Murphy Top Money Winner On Grand Circuit this Year

Total of Purses Paid Was Greatest Since Organization of Circuit — Murphy Won Fifty-nine Races and \$98,305.

W. H. Gocher, secretary of the National Trotting Association tells what the harness horse has accomplished in his annual review of the Grand Circuit campaign.

Noting that it opened at Cleveland June 29 and closed at Atlanta Oct. 10, after a run of 15 weeks, he says in part:

"There were 11 meetings at which 321 races were decided, 170 being for trotters and 151 for pacers. The latter raced 352 heats and the trotters 413, making a total of 765 for the trip.

"The purses amounted to \$626,192.25 the most ever paid out in one season since the circuit was organized. In 1924 the total was \$572,620.95 and in 1923, \$589,097.07.

"The 1925 series increased the number of Grand Circuit meetings since 1876 to 479. At these meetings \$16,239,273.13 have been paid in purses or stakes to horse owners.

"On the trip from Cleveland to Atlanta, T. W. Murphy won 59 races. His winnings amounted to \$98,305. These figures again placed the Syracuse stable at the top of the column, and also raised the amount of Murphy's winnings on the trotting turf from 1909 to the close of 1925 to \$1,412,135.

"The Belwin gelding Crawford was the leader in the Murphy group. He started off by winning two races at Cleveland in July. This was followed by a defeat at Toledo where Peter Fellows finished in front of him after he won a heat. In the next seven weeks Crawford won at Kalamazoo, landed fourishes at Aurora, annexed two more races at the Cleveland August meeting as well as one race at Milwaukee and one at Indianapolis. "At Syracuse Crawford started favorite in the \$10,000 Empire State purse. On account of the wet weather it was raced over the the under track and won by Bob Armstrong after two very close finishes. The big son of Chestnut Peter also defeated Crawford in one of his races at Columbus. He won the other two. He was awarded first place at Lexington in the Walnut Hall Cap and Castleton purse and closed the season with a victory at Atlanta.

The Top Notchers.

As has been stated, Tommy Murphy tops the list of Grand Circuit drivers with 59 races to his credit. Walter Childs is third with 27. "Sep" Palin stands fourth with 19 and Will Dickerson fifth with 16. The latter also won 12 races in the Orange County Circuit and two at the Illinois State Fair with the Arden Homestead Stable horses, making his score 30 for the season.

Up to the close of the Grand Circuit Vic Fleming won 12 races over the mile tracks and 17 over the half mile rings, Fred Egan 11 Will Crozier 10, Ben White 9, Nat Ray 8, Walter Garrison 6, Lon McDonald, Fred Edman, Harry Putnam, Ed Allen, John Thomas, Henry Thomas and George Loomis 5 each and John L. Dodge 4.

Matron Swells Cox' Total.

Converted Try and Goal From Field Won for Acadia In Game with Dalhousie

Hubert Davidson of Fredericton Converted McLatchey's Try and Then Dropped a Goal—Dalhousie Lost Opportunities in First Half and Were Beaten 9 to 0.

"In the money-winning column Cox was second with \$73,437. The defeat of Dalhousie by Acadia in an exhibition match at Halifax Monday by the score of 9 to 0 according to accounts in the Halifax press was accomplished through Dalhousie neglecting the opportunities of the first half and then being unable to do much after Acadia got the advantage of the wind in the second. Hubert Davidson son of ex-Ald. Alex. Davidson of this city was the heavy scorer converting McLatchey's try and soon afterward dropping a nice field-goal.

Account of the Game.

The Halifax Chronicle has the following account of the game:— The Acadia University Rugby team sprang a surprise on Dalhousie yesterday and defeated them by the score of 9 to 0 on the Studley campus.

The Acadia fifteen were full of vim, tackled hard, and made the most of their opportunities, whilst Dalhousie played listlessly and made countless bad passes. Although Dalhousie had the better of the territory all through, they were not able to cross their opponents' line.

The field was very slippery and a strong wind blew during the game.

Scoreless Period.

Dalhousie had the western end of the field during the first half, with the wind in their favor and they kept the ball almost continuously in the Red and Blue territory. Many attempts were made to score and the Tigers carried the ball to the line quite often but did not have the required punch to register a try. The Acadia men were marking the dangerous Gold and Black three-quarter line well and proved themselves good on defensive work. Dalhousie were in position to drop kick several times but it was never attempted and the period ended with no score.

Second Half.

In the second half Acadia had the wind with them and punted far into Dalhousie territory. After a scrimmage

This makes a total of \$56,204.50 and places him third in the table of money winning drivers this year.

"Fred Egan's mount behind Thompson Dillon at Toledo when he won the \$25,000 trot jumped his winnings in the Grand Circuit this year to \$29,475. Nat Ray gathered in \$22,625.50, his largest item being the \$15,325 Tarzan Grattan won at Kalamazoo.

mage near the Tigers' line McLatchy secured the pigskin and broke through the opposing players for a try, which Davidson easily converted.

The Gold and Black warriors endeavored to gain the other end of the field but it was useless to punt as the high wind would carry the ball in the wrong direction. After several runs by both sides a scrimmage took place near the 40 yard line and when Davidson received a pass out he made a neat drop kick which passed cleanly between the posts for four more points.

This startled Dalhousie and they commenced to wake up. By dint of hard work they got the ball up the field in short stages and reached a scoring position where Acadia touched for safety twice. The situation was relieved by the 25 yard drop out and play went to centre field. The local scrum now had complete control of the ball and heeled out nine times out of ten but it availed little as the Acadia men were fast workers and nailed them before they could get away or else Dalhousie missed the pass.

The whistle blew for the end of the contest with the visitors victorious by nine points. Murphy was the best of the Tigers followed by Moore, Harrington, Baird and Tupper.

Noble in the backfield played a splendid game for Acadia. Davidson McLatchy, Elderton and Hamilton played well. Norman Ralston refereed.

M'GILL WON FIRST GAME FOR MACTIER CUP

Vickers Ltd. Makes the Fourth Team Playing English Rugby in Montreal — Hamilton Tied U. of T.

Montreal, Oct. 27—The Montreal English Rugby Club defeated Vickers in an exhibition game played at the Vickers grounds on Saturday by 3 (one dropped goal and three tries) to nil. Montreal held the upper hand throughout but considering that that was Vickers first match the latter put up a good defence and deserved to score on at least one occasion when Phillips made a splendid run over half the length of the field and was only a few yards from the line when he was pulled down.

The Montreal forwards were far superior, but failed badly in heeling clearly from the scrums and thus robbed their very capable back division of many opportunities. The Montreal three quarters are all fast and know how to handle but there were occasions when their passes were not well timed. Montreal secured possession in four out of five scrums but owing to faulty heeling the ball was too frequently held by the second or third row of the forwards instead of sending it back quickly to Seager at half back.

Vickers were well served in the back divisions by Lead, Haynes Miller and Alden. Miller was very good while Alden who is really the centre three-quarter of the Montreal team, showed probably the best form which he has yet displayed in Canada. The best of Vickers forwards was Phillips, while several others also did well. Cohen, Seaman and Archibald were the pick of the Montreal forwards but Nicolle and Jones also showed splendid form. All of the Montreal backs showed fine form. Strict attention to training should enable the club to retain possession of the A. D. MacTier Cup for another year.

The scorers for Montreal were McCay, who dropped a nice goal; Macdougall, two tries and Witherpoon one try.

The Montreal team will meet McGill in the MacTier Cup competition on Thursday and a great struggle seems assured, as McGill showed a vast improvement in defeating the Sun Life team on Saturday by eleven points to nothing. The result of Thursday's match between McGill and Montreal will probably depend on the condition of the players, as these games are always exceptionally fast.

U. of T. Rugbyists Draw.

Hamilton, Oct. 24—Hamilton and University of Toronto English Rugby teams fought a pointless game here this afternoon. U. of T. showed superior form and were within an ace of scoring on several occasions but were unable to get through for points.

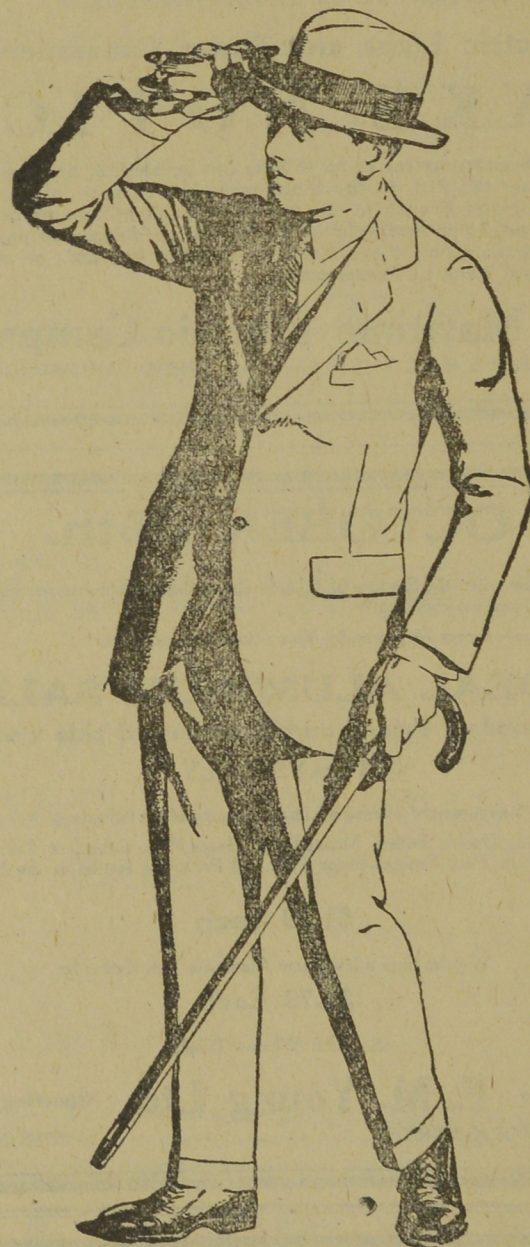
