## MUMMY OF THE LATE KING TUT CANNOT BE REMOVED FROM GOLD COFFIN, IT IS ANNOUNCED

Cairo, Nov. 19--The condition of the mummy of Tutankhamen has been found to be such that it will be impossible to remove it from its gold coffin, Doctors Derry and Saleh Bambi announced today in a report on the unwrapping of the mummy which has occupied seven days.

The experts announce that the mummy is firmly glued to the bottom of its gold coffin with a dried pitch-like material. The mask, reaching to the upper part of the throat is also fixed to the coffin, making the removal of the mummy impossible. It will also be futile to attempt to make X-ray pictures on account of the numerous layers of gold and other materials covering the body to the knees.

**Bandages Destroyed.**

A form of spontaneous combustion was found to have destroyed some of the bandages, causing the skin and underlying tissues to become extremely thin and brittle.

This condition exposed certain joints enabling the age of the king at the time of his death to be estimated fairly accurately at about 18 years.

The king evidently was of slight build, and the belief of the experts, that the statues and effigies already found are really portraits, finds confirmation in the face, which is now exposed. The report says that the objects found with the body may be classified in three categories, amuletic or pertaining to charms, royal objects and personal belongings. These ob-

jects have made it possible to reconstitute the whole royal regalia of the 18th dynasty.

The refined taste displayed in the jewelry equals anything previously known, the experts report.

**Objects Discovered.**

The most important objects discovered with the body are:

On the head, a Royal diadem with insignia of vulture and serpent.

Around the neck, Amuletic figures and divinities.

On the chest, numerous pectorals, including various amulets in sixteen layers. Of these some comprise many hundreds of sections of elaborate en-crustated cloissons work.

On the arms, Eleven magnificent bracelets.

Besides those on the heads there are thirteen massive finger rings of various materials.

Around the waist: two girdles, of which are suspended two daggers.

About the limbs, A royal apron composed of sections of inlaid gold work.

Upon the feet, Golden sandals. Each toe was encased in a gold sheath.

**Many Amulets Found.**

In addition a great number of amulets were found, the object of these being to protect the pharaoh in his journey through the underworld. No traces of documents have thus far been discovered.

The golden mask covering the head and shoulders is an example of superb art and presents a most realistic likeness of the young king.

## TWO CHILDREN PERISH IN FIRE AT DARTMOUTH

Were Trapped in the Attic of Blazing House and Could Not be Rescued.

Halifax, Nov. 19--Trapped in a small section of the attic in their home, the only entrance to which was blocked by a seething mass of flames, while their father and members of the Dartmouth fire department, strove vainly to effect an entrance, William R. Cheek, aged 4, and Bramell Cheek, aged 3, sons of Mr. and Mrs. W. A. R. Cheek, 13 Maple street, perished in a fire which broke out shortly after 7 o'clock this morning.

Three other children, Lester, Reginald and Doris, two older and one younger than the victims of the tragedy along with the parents, escaped from their sleeping quarters on the second floor of the structure which was only partially damaged by the blaze.

**Stove Pipe Blamed.**

Although many conflicting stories of the cause of the fire were in circulation this morning, the story generally accepted is that the fire was caused by an overheated stove pipe, which is believed to have set fire to a curtain on the second floor. It was in the children's bedroom that the flames were first discovered by the father, who immediately communicated with the fire station.

While Mr. Cheek was attempting to extinguish the blaze himself, awaiting the arrival of the fire apparatus and men, three of the children managed to escape to the lower floor of the residence, but the other two, evidently fearing the flames, which by this time were burning close to the only exit, ran to the ladder leading to the attic and crawled up, thinking to escape the fire.

By this time the firemen had arrived on the scene and, thinking that all five children had escaped, Mr. Cheek assisted in subduing the flames on the second floor. When it became known that the two children were in the attic immediate efforts were made to effect an entrance. Dense clouds of smoke filled the building and the whole upper storey was a seething mass of flame, yet Mr. Cheek made several attempts to reach the ladder leading to the attic. He was forced to turn back each time, however, but not before he was badly burned about the arms and shoulders.

**All Efforts in Vain.**

Efforts to reach the children were also made by the firemen. Several managed to endure the smoke in the building and reached the ladder only to find that it had been burned away. Another group of firemen had two streams of water playing on the flames from the outside, while others attempted to gain an entrance to the

## WELL KNOWN CLERGYMAN PASSES AWAY

Rev. B. N. Nobles, Baptist Minister Died Yesterday at Woodstock.

St. John, Nov. 20--In the death yesterday of Rev. Beverley N. Nobles, clergyman for over forty years, the Baptist denomination in the Maritime Provinces loses a familiar figure and up to his retirement fifteen years ago, one of its most active and efficient pastors. Rev. Mr. Nobles passed away at his home in Woodstock, Carleton county, after a week's immediate illness with pneumonia, induced by a chronic bronchial ailment. In fact he had not been in good health for years, and this combined with deafness forced him to relinquish public ministerial duties and accept an agency for several insurance companies.

**Of Loyalist Stock.**

The deceased clergyman was a son of the late Harvey Nobles, scion of Loyalist stock, residing on the Belle Isle, where a brother, Charles, now lives. Rev. Benjamin N. Nobles, also well-known in the Maritime Provinces, and who at one time occupied the pulpit of Victoria Street Baptist church, removing to San Antonio, Texas, for his health about ten years ago, is a brother. These two brothers are the only surviving immediate relatives. Mrs. Nobles was formerly Miss Orr of this city, and sister of the late Mrs. Stillwell, mother of Mrs. George Morris, Leinster street, Bayard and Arthur F. Stillwell, of North End and West End respectively. Weeden and D. L. Nobles of this city are cousins.

**Inducted Here.**

It was in the old Brussels street Baptist church in this city that the late Rev. Mr. Nobles was inducted into the ministry. He at first became assistant to Rev. Dr. J. E. Hopper, whose health while pastor of that large congregation was such that a helper was necessary. Prior to studying for the ministry, Mr. Nobles taught school in the Norton district. In his long career he was pastor at West Saint John, Bear River, N. S., Lockport, N. S., Canso, N. S., Woodstock, N. B., Jacksonville, N. B., and other places. He was a much beloved clergyman and churches succeeded greatly under his leadership. Deceased was seventy years of age. He died childless. Mrs. Morris, 165 Leinster street, niece of the late clergyman, leaves this morning to join her bereaved aunt.

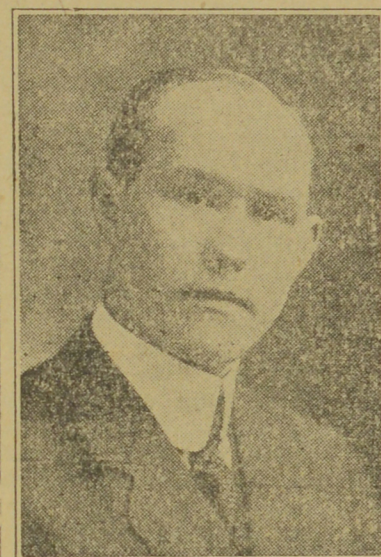

There is an automobile race in Los Angeles, which brings about a fair amount of suspense and the sweethearts are united in a happy ending.

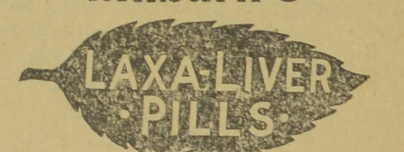
