepers, one from Edmonton, Calgary, Moose Jaw, Kerrobert, Sask., Shaunavon, Sask., and two from Winnipeg.

Exceeding anything before shown in the Dominion of Canada and in the world, figures of marketing of all grains and of car loadings in the month of November furnish a double record for Canadian Pacific Railway western lines for Canada and for the world. Marketing of all grains totalled 89,210,780 bushels and car loadings were 39,522 cars. For figures even distantly approaching the above, the statistician must go back to November 1923, when 57,608,000 bushels of all grains were marketed and 36,379 cars were loaded.
