A PLOT TO SHOOT MUSSOLINI

A MOUNTAIN MOVED BY HEAVY RAINS

Water Main Was Broken and Supply Was Cut Off.

16 DEATHS REPORTED

French Astronomer Has Made a Count of Stars.

(Special to the Daily Mail by British United Press) London, Nov. 5.—Heavy rains in Wales caused a mountain at Thredyrhunch to move, breaking a watermain and cutting off the water supply of more than 1000,000 inhabitants of the Rhymney Valley. Meanwhile a check on the casualties of the flood in the Conway Valley shows that sixteen are dead or missing.

LITTLE CHANGE IN STANDING OF PARTIES

Conservatives Have 117 Seats and the Liberals 101—Two Doubtful.

Toronto, Nov. 4.—The only change in the Dominion election standing as a result of today's Canadian Press returns was the placing of Bonaventure, Que., back in the Liberal lost, after it had been transferred to the doubtful column last night based on reports that the Conservative candidate was running ahead in that riding.

Today, however, brought the announcement that Hon. Chas. Marcell was returned with a majority of 800. The Conservative total remains at 117 and the Liberal at 101. Among the Liberals are two independent Liberals who defeated the official Liberal candidates. In Chicoutimi, Que., J. E. A. Dubuc, Independent-Liberal; was victorious over J. L. Levesque, official Liberal, and Jean C. Gagnon Conservative. In Crescott, nt., G. Evanturel, running as Independent-Liberal also defeated his official Liberal and Conservative opponents. HANNA LOST IN HASTINGS

Belleville, Nov. 5.—Official returns on the election for South Hastings, as compiled by C. A. Cameron, Returning Officer, today, showed that, in all, 18,285 votes were cast—10,448 for W. E. Tummon, Conservative, and 7,837 for Charles E. Hanna, ex-M. P. Mr. Tummon's majority was 2,611. Hanna defeated Guss Porter in a by-election a year ago.

MADE THE TRIP FROM MONTREAL IN THREE DAYS

C. N. R. Oil Electric Car Made a Record Trip.

THE LONGEST NON STOP RUN

Superiority of Oil Electric Car is Demonstrated.

Vancouver, Nov. 5.—All records for Transcontinental travel were broken this morning when the Canadian National Railways Oil Electric Car No. 15820 arrived in Vancouver after making the trip from Montreal in three days. The trip was not only a record breaker so far as actual schedule was concerned but it wrote a new chapter in the railway history of the world as making the longest nonstop run ever made by an engine for during the 2937 miles covered the car engine not once did stop running. There is also the actual running time which again provides an unequalled passage in Dominion transportation annals. For eliminating detentions due to meeting trains and other delays incidental to modern transportation methods which came to 300 minutes the actual running time was slightly under 67 hours.

From the first to the last the trip demonstrated the superiority of the new oil electric car. Arranged primarily as an endurance test for the engine not only did it prove this point but also it showed the speed possibilities of the car over long distances which previously had not been proved. At one point on the western region 22 miles were made in less than the same number of minutes and one of the steepest grades in the Rocky Mountains was climbed at an average speed of 40 miles per hour. The average speed for the entire trip was slightly under 45 1/2 miles per hour.

Officials of the Canadian National Railways who accompanied the car on its transcontinental trip expressed themselves as being thoroughly satisfied with its performance and in their opinion it is within the realms of possibility that this journey may mark the opening of an area which by the forerunner of a new epoch in motive power as applies to steam, the oil electric car is in its fancy. They point out that just as the steam locomotive power was in its infancy a century ago. With its wider application and further development they believe it may develop along similar broad channels and this may bring about the passing of the steam locomotive and prove as important as an adjunct to the future of industry and society as the conversion of the old wood burning engines to coal.

HEAD OF THE CUNARD LINE TO WED AGAIN

London, Nov. 5.—The engagement of Sir Alfred Booth to Miss Margaret Lucy Brighton, his housekeeper, is reported from Scarborough in a despatch to the Daily Express. Lady Booth died in the United States a year ago. She was Mary Blake Dwight, daughter of Edmund Dwight, of New York. They were married in 1903.

Sir Alfred formerly was Chairman and now is a director of the Cunard line.

THE POLICE OF ROME HAVE UNEARTHED PLOT AGAINST THE PREMIER

All Masonic Lodges to be Occupied by the Military—Unitarian Socialist Party to be Abandoned—Mussolini Has Been in Conflict With the Masonic Lodges For Some Time.

ROME, November 5.—The police today reported that they had discovered a plot to shoot Premier Mussolini of Italy. Following the discovery of the plot, Mussolini ordered all Masonic lodges to be occupied by the military and the unitarian socialists party to be disbanded.

Mussolini as leader of the Fascisti of Italy has been in conflict for some time with Masonic Lodges and has desired their elimination. Suppression of the socialists is in line with his policy of sweeping aside opposition. He has said force is right when necessary for the achievement of ideals. The Fascisti and the Masons are reported to have had several clashes recently.

DECLARATION OF POLL GIVES R. B. HANSON MAJORITY OF 5,429; LITTLE CHANGE

Few People Present—Sheriff J. B. Hawthorne Complimented by Conservative Candidate for Manner in Which Duties of Returning Officer Were Carried Out—Liberal Majorities at Burton Front and Cork Only.

Declaration proceedings for the constituency of York-Sunbury took place at the York County Court House here this morning before Sheriff J. B. Hawthorne, Returning Officer. There was no interest in the event on the part of the public. In addition to H. G. Fenety, clerk to the Returning Officer, those present were R. B. Hanson, K. C., Conservative candidate, W. W. Hubbard his campaign manager and the Returning Officer's staff opening ballot boxes.

Slightly Changed. The official totals were slightly different from those collected by the New Brunswick Telephone Co. the night of the election but no material change was made. David Burt's which was believed to be one of three polls giving a Liberal majority was found to be decidedly Conservative. This left Burton Front in Sunbury and Cork in York the only Liberal polls.

The official totals were R. B. Hanson, 8,636; C. R. Hawkins 3,207 making the majority for Hanson 5,429. Rejected ballots numbered 58 and spoiled ballots 40.

Compliments to Sheriff. After the formal announcement was made Sheriff Hawthorne said that as Returning Officer he had endeavored to carry out the duties as best he could although encountering difficulties at some polls in the matter of securing deputies.

Mr. Hanson in reply said that he considered the duties of Returning Officer well carried out and that all concerned were eminently satisfied with their performance.

WHOLE FAMILY DEPORTED IN ISLE OF JERSEY

Fourteen Year Old Girl Who Stole Letters the Cause.

POSTMAN WAS CENSORED

Too Lazy to Deliver Letters So Hid Them Under Rock.

St. Helier, Island of Jersey, English Channel, Nov. 5.—Lack of a reformatory here was sorely felt when Louise Francine Jaco, fourteen, was convicted of stealing three letters from under a stone at the foot of a hill where they had been hidden by a postman for delivery when he should feel less tired. Rather than build a reformatory for Louise, the authorities deported the whole family, father, mother and three children, for five years on the ground that the law must be enforced. The postman was censured for his laziness.

N. B. EGGS WON SECOND PRIZE IN ENGLAND

BIG LOSSES CAUSED BY FRENCH GUNS

The Damage at Damascus Estimated at \$2,500,000.

SYRIANS ARE CHECKED

Were Aiming a Blow in Direction of Damascus.

Paris, Nov. 5.—Losses caused by the French bombardment of Damascus last month were semi-officially estimated today as totalling \$2,500,000.

French artillery according to the Jewish Telegraph's Agency reports has checked the advance of Syrian insurgents who were aiming a blow in the direction of Damascus.

All traffic in Damascus was reported suspended, with shops closed and inhabitants fleeing as the cloud of new trouble hovered in the vicinity of the city which last month was pounded by French guns. Railway service between Damascus and Haifa is interrupted.

SPUDS ARE SELLING FOR \$7 AT PRESQUE ISLE

Presque Isle, Me., Nov. 4.—Both growers and buyers stand pat in the potato market today which held steady at \$7 per barrel, cash, to growers, bulk barrel measure for Green Mountain No. 1. As usual some lots here and there changed hands at about market figures, at \$7.25 and \$7.50 and fancy seed lots higher.

Weather conditions are better with higher temperature. Growers are holding back for higher prices and none believe that the peak of the market has been anywhere near reached.

DRURY LED AT RURAL POLLS

Barrie, Nov. 5.—The official figures for North Simcoe make a considerable reduction from the majority of W. A. Boys as announced on election night, the revised figures being 590. Had the contest been in the same territory that constituted North Simcoe in 1921, Mr. Drury would have won by 234, Barrie giving the Conservative candidate \$24, 7 less than he had in Collingwood. Mr. Drury had a majority in every rural municipality his home township giving him a lead of 550.
