RIBBON EFFECTIVE
IN NEW CREATIONS.

Ribbons are used for dress trimming in panels, waistcoats, motifs, bows and girdles. They are happily adapted in the new "gypsy" girdle. Fancy a graceful, simple gown of black crepe de chine as a background for a hip girdle of wide ribbon ornate in design and riotous in color. On one wide ribbon of solid color are appliqued clusters of flowers made of narrow ribbon and floss. One exclusive New York shop is showing a girdle of black taffeta ribbon 15 inches wide on which is applied a spray of field flowers in the natural colors and ears of wheat made of pale yellow ribbon and gold thread.

STRIPE AND PLAIDS
IN NEW STOCKINGS

The latest styles in sports hosiery are flashy checks, stripes, plaids and diamonds. The balmoral of half a century ago are worn, largely by those classified as misses and juniors. Silk stockings with walking shoes or sports clothes are considered passe. Instead, smart women wear hosiery of fine wool in geometric patterns, in color either matching the suit or in the new beige, tan or brown.

Some striking designs are shown in beige combined with black and white, and in two-tone effects. For women who object to the heavy ribbed wool stockings there are the smart and comfortable silk and wool, most of which are less conspicuous in pattern. The mixtures, Oxford gray, beige, browns and tans are considered very good.

Dainty Orange Jumbles.

Divide the recipe for the "S" cookie mixture and flavor with one tablespoon of orange extract. Roll thin and shape with a small jumble cutter measuring one and one-half inches in diameter. Brush each jumble lightly over with the slightly beaten white of egg and sprinkle with fine chopped pistachio nut meats and coarse granulated sugar. Arrange on buttered baking sheets about one inch apart, and bake to a delicate straw color in an oven at 300 degrees Fahrenheit. The recipe makes 267 small delicious jumbles of exceedingly fine texture.

Cocoa Coconut Jumbles.

Beat three eggs until whites and yolks are well blended; add gradually one cup of sugar, beating constantly; add one-half cup of thick rich cream, one half cup of shredded coconut and one-fourth cup of shredded cocoa. Mix thoroughly then beat in gradually two and one half cups of pastry flour sifted with two teaspoons of baking powder and one-half teaspoon salt. Add one teaspoon vanilla extract; chill dough thoroughly and roll to one-fourth inch thickness. Shape with a small doughnut cutter. Brush tops lightly with slightly beaten white of egg; sprinkle with granulated sugar mixed with finely chopped pistachio nut meats. Bake in a moderate oven until delicately browned.

ROMAINE.

Wash the romaine and crisp it next the ice. Put the leaves together, nest fashion, three or four for each person—a dark green one at the bottom and smaller ones toward the top of each pile. Pour over French dressing made with lemon juice in the proportion of one tablespoon lemon juice to three of oil, with a little salt and paprika. To enough to serve six people add the shredded pulp of two oranges.

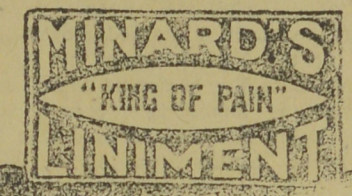

Here and There

During the twelve months ended October 31st, 1925, Canada exported to 53 countries and colonies 52,903 cars valued at \$23,168,869 and trucks valued at \$5,016,000 and also auto parts worth \$5,573,875. Automobile exports during the corresponding period 1923-24 totalled 45,194 cars valued at \$23,109,331.

A total of 18,261 acres was planted to tobacco in Ontario in 1925, yielding 20,623,000 pounds according to figures issued by the Federal Government. In 1924, 12,372 acres were planted, yielding 12,135,000 pounds. In 1925 the average yield per acre was 1,130 pounds as compared with 914 pounds per acre last year.

Branch offices of Japanese flour mills are to be established in Winnipeg soon, it is understood, so as to be in a good position to buy wheat. Two representatives of the Misin Flour Mills and Mitsui Grain Company, of Tokio, were in Winnipeg recently making arrangements for the purchase of 150,000 tons of wheat for the two firms.

Ernest Rolph, a Toronto architect, has claims to the discovery of the first fossilized remains of eggs of prehistoric reptiles. He found them in a deep cutting between Lethbridge and MacLeod in the shape of about 15 perfectly round stones. The eggs measure 2 1/4 inches in diameter and are now being investigated by Professor Parks of Toronto.

In order to create a better understanding of the game, an all-star team of English badminton champions arrived in Saint John, N.B., recently and made a tour right across the Dominion, exclusively on Canadian Pacific lines, playing exhibition games in the largest cities. Sir George Thomas, Bart., is captain of the team which sails for home on December 30.

M. U. Bates, who operates a chain of camps in the Metagama district of Ontario, reported to the tourist department of the Canadian Pacific Railway that the record for the 1925 season was fourteen moose, two deer and one bear, taken by ten parties of fall hunters totalling 22 persons. Most of the visitors were satisfied as 75 percent of them made reservations for next year.

A prize of \$1,000 weekly, offered by a Chicago publication for a deed of bravery, comes to Canada for the first time. J. B. Partridge, fireman on the Canadian Pacific Railway, on the run between Calgary, Alta., and Field, B.C., is to receive the reward for saving the lives of five men who were in danger from a huge rock and mud slide on the Field Hill, August 21 last.

Canadian roses grown at Brampton, Ontario, and sent to Sir George McLaren Brown, European general manager of the Canadian Pacific Railway, stationed in London, scored a decided hit with Londoners. Large crowds gathered to see the Canadian blooms which were on display in the windows of the offices of the Canadian Pacific Railway in Trafalgar Square.

Christmas holiday passenger traffic to the British Isles was especially heavy this season on Canadian Pacific Railway lines. Over 1,200 passed over these lines in the last two weeks of November, while others arrived later in time to get the S.S. Melita and the S.S. Metagama which sailed from Saint John, N.B., on December 10 and 11. West-erners all seem to be in very good financial circumstances owing to the good crops the past season.

Perhaps not a little of unrest is caused by a desire to rest.
