## IMPORTANT SPEECH BY PREMIER

in the public interest ensuring the retention of Sir Henry's services.

#### Immigration Policy.

"How closely allied the problems of transportation and immigration are will be apparent in a moment's reflection. The one without the other is incapable of a satisfactory solution. We require a vigorous immigration policy, a policy which will recognize the inter-relation and inter-dependence of transportation and immigration, a policy moreover, which will have regard for quality in the class of immigrants to be brought to Canada, and regard as well for our own industrial standards and conditions.

#### Prophets Of Despair.

"Are the prophets of despair the men to be put in charge of the administration of the country's affairs? We need, at least, men who have faith in Canada, men who are not continually decrying the conditions under which they live. The entire immigration service of the United States has not been as helpful to the government of that country in securing immigrants from Canada and from Europe as Mr. Meighen has been. As an American immigration propagandist he has excelled even himself. In this regard, albeit unwittingly, he has fallen but one step short as a propagandist of annexation.

"The other main deterrent of immigration to Canada is the very great increase in the cost of ocean fares.

#### Co-operation Overseas.

"Within the past few days an arrangement has come to between the department of immigration and the railways companies, whereby their agencies overseas will be brought into more effective co-operation with each other, and with the government, thus effecting a measure of the kind of enlightened co-operation to which I alluded a moment ago. Another all-important step has been taken in the appointment of a minister of immigration, who will be in a position to give his entire time to the important work of that department.

"As the country knows, the Hon. Mr. Robb, in addition to being Minister of Immigration, has for two years past been acting minister of finance, owing to the impaired health of the Rt. Hon. Mr. Fielding. After having held the important post of minister of finance in the government of Canada for a period in all of some 19 years, Mr. Fielding has asked to be relieved of his responsible duties.

#### Fielding Steps Out.

"Mr. Fielding has expressed a desire to retire from public life, and the condition of his health being what it is, his resignation as a member of the government has been accepted.

"I know I express the opinion of his fellow-countrymen, in all parts of Canada, when I say that no minister of the Crown ever served his country with greater fidelity, integrity and industry, or left in the annals of its history, a record of more useful disinterested public service than Mr. Fielding. Members of all parties in parliament are glad to join in asking Mr. Fielding on his retirement, from public life, to accept an annuity in recognition of his distinguished services to his country. It will be the hope of his fellow citizens in all parts of the Dominion that this expression of their gratitude and good-will may be to him, a source of comfort, and of pride, in his remaining years. The country will be pleased to know that Mr. Robb has agreed to take the portfolio of finance, and to give his undivided time and attention to the affairs of a department he had administered so admirably and efficiently during the past two years.

#### Duties' Reduction.

"We have already given substantial evidence of our resolve to carry out our policy of reduction of duties on the instruments of production and of our ability so to do in a manner which whilst of immediate benefit to consumers, and producers at large, is calculated to prove of benefit also, and not of injury to the industries most concerned.

"The Robb budget of 1923, was comparable to the Fielding budget of 1897, in what effected by way of tariff reduction, with unmistakable advantages to the great basic industries of agriculture, lumbering, fishing, and mining, and consequent benefit to all industry deriving its raw material and its markets from these sources.

"Our fiscal reforms have not stopped there. Another feature of our policy has been the encouragement of export trade by treaties and the encouragement in particular of inter-imperial preferential trading in a manner which will help our ports and railways. By giving a discount of 10 per cent off the preferential rate of duty on goods entitled to the British preference and the conditions we have attached to other preferential treaties, we have attached to other preferential treaties, we have diverted practically the entire trade with the Mother

Country, and sister Dominions, to our own ports, much to their benefit, and to the benefit of our railways as well.

"We have removed the sales tax in whole or in part, from a large list of commodities in the nature of the necessities of life and on all implements of production, and we have made not a few other tariff reductions. Whilst being careful to have regard for existing conditions and the well-being of established industry and trade, we have moved steadily in the direction of freeing industry and the consuming public from a burden of taxation they would otherwise have had to bear.

#### Status of Canada.

"Canada is no longer an aggregation of loosely-knit communities, feeling their way from a colonial status into the consciousness of nationhood; it is a nation within the community of nations which we call the British Empire a nation in the League of Nations, holding an acknowledged position in world affairs. We have no longer stretches of railways unconnected and in process of construction we have the two largest systems of railway in the world. Our trade on the Pacific Ocean bids fair to rival our trade on the Atlantic. We reach Europe as well as the Orient via the gateway of the Pacific.

"A national policy of today is not a policy which will give Canada a place in her own eyes. It is a policy which will give Canada a place in the eyes of the world. It is a policy not of home markets, but of world markets.

#### Mr. Meighen's Policy.

"I shall go a step further, and say that Mr. Meighen's tariff policy, far from being a national policy, is the reverse of national. The old N. P. aimed at binding Canada together. If a higher tariff is applied now it will split Canada into fragments. It will set the East against the West. It would break Confederation. We cannot have either high tariff or absolutely free trade in Canada, as I shall hope presently to show. Our tariff must have regard for all parts of the country in its present stage of development.

#### Tariff Issue Difficult.

"It may not be an easy matter to bring about the tariff best suited to our national needs. Such a tariff will certainly not be brought about by a ministry acting blindly or action upon insufficient or unreliable information. It can, I believe, be brought about as the result of careful investigation, accurate knowledge and expert opinion, applied to the tariff, as a means of revenue, and which will have regard for the safe-guarding of our established industries against conditions elsewhere that may be prejudicial to their well-being and development. A tariff so framed, and fashioned, should inspire trust and confidence.

"An advisory board of taxation would have all the advantages of a tariff commission without any of its obvious limitations or disadvantages. It would have many additional advantages, among them the fact that it would function more efficiently and at a minimum of cost to the country.

#### Senate Troubles.

"I come now to the fourth of the reasons I have mentioned why an appeal should not be delayed. I have spoken of the difficulties with which the present Government has had to contend through not having a majority in the House of Commons. We have, in fact, been face to face with a Senate chamber politically hostile to our own, and one that has not hesitated to make its hostility known and felt on innumerable occasions. I need not enumerate the many measures that have passed the Commons only to be thrown out or emasculated by the Senate—measures of social and moral reforms, of restriction of gambling, of railway aid, of relief to Home Bank depositors, of extension of rural credits, measures of special concern to returned soldiers, to labor and to others.

#### Two Steps Necessary.

"To amend the constitution and the powers of the senate, two steps are necessary. The senate itself must be a party to the reform recommended, and the imperial parliament must act. It is reasonable, I think, to assume that before the imperial parliament would enact the necessary legislation by way of amendment to the British North America Act, it would expect on a matter of this kind, an address of both houses of the Canadian parliament. It is as reasonable to assume that upon such an address from both houses, it would not hesitate to act. There are two ways of bringing about between two houses in the matter of an address to the imperial parliament; one, the indirect method of summoning a conference of representatives of all the provinces of the Dominion, and seeking at such a gathering to obtain unanimity of view with respect to the amendments of the constitution and powers of the senate, the other the ap-

pointment of senators prepared to support senate reform. An agreement reached at such a conference, if introduced, in the form of a resolution, would scarcely fail to pass both houses.

#### To Call Conference.

"As is known, the government has declared its intention of calling a conference of the province to deal with the question of senate reform. Mr. Meighen is asking why the conference has not yet been called. I shall give him the answer. It is that the conference should be preceded by a general election at which the reform of the senate is a principal issue, in order that its deliberations may be influenced by the known will of the people.

#### Issue Up to People.

"That is another reason why I think an early election is advisable. I have undertaken if the government is in office, to see that the conference of the provinces will be held before another session of parliament.

"It will be for the people at a general election to make their will and wishes known.

"The conference method at its best is reform from without. There still remains need for action endorsing the conference proposals on the part of the senate itself. That, with respect to some who are at present members of the Upper Chamber, is none too certain. What is required is to reform the senate from within, not from without. Reform from within can be effected only by making certain of the presence in the senate of a sufficient number of members who can be relied upon to support and carry through that chamber whatever measure of senate reform may be sent from the Commons as a part of government policy.

#### Providence Aids Party.

"In this great and good work Providence has been aiding the Liberal party. When we came into office the Tory majority was 26. At the close of the last session of parliament it was 22. Yesterday it was 23. Today, I am happy to say, it has been reduced to 15 through the appointment with in the past 24 hours of eight senators each of whom has expressed his intention of supporting whatever measure of senate reform the present government may submit in furtherance of its policy to bring the constitution and powers of that body more into accord with the spirit of the time in which we live.

#### To Meet Senate Issues.

"May I say that the government has decided without further delay, to meet the issue of responsible government raised by the senate, and I now ask the Liberal press of this country, as well as all who desire to see Liberal traditions and principles upheld, to join me in making senate reform a certainty in the only way that is at all likely to accomplish that end. As has been truly said, 'a vote for a Liberal candidate is a vote to bring the senate into line with the Liberal government and the House of Commons. A vote for a Conservative candidate is a vote to bring the government and the House of Commons in line with the senate,' a vote, as has also been said, 'to surrender the direction of public affairs in Canada, to a substantial oligarchy.'

#### Election Decided on.

"What I have said will have been sufficient to disclose that the government has decided upon a general election to be held this year. Immediately upon the return of the Governor-General to the capital yesterday, I waited upon His Excellency at Government House, and presented to him the many considerations for an appeal to the electorate before another session of parliament, which I have presented to you this afternoon. I asked for an immediate dissolution of parliament, and was told by His Excellency, that the request would be granted. The minute-of-council, requesting a dissolution of parliament, was passed by the cabinet at a meeting held before I left Ottawa last night. Since I have been addressing you, word has come to me from Ottawa, that the order dissolving parliament was signed by His Excellency.

"The fourteenth parliament of Canada is therefore no longer in existence; it has passed into history and from its record on divisions, will be known as the parliament of large majorities, though at the beginning and at the close the government party majority in the House of Commons, was but one. Could there be more irrefutable evidence of the degree, to which in administering the affairs of the country over a period of four years, we have won and retained the confidence and support of the House of Commons? We now make our appeal for support not to parliament but to the people and ask for that expression of public confidence which we believe our record of four years merits, and for such support in a newly elected House of Commons, as will enable us to give effect in legislation to the policies I have outlined this afternoon, and which we believe to be in the interests of national economy, national growth and national unity.

## BIG SALMON CAUGHT TODAY BY R.H. WHEELER

### A Twenty-two Pounder Gave Angler a Very Exciting Battle.

The record salmon of the season taken on a fly in the St. John River, was caught at the Hart's Island pool this morning by Mr. Roland H. Wheeler of Kingsclear. It weighed twenty-two pounds and gave Mr. Wheeler a fierce battle which lasted almost an hour. The fish was hooked from the bar near the centre of the pool, and Mr. Wheeler being all alone at the time soon found that he had a tough job on his hands. The fish started down stream with a rush, leaping out of the water as it went in a futile effort to get rid of the fly, which was the cause of its trouble. Mr. Wheeler had his canoe in waiting at the foot of the bar and after boarding it he succeeded in leading his catch down to the shore of Hart's Island opposite Mr. Wardlow Kilburn's summer camp. He made several attempts to gaff the fish and giving it up as a bad job he shouted to Mr. Tyler Mills, who was working at Mr. Kilburn's camp to lend him a helping hand. Mr. Mills launched a canoe, and was soon alongside of Mr. Wheeler and with his assistance the big fish was safely landed. Mr. Wheeler who is a very skilful angler is naturally very proud of his catch and he is receiving many congratulations on his success in catching the record fish of the season.

## 3 VILLAGES DESTROYED IN EARTHQUAKE

London, Sept. 8.—The central news Constantinople reported today that an earthquake had resulted in the destruction of three villages in the Dineir district. A definite statement as to casualties was lacking.

Dineir is in Asiatic Turkey at the site of the ancient Celsaene.
