LARGE STOCKS OF GASOLINE LED TO SLASH IN PRICE

New York, Sept. 6.—Declaring that there is no industry in this country today so keenly competitive as that of petroleum, the Standard Oil Company of New Jersey, in the current issue of its publication, the Lamp, explains the reason for the recent reduction in gasoline prices.

In 1923 and 1924 when the three new fields in the Los Angeles basin were flooding California with crude, it points out that approximately 95,000,000 barrels were shipped through the Panama canal and refined at Atlantic ports. During the same period the stock of gasoline and tops in California increased from 3,000,000 barrels to more than 20,000,000, but it was not until recently that receipts of this commodity at Atlantic ports were in sufficient quantities directly to influence the Eastern markets.

Time to Reduce Stocks

"The carrying charge on gasoline is heavy if evaporation and loss of interest on money invested in stocks and tanks be taken into consideration," the publication says. "Evidently California refiners became tired of the burden and decided that this was the time to reduce gasoline stocks, especially since the long expected reduction in output of California crude has failed to materialize and deeper sands lend fear of overproduction for months to come. They recognized that even now, at the peak of consumption, they were currently refining from crude and producing from absorption and casinghead something over 20,000 barrels daily of gasoline in excess of the requirements on the Pacific coast."

"Since Jan. 1 more than 7,000,000 barrels of California gasoline have been shipped into the eastern market and present receipts are close to 2,000,000 barrels a month."

"Still the large quantity of the gasoline laid down at the Atlantic seaboard during 1925 might not of itself have seriously disturbed the eastern gasoline prices if eastern refiners and especially those in the mid-continent had not equipped themselves for a volume of business based on published statistics indicating a gain of 28.5 per cent. in domestic gasoline consumption for the first quarter of this year over the same period of 1924. However, that was done and the increase in consumption has not been maintained at this rate."

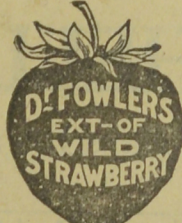
"It now appears that retailers have been running in the neighborhood of 200,000 barrels a day too much crude East of the Rockies they are taking it out of field and pipeline storage and either piling it up at their plants in the form of finished product or balancing purchases with sales and not reducing stocks. A decline in the selling price for gasoline naturally resulted and is simply another example of the operation of the law of supply and demand."

KING BORIS OF BULGARIA IS POISON VICTIM

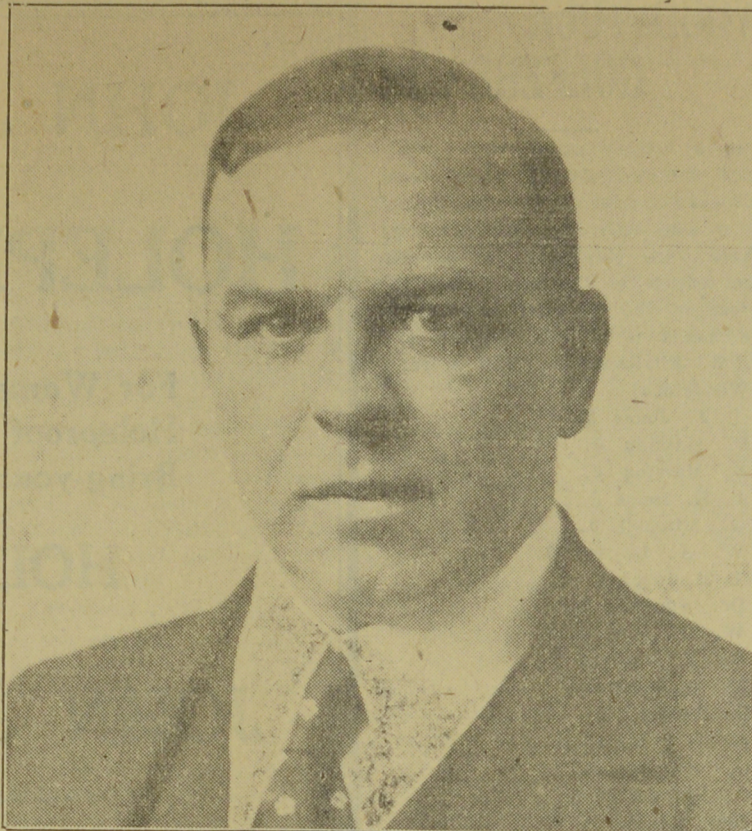
Rome, Sept. 5.—The Giornale d'Italia today publishes a report that King Boris of Bulgaria is gravely ill from the effects of poison and that specialists have been rushed to Varna to attend his Majesty.

According to the report Princess Eudoxie, the King's sister said that a Court physician found bacilli of typhus fever in a dessert prepared for the King. This dish was served by a cook who is suspected of having been induced to administer poison by members of the Bulgarian Military League. These persons, the Giornale d'Italia says, were seeking retaliation for the King's refusal to sign death warrants for several Communists recently convicted of treason and sentenced to die.

PUBLICATION OF TAX PAYMENTS CALLED FAILURE

New York, Sept. 5.—The effect of the publication of income tax payments was being generally discussed today as millions noted in the newspapers the taxes on President Coolidge, industrial magnates, movie stars, baseball players, neighbors, and so on.

As a result of a questionnaire submitted to 60 collectors of internal revenue in the principal centres of the country, the New York Times concludes that it is their general opinion that publication of payments has had no beneficial effect. There has been no increase of revenue from delinquents who might fail to file returns if publication of payments were prohibited.

Adds to Expense.

Some of the collectors think that publication of payments results only in additional expense to the government without any direct return. One collector wires that publication causes erroneous opinions to be formed reflecting on the integrity of honest citizenship.

Despite the fact that the lists furnish insufficient information for an accurate estimate of a person's financial standing, salesmen, wives intending to sue for divorce, business rivals and others with personal interests, jammed revenue offices with newspaper men. In some districts collectors reported little interest.

One of the principal reasons for lack of accurate information is the fact that tax exempt securities offer escape from paying them. While the total gross income is recorded in each return, only the actual tax paid is made public.

The effect of the 25 per cent. reduction in assessments was noticeable. The lower rate has failed to draw out capital invested in tax exempt securities.

TRAVELLING FISH MARKETS TO BREAK TRUST

Buenos Aires, Sept. 5.—Travelling fish markets are being provided by the municipal authorities of Buenos Aires in an effort to break the grip of the fish trust. Specially constructed bodies have been mounted on motor trucks and trailers, upon which fresh fish will be displayed for sale the day after being taken from the ocean at Mar del Plata, six hours distant by train. So firm a grip has the Argentine fish trust on the sale of fresh fish in this city that fish-food is a luxury, the price putting it beyond the reach of most workers' families. Another move of the city authorities to reduce the cost of essential foods is the establishment of a municipal bakery to bring down the price of bread.

The Buenos Aires city council has announced that it will spend \$250,000 to acquire a municipal flour mill and a bakery through which to regulate the prices to be charged for the "staff of life."

THE VIENNESE SPEND HAPPY DAYS ON DANUBE

Vienna, Sept. 5.—During the hot summer days Viennese transportation facilities are severely strained to handle the traffic to the shores of the Danube. Graensehaufel, being nearest, is the most popular resort on week days, and Kitzendorf, farther up the river, calls the crowds on Saturday afternoon and Sundays. At Graensehaufel the city the transformed an island into a second Hawaiian beach but without the waves. Outside of the life guards, who see to it that no one swims beyond the buoy cable, there are no restrictions. One is free to take off or leave on as much clothing as one wishes. Usually the Viennese prefer to swim as unencumbered as possible, and while digging in the sand they like to have the sun's rays reach all parts of the body. Bathing costumes therefore are of a brevity that astonishes foreigners. But there is never the slightest rowdyism, indecency or drunkenness. Family parties separate into "Herren" and "Damen" at the entrance and meet on the beach where they swim and bask in the sunshine. Kitzendorf is larger, extending for a mile or more along the Danube. There one may jump in the cool water and float down at high speed. On the beach is a large orchestra before which hundreds dance, many in abbreviated bathing suits.

The enjoyment is so simple and natural that one wonders if the Viennese have not found some secret of life still concealed from others. They have not much for which to be glad, but they are glad.
