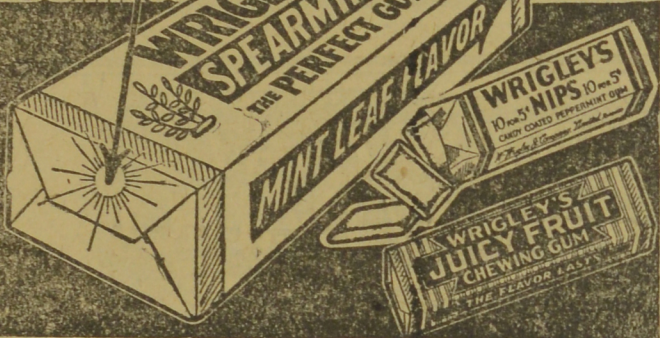

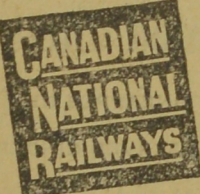

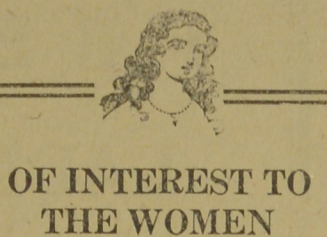

## OF INTEREST TO THE WOMEN

### LACES GRIP STYLES FOR ALL OCCASIONS.

Paris—This is going to be a lacey season if one can judge from the demi-season models now coming from the smart countries of the rue de la Paix. For nearly every type costume from the tailleur to the elaborate evening dress has some touch of lace about it.

Tailor-mades have little gold or silver cloth jumpers under their jackets with gold lace gilets, and afternoon and evening dresses are employing considerable lace flounces many are beaded as well producing glittering effects.

One noticed at the Ritz ball was made of gold lace with the jumper embroidered in beads. The skirt was of fine pleated gold lace and still another came in shiny gold cloth with the skirt draped to one side and a long panel of gold lace hanging from one shoulder.

Blanche Levouvier is showing a stunning all over lace gown of gold bordered with Veronese green panne of which there is a huge bow in the back. This gold and green combination is second to gold and black for the season's popularity.

### SAUSAGE.

Sausage is made of some form of meat ground fine and highly seasoned. In this country the word alone usually implies pork sausage but there are many varieties, made of beef, veal, game, liver and combinations of meats.

Country sausage is made a specialty of by some farmers and sold plain or smoked in larger casings than those found in the market, put up in small cartons.

### SAUSAGE AND FRIED APPLES.

For this combination some prefer the sausage meat. Cut the meat in three fourth inch slices, dip in rye flour (this is preferred by some cooks to white flour) and fry until crisp and brown. While the sausage is frying have ready tart apples, cor ed, cut in halves crosswise, dipped in flour mixed with sugar and fry slowly in another pan in some of the fat drained from the sausage until soft and brown but not broken turn slices with a spatula as they brown on one side. Arrange sausage in center of hot platter and surround with the fried apples.

### Apples Stuffed With Sausage.

Wipe and core six tart apples. Fill each cavity with pork sausage meat; it will require about one half pound. Arrange in an agate dripping pan and one half cup of hot water and bake until apples are tender in a hot oven (400 degrees Fahrenheit) basting three times with the liquor in the pan. Serve at luncheon.

### Sausage Baked With Beans.

Pick over, wash one quart of pea beans, cover with cold water and let soak overnight; drain and cook until tender but not broken, in boiling water, changing the water twice. Turn the beans into baking dish with links of pork sausage mixed with them, using one half pound of sausage. Dissolve two teaspoons of salt in one quart of boiling water and pour over the beans, adding more if needed to cover beans. Bake five hours or longer until beans are very soft but not broken adding more water as it evaporates. Serve hot with chili sauce.

## RIDICULE CURES DRUNKENNESS

Moscow, Nov. 17—One novel method of discouraging drunkenness has been tried with apparently successful results at government factory No. 1 just outside of Moscow. A poste announcing a "competition of drunkards" was posted on the bulletin board and entries were encouraged. Sixteen contestants who qualified as the greatest drunkards in the factory were awarded prize. Their names were posted on the bulletin board. According to the promoters the contest had excellent results. The victors were so ridiculed by the other workers that they stopped drinking.

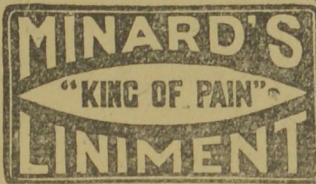

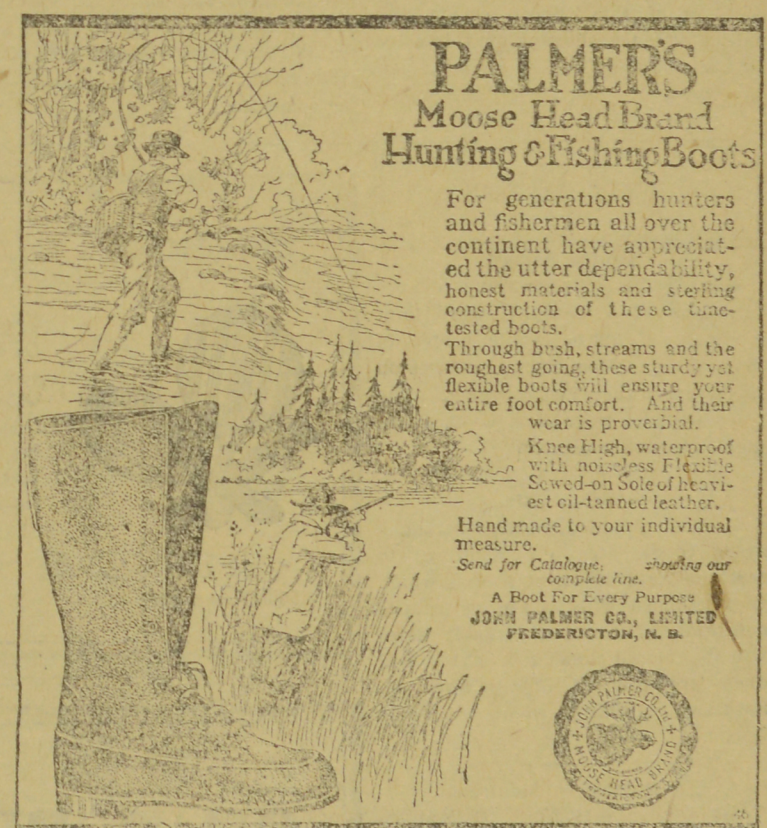

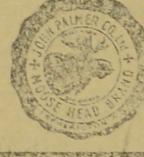
