APPLE PORCUPINE.

6 medium apples

cups sugar

21/2 cups water 1 tablespoon butter.

½ teaspoon cinnamon

Blanched almonds.

Boil the sugar and water for five minutes. Pare and core the apples and cook in the syrup until tender but not broken. Drain and place in a baking dish. Add butter and einnamon to syrup and cook until required to reimburse small deficit thick. Fill the cores and surrounding spaces with the syrup and stick cut almonds into the apples lengthwise. Place in oven to brown the nut tips. Cool and serve with plain or whipped cream.

SAUTED CABBAGE.

1 cabbage

One hundred British farm families are due to reach British Columbia early next spring. These are the fore-runners of 3,000 families that are to come out to settle in Canada on the land. Provincial and British Government assistance is being given them to get started.




