Auto Department**WILL ENDEAVOR TO REMEDY THE
ECONOMIC DISABILITIES
OF THE MARITIME PROVINCES**

Winnipeg, Nov. 18—"Whereas the
statements made to this conference
of Boards of Trade and Chambers
of Commerce of Canada by repre-
sentatives of New Brunswick, Nova
Scotia and Prince Edward Island
reveal a serious economic situation
in those provinces.

"And whereas this serious situ-
ation is a menace to the welfare of
the Dominion of Canada as a
whole and therefore a matter of
concern to all Canadians.

"Therefore be it resolved that
this conference urge the Dominion
Government immediately to take
such steps as may be necessary
and justifiable by the circumstances
as will remedy the economic dis-
abilities which now prevent the
Maritime Provinces from realizing
those advantages which under Con-
federation and the subsequent de-
velopment of the Dominion of Can-
ada should have accrued to them."

The above was the first resolution
adopted by the conference this
afternoon and it was greeted with
more vigorous applause than any
others of those adopted.

A Dominion Board.

Winnipeg, Nov. 18—Formation of
a Dominion Board of Trade recogni-
tion and endorsement of the Mar-
itime case, creation of a non-political
advisory board on colonization and
agricultural development, etc., were
endorsed in resolutions formulated
today at the final session of the
first Dominion-wide economic con-
ference.

Action which will follow, will
place in the concrete form the re-
sults of the three-day deliberations
of the conference which was partici-

pated in by individuals, and leaders
from every section of Canada.

J. D. Palmer Speaks.

J. D. Palmer in a few fervent
words, expressed appreciation of
the Maritimes' resolution, and de-
clared that all the seaboard wanted
was the removal of disabilities and
its people would make it the gem
of Canada.

The action of the Conference, ac-
cording to Mr. Palmer displayed a
sincere spirit of good will and a
desire to give and take.

"By your endorsement of our re-
quests you have treated our peculiar
problems from a standpoint of a
national concern," he said. "We are
ready to tackle our local difficulties
and all we want now is the op-
portunity to grow and develop,
that we may share in the general
prosperity of Canada. If your re-
commendation finds expression in
a serious attempt to relieve our
plight, can safely look forward to
the time when the Maritime Pro-
vinces happy, prosperous and content-
ed, will blossom like a rose."

Universal applause showed the
feeling of the meeting.

The last word of the convention
was spoken by A. M. Belding who
introduced the delegates to them-
selves as the Fathers of the Second
Confederation, the Confederation of
mutual understanding, good-will and
confidence of whom it might be
said as the tablet in Charlottetown
says of the original fathers that
they builded better than they knew.
Three cheers were given for Chair-
man Gundy and Mr. Belding and
the conference closed with the fer-
vent singing of the National Anthem.

**FIVE HUNDRED GALLONS OF
RUM SEIZED AT TANTALLON, N. S.**

(Halifax Chronicle.)

Rum to the value of \$5,000, contain-
ed in ninety kegs of five gallons each,
was seized on the property of Loftus
Manuels, at Upper Tantallon, St. Mar-
garet's Bay, by Deputy Chief of Police
Edward Barrett of Halifax, Customs
Officer T. J. Healy, and Dudley Mur-
ray, of the Court House, Halifax, yes-
terday afternoon. It was brought to
Halifax in two large trucks of the
Halifax Transfer Company, and placed
in the Customs House. The Depart-
ment in Ottawa was advised, and ac-
tion as to the prosecution of the parties
responsible for the contraband
liquor will be taken upon today.

This is one of the largest seizures
of liquor made in the vicinity of Hal-
ifax at any time. Deputy Chief Barrett
had been given certain information
several days ago that there was a
large quantity of rum brought into the
vicinity of the upper part of St. Mar-
garet's Bay. His first information was
indefinite, other than that the liquor
was in that territory. By process of
elimination, due to a very careful in-
quiry, the Deputy Chief was able to
narrow down the field of search opera-
tions to the premises of Manuels liv-
ing about a half mile down the road
from Glen Margaret, in that section
of shore known as Upper Tantallon.
It was to this place he led Custom's
Officer Healy, accompanied by Dudley
Murray, yesterday afternoon, the party
arriving about two thirty o'clock.
Manuels denied that there was any
liquor stored about his premises.

The officers made a search of the
dwelling house first, and then accom-
panied by Manuels, visited all the out
buildings and the adjacent properties,
which might afford hiding place for
contraband. Still confident that they
were on the right trail, the officers re-
turned to the house to make another
search and on this occasion noticed
that the kitchen floor was covered
with roofing paper. Their suspicions
aroused, on further investigation they
found that two folds of this paper cov-
ered a hatch way in the kitchen floor.
While there was no cellar under the
house, there was a space of about two
feet in depth between the house and
the ground. Here in this space, their
two hours search ended, for almost
covering the ground in single tier,
were the ninety five-gallon kegs.

Manuels, confronted with the discov-
ery, refused to say anything definite.
He would neither deny nor admit that
it was his property. The only remark
he made when the search revealed the
cache was, "I am now ruined. I have
worked hard all my life, and now I
lose everything."

Custom's Officer Healy did not place
Manuels under arrest, but ordered him

to report to the Custom's this morn-
ing. In the meantime the Custom's
officials have wired Ottawa asking for
instructions as to procedure in the
case.

The officers immediately telephoned
to the city for conveyance to get the
liquor taken into custody, and the
Halifax Transfer Company sent down
two large trucks, which returned to
the city about 8.30 last night.

**GERMAN RUGBY
TEAM PLAYED AT
OXFORD, ENGLAND**

The spirit of Locarno made it-
self felt in the English world of
sport when a party of German
Rugby players visited Oxford Uni-
versity and played a team of Oxford
undergraduates, known as the "Grey-
hounds." The latter beat the Ger-
mans 32 to 3. The invaders were the
Frankfurt team, holders of the
German championship. The game
was played on the university grid-
iron, when a special request was
made that there be no "barracking,"
as the inoffensive raillery of the
British sportsman is called. The
German students arrived in England
on Sunday and were quartered at
various colleges of Oxford. Inci-
dents of the kind will do much to
heal the breach resultant from the
Great War, especially since they
involve the student bodies of the
great English and German univer-
sities. Sportsmanship is an effec-
tive dispeller of rancor.

**BOYS' AND GIRLS'
PIG CLUBS WELL
REPRESENTED****Did Well in Judging
Competition at Royal
Winter Fair.****CUP WINNER
DECIDED TODAY****Three of the Provinces
are Represented by
Girls.**

(Special to The Daily Mail.)

Toronto, Ont., Nov. 19—There was
perhaps very little of the dramatic in
one special competition which was
included in the days program at the
Royal Agricultural Winter Fair but it
was none the less tense for the six-
teen competitors who were on trail.
This competition had been arranged
for winners of boys and girls swine
clubs, eight provinces being repre-
sented by teams of two—Manitoba,
Nova Scotia and New Brunswick had
girls in the ring, while Ontario, Que-
bec, Prince Edward Island, Manitoba
and Alberta had boys. Each individ-
ual had to judge three groups of ba-
con hogs, place the animals in order
of merit and afterward explain to the
three judges the reasons which an-
imated their selections.

A Different Task.

It was quite a stiff task but it was
said afterwards that every individual
had acquitted himself or herself credi-
tably and that sound reasons were ad-
vanced by these juniors for their par-
ticular choice. The judging in the ring
formed one part of a competition
which will be continued tomorrow,
the second half being a lecture de-
monstration. At the conclusion of to-
day's section the winning team will
be awarded custody for a year of the
challenge cup presented by Mr. W. D.
Robb, Vice-president Canadian Nation-
al Railways, who has taken a very
keen interest in the work of these
clubs throughout the country. The
eight provincial teams now in Toronto
have come as guests of the Canadian
National Railways and are the parti-
cular charge of the Department of
Colonization, Agriculture and Natural
Resources of that corporation, a de-
partment which has done a great deal
to encourage the raising of a good
type of bacon hog both for the domes-
tic and export markets. Of the six-
teen boys and girls now here six are
girls and from the teams representing
Manitoba, Nova Scotia and New
Brunswick while Alberta, Saskatche-
wan, Ontario, Quebec and Prince Ed-
ward Island are represented by boys.
The whole lot are keen and alert and
each individual possesses quite a wide
knowledge on the particular subject
of this present competition as well
as on other topics which interest the
growing boy and girl. Their ages
range from fourteen to nineteen
years and the sixteen of them formed
an imposing group when they first
lined up to receive instructions from
the judges.
