Petition Refused by the
School Board — Must
Pay Tuition — Total
City School Attend-
ance 1,830.

The total enrolment of pupils in the
Fredericton schools is now 1830
which is sixty in excess of the total
last year. Many pupils however are
not resident in the city and the in-
crease is more than made up by the
increase in the High School. There
also has been an influx of families
from other communities for the pur-
pose of entering children in the Fred-
erickton schools.

The School Board was in regular
session Wednesday afternoon.

Permits Issued

The Secretary's report showed 245
permits had been issued, of which 148
were for Grade II. Total enrolment
1830, of whom 408 are in the High
School.

Tuition Fees

A number of families having moved
into the City during the last three
months, and not being on the rate
list for 1925, the Trustees decided to
charge the children of such families
the regular tuition fee and any family
paying taxes in this City in the year
1925 will have tuition refunded.

The matter of purchasing seats for
the High School Assembly Hall was
considered and a Committee appointed
to deal with this matter.

A request from Fire Chief Roy W.
Smith for the Trustees to permit
pupils from Grades VI. up to attend a
lecture by J. Grove, Dominion Fire
Commissioner, in the Gaiety Theatre
on October 9th was granted.

Petition Refused

A petition from a number of rate-
payers of the Wisley District was re-
ceived which asked that children in
that district be accommodated at
Morrison Mills School, or else vans be

VIOLATION
OF REVENUE ACT
NOT PROVEN

Case Against Alfred
Myshrrall Was Dismissed — Possession of
Jug Alone Proven by
Prosecution.

The case against Alfred Myshrrall
of Kingsclear who was charged
with violation of the Inland Revenue
Act was dismissed Wednesday af-
ternoon in the police court by
Police Magistrate Limerick for lack
of evidence. The charge against
Myshrrall arose out of a visit of
Chief Inspector Hawthorne, Sub-
Inspector Fraser Saunders and
others to Myshrrall's home on
August 20th. On that occasion a
two-gallon jug containing a liquid
presumed to be alcoholic was
found. The charge against Myshrrall
was specifically, having in his
possession brewing apparatus with-
out reporting the same to the Inland
Revenue Department.

The case was defended when called
for trial Wednesday, J. J. F. Winslow,
K. C., appearing for the defence and
P. J. Hughes, K. C., for the Crown.

Magistrate's Comment

The prosecution proved that the con-
tents of the jug showed an alcoholic
content of eight per cent. His Honor
in dismissing the case commented that
the proof was not sufficient. The pos-
session of a jug and nothing more
could not be accepted as possession
of apparatus for brewing. If that
were not the case about half the
population of New Brunswick would
be liable to prosecution.

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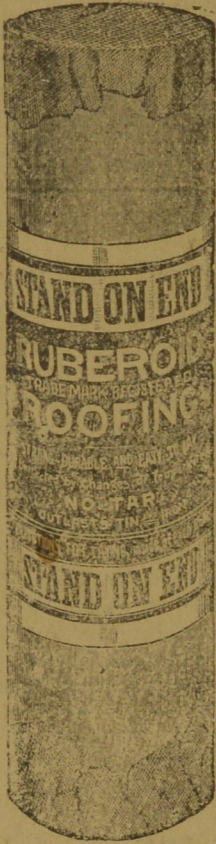
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
