PREMIER KING HAS ISSUED A STATEMENT; GOVERNMENT HAS DECIDED TO MEET THE HOUSE

Ottawa, Nov. 4.—It is officially announced that Premier King will meet parliament. Parliament will be called at the earliest possible date.

Premier King's statement reads:

"The latest official returns having made it apparent that as a result of the general election held on Oct. 29 no one of the participating political parties would of itself have a clear majority in the House of Commons when parliament assembles, it became my duty as Prime Minister to acquaint His Excellency, the Governor-General with the situation and to advise His Excellency as to the course which should be pursued. After several interviews with His Excellency at which the position brought about by the recent general election was fully discussed and all alternatives presented, I have taken the responsibility of advising His Excellency to summon parliament for the earliest practicable date in order to ascertain the attitude of the parliamentary representatives towards the very important question raised by the numerical position of the respective political parties. His Excellency has been pleased to accept this advice.

Duty To Meet House.

"After careful consideration of the constitutional precedents and their bearing upon the situation which has arisen as a result of the general election, the cabinet decided unanimously this afternoon that it was their constitutional duty to meet parliament at the earliest possible moment, regard being had for the legal requirements with respect to the time necessary for the return of the writs and the official gazetted of the members who have been elected.

"In the interval until parliament assembles it is the intention of the Government to refrain from making appointments beyond such as are essential for the proper carrying on of the public business.

Three Courses Open.

"In the present situation there are three possible courses of procedure each of which has been carefully considered by the cabinet.

"1.—That His Excellency be asked to grant an immediate dissolution of parliament.

"2.—That His Excellency be asked to call upon the leader of the largest political group to form a government.

"3.—That His Excellency be asked to summon parliament at the earliest practical date for the purpose aforementioned.

Shuns New Appeal Soon.

"With respect to an immediate dissolution, it was felt that it was not in the interests of the country to occasion the turmoil and expense of another general election until at least parliament had been summoned and the people's representatives in parliament had been afforded an opportunity of giving expression to their views.

"With respect to the leader of the political party having the largest definite number in the House of Commons being called upon to form an administration the cabinet holds the view that responsible self-government in Canada rests upon the principle that the majority so understood meaning not the political party or group having the largest number of members, but the majority as determined by the duly elected representatives of the people in parliament. Far from indicating that Mr. Meighen is in position to command a majority in the newly elected House of Commons the results of the election appear clearly to indicate that he is not in such a position. I am not aware of any precedent in Great Britain or Canada of recommending before parliament meets that the leader of a party not commanding a clear majority in House of Commons should be called upon to form a government.

Procedure Warranted.

"To summon Parliament and to allow the House of Commons to disclose its attitude upon division is the procedure by constitutional precedent and by the present circumstances.

"To take any other course would be to fail to recognize the supreme right of the people to govern themselves in the manner which the constitution has provided, namely expressing their will through their duly elected representatives in Parliament and in accordance with recognized parliamentary practice."

A RAINBOW BATHROOM FOR THE RICH

Washington, Nov. 4.—The more money a man has the more colors he should have in his bathroom. Roy Jordan, of New York, yesterday told the eastern district convention of the Tile and Mantel Contractors Association.

Bathing in a rainbow atmosphere under Mr. Jordan's plan, would be proper only for the very wealthy. A \$10,000 home, he says, should not aspire beyond a plain white tile bathroom, while only blue or pink would be permissible for one costing \$20,000. Not until the 40,000 stage is reached, in fact, would the bathroom colors begin to really warm up, with purple, yellow or green tiles but after that presumably, the tastes of the owner and the ingenuity of the producer could unite in an unfettered exercise of the imagination.

BIG MAJORITIES FOR LIBERALS

Quebec, Nov. 5.—An official recount of the votes, which took place this afternoon in the city electoral divisions and in Quebec County, placed the official returns of the Federal elections as follows:

Quebec South—Power, 6,280; O'Meara 5,019; Liberal majority, 1,261. Quebec West—Parent 7,561; Ratte, 5,959; Liberal majority 1,602. Quebec East—Lapointe, 9,193; Amiot 6,366; Liberal majority 2,823. Quebec County—Lavigne, majority 1,934.

PEACE RIVER RETURNS.

Edmonton, Alta., Nov. 4.—Peace River (50 polls to come)—Collins, Conservative 3,955; Kennedy, Progressive, 3,701; Rae, Liberal 3,606.

Here and There

Sport conditions are very good in New Brunswick this year. Harold Chadwick operating hunting camps in the province reports that at the end of September catches of speckled trout weighing 18½ lbs. were taken one day while a hunter took out a big game licence September 23rd and three days later had his deer and bear.

The world's most northerly police post, also the most remote of any human habitation, is to be constructed next year for the Royal Canadian Mounted Police at the far end of Ellesmere Island. Building materials and two years' supplies will be cached within easy freighting distance of the point where men will be detailed for patrol duty on the lonely shores of Riel straits.

Appointments recently made through the office of the Comptroller Canadian Pacific Railway headquarters are W. J. Cherry who becomes Freight Claims Auditor in place of J. R. Steele retired under pension rules, and W. L. Moran appointed Assistant Freight Claims Auditor. Both these gentlemen have been connected with the Freight Claims department for many years past.

Because the prospects for hunting and fishing in northern regions of Quebec are more attractive this autumn than they have been for several seasons, the number of residents of the United States applying to the Quebec association for the protection of fish and game for guides and licences is much greater than it has been for some time, according to the secretary of the association.

A very pleasing incident occurred during the visit to Montreal of Madame Maria Jeritza, world-famous operatic star. Col. George H. Ham, "Grand Young Man" of the Canadian Pacific Railway who had met the singer before, sent his felicitations in the form of a bouquet, and Madame Jeritza replied with a bouquet of roses made of sugar with the hope that his days also would be sugar-coated. She gave a one-night recital in Montreal, leaving for Toronto the following day.

Isaac Gouverneur Ogden, vice-president in charge of finance, Canadian Pacific Railway, attained his 81st birthday October 10. Mr. Ogden is as active as ever although he has spent 54 years in railway work. He joined the C.P.R. as auditor of the western division with headquarters at Winnipeg in 1881 and has been vice-president of the system since 1901. Mr. Ogden was the recipient of flowers and congratulations from his colleagues on the occasion of his birthday.

Carelessness and lack of forethought on the part of some unknown motorist at Belleville might have led to serious accidents if it had not been soon discovered that the wig-wag signal protecting the C.P.R. level crossing on the Kingston Road was out of order. Investigation showed that an automobile had driven out of its course and broken the relay case thereby cutting the electrical contact. A watchman was immediately placed at the signal until necessary repairs had been made.

The Montreal Windsor street station police team are the champions of the Quebec district in the First Aid contests held at the Place Viger hotel in that city under the auspices of the Canadian Pacific Railway. They won the contest against teams from Ottawa and Quebec and are now holders of the Gutellus Challenge Cup, emblematic of the C.P.R. First Aid championship of the province. The championship of the New Brunswick district was won by the McAdam team who competed against Saint John and Woodstock.

Two Alarms Of Fire.

A false alarm of fire from box 56, Lansdowne street and Waterloo Row called the firemen out last night. This morning an alarm was rung from box 23 for a burning flue at the home of S. H. McFarlane, York street. There was no damage.

The marriage took place in Saint Andrew's Presbyterian Church, Ottawa, Monday afternoon of Miss Mary Christina King, daughter of the late John King and of Mrs. King and Gordon Macleod Pitts, son of the late Herman H. Pitts and Mrs. Pitts. Rev. Dr. Lloyd Morrow officiated, and the wedding music was played by J. Edward Birch who presided at the organ. A vocal quartette, composed of Mrs. Dan Macdougall, Miss Ethel Hinchliffe, George White and Stafford Salmon, contributed a number during the signing of the register. Given in marriage by her uncle, Fleetwood Wilson, the bride was attended by a sister, Miss Idyll King. Clarence Pitts, a brother of the groom was best man, and those who assisted as ushers were Dr. William P. Muirhead, of Kingston, and Mansell Dickinson of Oakville. Mrs. I. C. Sharpe, of Montreal, aunt of the groom, was among the guests. The couple have left for New York and Washington, and will later take up residence in Montreal.

The groom's parents formerly resided in Fredericton, and his father at one time represented York County in the Legislative Assembly of New Brunswick.
