

CUP WINNER DECIDED TODAY


Three of the Provinces are Represented by Girls.

(Special to The Daily Mail.) Toronto, Ont., Nov. 19-There was perhaps very little of the dramatic in one special competition which was included in the days program at the Walter N. McKiel, Druggist 143 Royal Agricultural Winter Fair but it was none the less tense for the sixteen competitors who were on trail for winners of boys and girls swine clubs, eight provinces being represented by teams of two-Manitoba, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick had girls in the ring, while Ontario, Quebec, Prince Edward Island, Manitoba Merchant, and Alberta had boys. Each individual had to judge three groups of bacon hogs, place the animals in order of merit and afterward explain to the three judges the reasons which animated their selections.

A Different Task.

It was quite a stiff task but it was said afterwards that every individual had acquitted himself or herself creditably and that sound reasons were advanced by these juniors for their particular choice. The judging in the ring formed one part of a competition which will be continued tomorrow, the second half being a lecture demonstration. At the conclusion of today's section the winning team will be awarded custody for a year of the challenge cup presented by Mr. W. D.
