## TOURISTS IN ENGLAND IN BUS WRECK

Six American Women and Driver Badly Injured Today.

TRIED TO AVOID HITTING DOG

Other Passengers Able To Take Train to London.

(Special cable to the Daily Mail by the British United Press.)

London, July 15—Six women and the driver of an auto-bus laden with American tourists were seriously injured today when the car skidded, colliding with farms buildings at Langham, Rutland and overturning as the driver sought to avoid hitting a dog. The motor bus was wrecked.

Communication with Oakham, Rutland, brought the information that aside from the driver and the six women, other passengers were not seriously injured and were able to proceed to London by train.

The wrecked machine was one of several carrying a party of 50 Americans scheduled to make a fortnight tour of Scotland.

## SCOTLAND YARD DETECTIVES TO LEARN RUSSIAN

London, July 16—Scotland Yard detectives of future fiction may be expected to voice torrents of polysyllabic Slavonic if the occasion arises and if writers follow life, for a number of men from the Yard have been assigned to the task of learning Russian.

This has been necessitated by the increased vigilance of British police authorities against Communists. Recently threatening letters have been received both by the accredited Soviet representatives here and by Czarist emigres.

Scotland Yard men for three weeks have been guarding day and night the home of ex-Grand Duke Michael in Cambridge Gate, Regent's Park. The grand duke has not been active in politics lately. He lives very quietly, but nevertheless every now and then he receives threatening letters that make him exceedingly nervous.

## LEAPS ABOARD LOCOMOTIVE WHEN CAR HIT

Syracuse, July 16—Monday the 13th proved a lucky day for Gerald Larrabee, Syracuse motorist, when his automobile was struck by a New York Central Railroad train passing through a street near the center of the city.

Larrabee drove his coupe from a side street in front of the train and saw he could not escape being struck so he opened the door of his car took a flying leap and rode on the pilot of the engine for several hundred feet watching his automobile ground to shapeless wreckage before the train could be stopped. Medical examination showed Larrabee to be only slightly bruised.

## PREDICTS CITY OF MEXICO WILL BE DESTROYED

Father Tifnio Expects Big Earthquake in Three Days.

ERUPTIONS TO START FRIDAY

Impending Doom Has Caused Residents No Alarm.

Mexico City, July 16—This city will be destroyed by an earthquake within three days, according to Father Tifnio, of Pueblo.

The tremors will be accompanied by eruptions beginning Friday from Pohocapapi, the great mountain near by, Father Tifnio says.

Despite the awful fate predicted for them, the residents of the capital are unalarmed.

The pontiff made his speech in an undertone to Father Mindorff, who repeated the words to the pilgrims.

## Russian Physician In Shanghai is Held On Bribery Charge

Attempted to Bribe Russian Policeman to Testify Communist Certificate Was a Forgery—Arrest May Unfold Tale of Soviet Intrigue—Report of Diplomatic Commission Said to be Unfavorable to Municipal Government.

Shanghai, July 16—Another important angle of the general strike situation here has developed in the arrest of Dr. Eugene Fortonotoff, Russian physician to the Communist Consul on a charge of attempting to bribe a Russian policeman to testify a certificate bearing the seal of the Communist agitation department, found on Zinovis Dossier, alleged Soviet agent, was a forgery committed by the policeman.

## Soviet Intrigue.

The foreign authorities believe the arrest will unfold a tale of Soviet intrigue and may free Dossier from the pending charge.

The political atmosphere is somewhat disturbed by reports that the findings of the diplomatic commission investigating the Shanghai situation were unfavorable to the municipal government.

## PREMIER AT GAGETOWN AND SAINT JOHN

Premier Venio, after being rushed with departmental and other business here left by motor shortly after noon today for Gagetown where this afternoon he attended and addressed the nominating convention in Queen's County where candidates were to be named in the Liberal interest. It was his intention to proceed after the convention to Saint John where the city convention will be held by the Liberals tonight.

The Premier will be back here on Friday and if possible will be in Bathurst on Saturday.

## ABANDONED ATTEMPT TO SWIM CHANNEL

Dover, Eng., July 16—After buffetting her way across the Channel within five miles of her goal Miss Lillian Harrison daring Argentine swimmer abandoned her attempt of swimming the great stretch of water this afternoon. She had made her way to within sight of the English coast in fair weather.

## STAMPS WORTH \$50,000 LEFT FOR YEARS IN ATTIC

London, July 15—More than \$50,000 worth of unique stamps have been discovered under romantic circumstances in the attic of a titled woman's house in fashionable Mayfair. There are complete sheets of stamps which are of rare value. They were purchased for about \$100 in 1864 by the grandfather of the present owner's husband and had lain in the attic ever since.

It was only by chance they were discovered recently when the woman went to the attic and accidentally came across them. They are to be sold by auction.

## T. T. GOODWIN NOMINATED IN MONCTON

Prominent Barrister is Unanimously Chosen as the Government Candidate.

Moncton, July 15—Alderman Tuttle T. Goodwin, was the unanimous choice of the Liberal convention held here tonight to nominate a candidate to contest the City of Moncton in the interest of the Provincial Government. There was only one name before the meeting. Alderman Goodwin accepted the nomination. Attorney-General Rand was one of the speakers.

The meeting was held in the City Building with A. E. McSweeney as chairman and R. M. Palmer as secretary.

When Mr. McSweeney asked for nomination of candidates, John A. Doherty moved and A. E. Tremblay seconded, that Mr. Goodwin be the candidate. On motion of J. C. Sherron, the nominations closed.

Mr. Goodwin was called to the platform and, in accepting the nomination, thanked the convention for the confidence they had shown in him and, continuing, dealt at some length upon matters before the electors. He also spoke on the policy of the Venio Government as regards the hydro question. If elected, Mr. Goodwin said he would do his best.

Hon. Fred Magee, of Port Elgin, congratulated the convention on the choice of candidate they had made and went on to deal with various policies of the Provincial Government referring particularly to the hydro development at Musquash and Grand Falls.

## Attorney-General.

The chairman appointed a resolution committee consisting of John A. Doherty, R. A. Frechette, J. C. Sherron and O. L. Barbour. While the resolutions were being prepared, Hon. Ivan C. Rand, Attorney-General, addressed the convention and dealt largely with the hydro question. He referred to the Government policies regarding the Grand Falls, and said that it was the great question that had come before the Legislature of New Brunswick during the last 25 years. He also criticized statements made by Hon. J. B. B. Baxter, K. C., M. P., and other Opposition speakers regarding the hydro question and financial policies of the Provincial Government.

A resolution supported the hydro policy of the Government and stated that benefits accruing from the Grand Falls development would undoubtedly be followed ultimately by

Tyrol Government Acts to Stop Repetition of Trouble.

FOUR U. S. WOMEN ARE DELEGATES

Recent Disturbance Not Against English and French.

Innsbruck, Austria, July 15—The second public meeting of the conference of the International League for Peace and Freedom, called for today was prohibited by the Tyrol Provincial Government in order to prevent a repetition of disturbances such as marked the first public meeting last night, when German Nationalist students prevented the speakers from being heard.

## EXPLORERS OF MT. LOGAN FEARED LOST

Anxiety Felt for Safety of Captain McCarthy and Two Men.

REACHED SUMMIT ON 23RD JUNE

Not Seen Since Leaving on Raft to Decend Chitina River.

Cordova, Alaska, July 16—Fear was expressed here today for the safety of Captain A. H. McCarthy and two men, members of nine explorers who on June 23 reached the summit of Mount Logan hitherto unscathed.

McCarthy and the two men Foster and Carpe took a raft at the bottom of the mountain for the descent of the perilous Chitina river to Cordova. They have not yet arrived.

Four others of the party who left on another raft at the same time arrived safely and two of them left Tuesday aboard the steamer Alaska for Seattle. H. A. Lambert of Ottawa, Ontario a member of the party suffered frozen feet and is now in a hospital at Chitina.

## ROYALIST SCHOOLBOYS HOOT HERRIOTT

Paris, July 15—Ex-Premier Herriot was hooted and howled at by irreverent youngsters of his old preparatory school today, when in a double capacity of an "old grad" and President of the Chamber of Deputies he tried to officiate at the graduating exercises of the Lycee Louis de Grand in the Latin Quarter. Young royalist students booed, hissed and whistled so fervently that the police had to be called in and twenty arrests made.

Later when the Chamber of Deputies convened for the day all of Herriot's supporters in the Left bloc acclaimed him, shouting "Down with the assassins of L'Action Francaise" (the royalist newspaper). M. Herriot, waving his hands, thanked his adherents and called the Chamber to order.

## FURNITURE PLANT GOES UP IN FLAMES

Oxford, N. S. July 16—The entire plant of the Oxford Furniture Company was destroyed by fire here yesterday. The outbreak started in the engine room due to a defective boiler. The loss estimated at \$50,000 is covered by only \$5,000 insurance. Several firemen received bad burns on the face and hands.
