

HEAD ON COLLISION AT BURTON

George Goan in Hospital
as a Result—Cars De-
molished—Drivers
Could Not See—No
Other Occupants.

George Goan, 18-year-old son of Sheriff Goan of Oromocto is in the hospital today as a result of a head-on collision with a car driven by Arthur Hoben. He is severely cut about the face and head and may be injured internally. He spent a comfortable night.

The accident occurred on a little hill in front of the Burton Court House yesterday morning, young Goan driving a Dodge was in the middle of the road when coming over the hill he saw a Chalmers car also in the middle of the road. The knoll prevented the drivers from seeing each other until it was too late. Neither car overturned but such was the force of the impact that both cars were crushed almost beyond hope of repair. The Goan car was brought to Fredericton and is almost a ruin. The Hoben car is still in the ditch and is thought to be utterly smashed beyond repair. Arthur Hoben was not so seriously hurt. It is a miracle that both young men were not killed. Both cars were evidently travelling at a high rate of speed. There were no other occupants in the cars besides the drivers.

He has returned to the city and is holding a formal investigation today behind closed doors. Over twenty witnesses are being called and it is thought that some trace of the so called firebug will be found. The Arctic Rink fire will be looked into also. 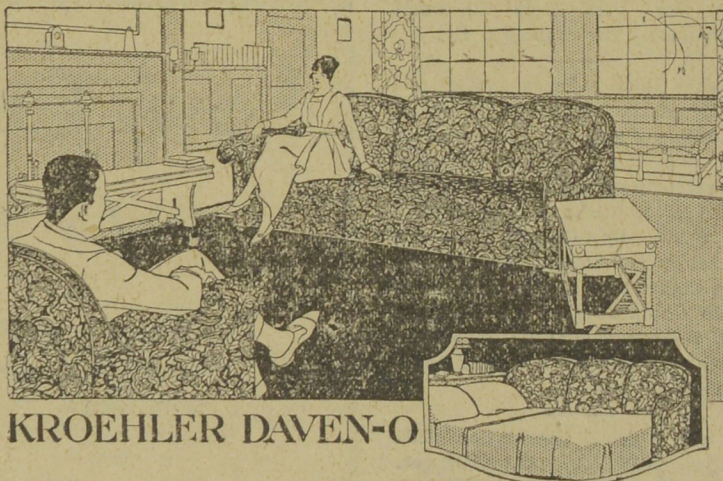

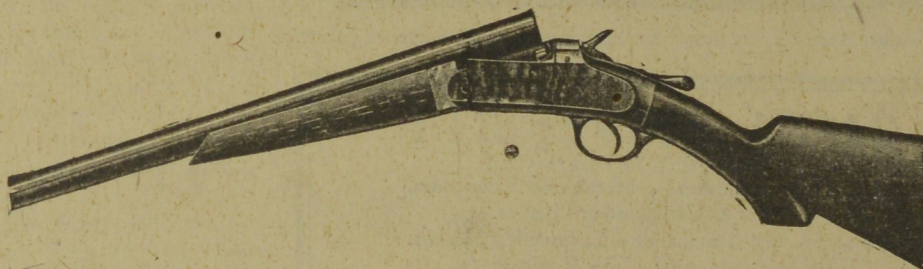
