

WM. PALMER FOUND DEAD IN HIS ROOM TODAY

Subject to Epilepsy, Deceased Passed Away During an Attack — Was Son of Former Mayor.

William Palmer, aged forty-seven years, was found dead in his room at his home at the noon hour today. He had made his home with his aunts the Misses Kilburn, 137 Charlotte street, for whom Mr. and Mrs. William Burns were keeping house. At eleven o'clock this morning Mr. Palmer was seen about the house. He went to his room. There it is believed that he was seized by an epileptic fit, being subject to such attacks. Death ensued during the attack.

Dr. D. W. Ross, coroner, was summoned and decided that death had resulted from natural causes.

Employed at Light Labor

The deceased recently had been employed at light labor about the Palmer-McLellan Shoeack Company's factory. Today he had not gone to work.

Surviving Relatives

He was a son of the late John Palmer, some time mayor of Fredericton. Surviving are two brothers Charles K. Palmer president of the John Palmer Company and James E. Palmer of the Palmer-McLellan Shoeack Company both of Fredericton, also three sisters Mrs. W. A. B. McLellan of Fredericton, Miss Hazel Palmer of Toronto and Miss Grace Palmer of Fredericton. The time of funeral will be announced later.

REFUSED TO TAKE INFORMATION RE SAVAGE DOG

An Amazing Situation Which Has Resulted From Recent Action of City Council and Court Decision.

A remarkable condition of affairs has arisen in Fredericton as the result of the action taken by the City Council some weeks ago in amending the bylaw relating to dogs and as the result of a recent decision by His Honor Judge Slipp on a case taken on review from the Police Court in this city in which judgment had been against the owner of a dog alleged to be dangerous. Within the past day or two the parents of a little girl appeared before Police Magistrate Limerick and told him that their daughter had been attacked and severely mangled by a savage dog. Medical attendance had been necessary and the bill from the physician amounted to about twenty-five dollars. Information against the owner of the dog was what they wished to lay. The Police Magistrate refused to receive the information saying that the action of the City Council in amending the bylaws had placed all dogs beyond the control of the police and the decision of Judge Slipp had declared that any bylaw relating to savage or dangerous dogs was ultra vires of the City Council. Because of those facts, said the magistrate, he was powerless to take action. He advised that the parents consult a lawyer in the situation.

Dogs in Control.

The situation seems to be that the dogs are in control of the situation and that the individual citizen must protect himself against them. The action of the City Council in regard to the dog bylaw was taken after a delegation of citizens had appeared and also had their views presented by a barrister. The delegation was composed of owners of dogs who objected to the action of the police on instruction by the Police Commission to enforce the bylaw relating to dogs to its fullest extent. The Police Commission states that it was on the request of the City Council that such instruction was given.

Six More Voted at Advance Poll Tuesday Night — Candidates to Stand at the Rural Polls.

Conservative headquarters announced today that R. B. Hanson, K. C., Conservative candidate would stand at Burr's Corner on election day. Liberal headquarters stated that it was expected that C. R. Hawkins Liberal candidate would stand at polls in Sunbury County.

At Geary J. B. Dickson and Dr. R. H. McGrand of Welsford spoke. E. Allison MacKay spoke at Hammondville and Ex-Warden E. W. Stairs and C. R. Barry spoke at Lower Maugerville.
